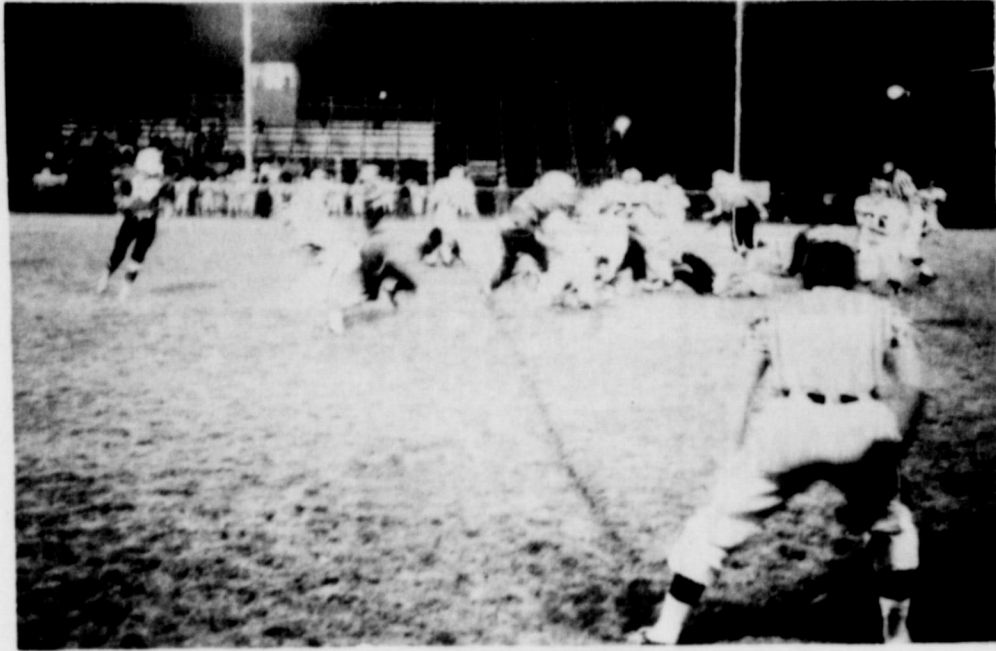

Mavericks Maul Bulldogs, 20-6

The Eastland Mavericks brought their season's total scoring to 192 points Friday night, whipping the Hamilton Bulldogs, 20-6 in Maverick Stadium.

In the nine games, the

Mavericks have allowed 96 for their opponents, and now stand at 3-1 for the District 9-AA season. The season closes out next week when the Mavericks move to Clyde to do battle there.

In other Friday night District action, Clyde trailed Cisco for three quarters, then came back to win, 15-7; League Leader Coleman trounced Comanche, 49-6, reportedly without the services of Ace Myers who only

J.F. (Bill) Smith, 66, of Hobbs, N.M., former longtime Ranger resident, died Thursday night in a Hobbs hospital after a long illness.

Dies In Virginia

Colonel Jack W. Morris, son of the late Bill Morris and Cuba Morris of Ranger, Texas, died at Fairfax Hospital, Fairfax, Virginia, on October 3rd following a sudden heart attack suffered at his home.

Colonel Morris was born in Wirt, Oklahoma, on the seventeenth of February, 1917. Following graduation from Ranger High School in 1935 he entered Texas A&M.

Abilene Philharmonic Orchestra To Present "Pops" Concert Tuesday

MAESTRO GEORGE YAEGER, MUSICAL DIRECTOR - CONDUCTOR OF THE ABILENE PHILHARMONIC ORCHESTRA, is a musician of many talents and varied experience. He will be at the podium when the Abilene orchestra presents a "pops" Concert at Cisco Junior College on Tuesday evening, November 14 at 8:00 p.m. The concert is the third program in the college's Arts and Humanities Series for 1972-73.

Yaeger's career has encompassed teaching in both public schools and universities, the military, and soloist and conductor for professional musical organizations.

His academic training came from the University of Rochester, and he received his Bachelor of Music degree from that institution in 1939. During his college career he was the recipient of three preparatory

and four undergr scholarships.

Yaeger taught band and orchestra at Oklahoma City University, the University of Oklahoma, Taft Junior High School, Our Lady of the Lake College, St. Mary's University, and the University of Texas.

A French horn player, he was the principal hornist for the Rochester (N.Y.) civic Summer Series and also for the Park Band there. In Oklahoma City he was principal French horn player for the Symphony Orchestra, and later went to San Antonio where he was principal French horn player and Associate Conductor. He came to Abilene from San Antonio in 1966.

He has been the Abilene Philharmonic's Musical Director - Conductor from that time to the present. He still conducts "pops" concerts in San Antonio, which he has done since 1963. He commutes to the

Alamo City several times a year in this capacity. He has also made several guest appearances with the San Antonio Symphony. One year after coming to Abilene he also made a guest appearance with the Shreveport Symphony.

Yaeger's military experience was with the U.S. Air Force during the Second World War. He entered as an aviation cadet and had attained the rank of Captain when discharged in 1945. His considerable war record earned him the Seven Battle Star, four Air Medals, and two Presidential Citations.

Mr. Yaeger is also a well-known artist, and his paintings are held in private collections in several states. He has had five one-man art shows in San Antonio, San Marcos, and Abilene.

Mr. Yaeger also is a writer and orchestrator and is quite active in various civic affairs in Abilene.

Since accepting his present position with the Abilene Philharmonic, Yaeger has adapted youth concerts to more fit the musical needs of youth, and has instituted specially prepared concerts for the junior and senior high school students. He was also principally responsible for the beginning of "Pop" concerts by the Philharmonic.

Tickets for the Cisco Junior College concert are priced at \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for students and are available through the Cisco Junior College Business Office in the Harrell Fine Arts Building. They will also be available at the door, according to CJC officials. All seats are reserved.

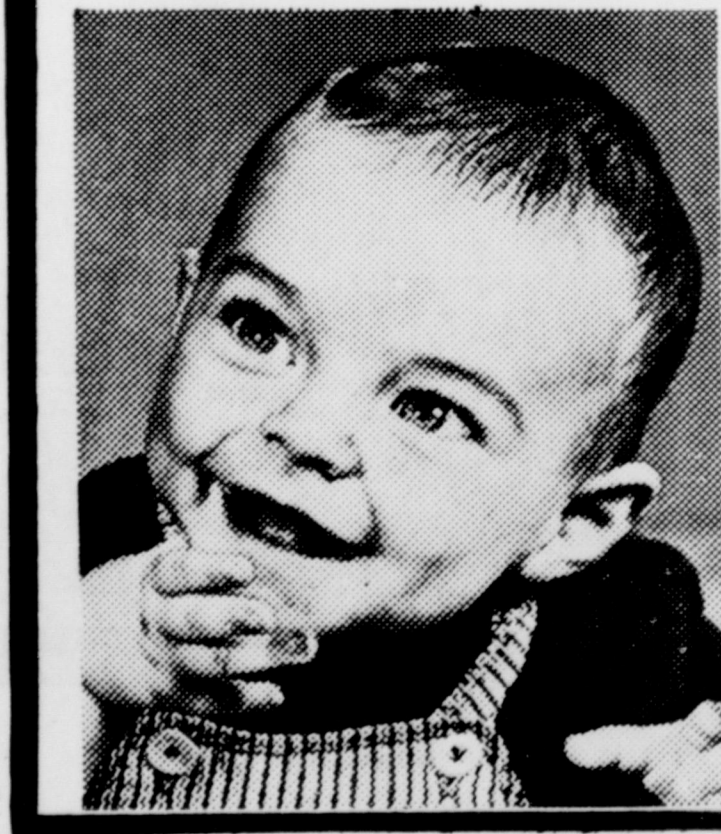

alternate four - to - six inch layers of vegetable matter with two to four inches of good garden soil. Sprinkling a commercial fertilizer on each layer of vegetable matter will hasten decomposition. One - half pound or one cupful of 10 - 10 - 10, 10 - 6 - 4, 10 - 20 - 0, or the equivalent fertilizer mixture, per 10 square feet of vegetable matter layer is sufficient. Manure, if available and free of weeds, may also be added to the soil layer. The compost pile should be four to six feet wide and of any desired length. The top layer should consist of soil and the surface of the pile should slope toward the center, forming a basin to hold water. The layers of leaves should be watered thoroughly as they are spread out. When the pile is completed, additional water should be added periodically to keep the material moist but not soggy. The compost should be turned or mixed with a garden fork or shovel every three or four months. Within six months to a year, the compost should be ready for use. Peanut harvest is near completion in Eastland County. Rains delayed harvest for about two weeks in late October, but by November 1st growers continued with peanut harvest. Since that time all but five to ten percent of the crop has been harvested. Many growers said the rains did more good than harm. It softened the soil that had become dry and hard. Some good yields are still being reported.

William Mitchell To Retire After 31 Years

William E. Mitchell, president of ABC Interstate Theaters, Inc., the Texas-Louisiana-Mississippi-Arkansas-Tennessee motion picture theater operating subsidiary of American Broadcasting Companies, Inc., has elected to retire in January, 1973, after 31 years in the theater business.

Mitchell's retirement was announced Monday (Nov. 6) in New York by P. Harvey

Garland, president, ABC Theater Holdings, Inc.

"Bill Mitchell's request for retirement was accepted with deep regret," Garland said. "Bill's record, including the past two years as president of Interstate during its merger with another ABC circuit that added theaters in five states to the prevailing circuit, is one of outstanding leadership and showmanship." Garland declared.

"Of course, we had to honor his request, and all of us at ABC and Interstate wish him many years of continued health and happiness."

Mitchell is a native Texan and was a newspaper executive before joining Interstate in 1941. During his theater career, which has been spent entirely with the pioneer theater circuit in Dallas, he has at various times been in charge of real estate, insurance, personnel,

division director and executive vice president and general manager.

He was named president in 1970, only the third president of the circuit founded in 1905 by the late Karl Hobbeltzelle, Hobbeltzelle and the late John Q. Adams preceded Mitchell as president.

A church and civic leader in the local community, Mitchell said that he will "just relax" when he retires. His cohorts, knowing Bill as a 18-hour-a-day worker of uncommon drive, know that his idea of relaxing is a full day of activity. His main hobby for a long time has been movies, and he will see a lot of them in the future, Mitchell said.
