**ABOUT YOUR HEALTH**

AUSTIN — People who suffer with hypertension or high blood pressure, "nowadays have more reason for optimism than they would have had a generation ago.

In itself hypertension is not a disease. It's a sign a something is wrong, like the stuffy feeling that comes with a cold. The danger accrues because of the possibility of serious heart or kidney damage when blood pressure is consistently high.

It isn't true that the higher the blood pressure the more reason to fear heart damage. Research has shown that temporary increases in pressure do not really make much difference. But even mild elevations in the blood pressure considered normal for the person involved—if the increases persist—may cause the walls of blood vessels to thicken, exactly as callouses, are formed on hands by regular use of an axe or hoe.

**Vaccination of All Dogs Urged By State Vet**

COLLEGE STATION — The rabid dog is a constant threat to all children, asserts Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian, especially on warm spring days when large groups of youngsters congregate in play areas. Rabies is currently a serious problem in several sections of the state, he adds, and should be a subject of real concern to pet owners everywhere.

Dr. Patterson says any warm-blooded animal is susceptible to rabies, but that it is most likely to be spread by the predator-type. Symptoms are hard to define, explains the veterinarian, but its a good practice to suspect any animal if it loses the fear of man.

Keep under observation a n y suspicious animal should it bite a human, advises Dr. Patterson. If the animal is not available, t h e person should be placed under competent medical supervision at once.

Texas law now empowers commissioners courts to declare the county a rabies control area, Dr. Patterson says. This should extend more efficient control programs into the state's rural areas. Vaccination of all pets and strict impoundment of every stray dog are essential features of a good control program, he adds.

Wild animals sometimes carry the danger of rabies to farms and ranches, endangering livestock as well as farmers. Dr. Patterson warns rural people to be on the lookout for strange-acting animals, particularly foxes, coyotes, skunks and civet cats. Pets coming in contact with any suspicious domestic or wild animals should be given a booster shot, he warns, even if already protected by a standard rabies shot.

ATTEND THE CHURCH OF YOUR CHOICE EACH SUNDAY

In the most common type of high blood pressure, called "essential hypertension," the tiny branches of arteries which carry blood to all body tissues (called arterioles) begin to tighten up. Blood passageways become smaller and smaller, and the heart has to work harder to push the blood through. After a time the blood vessels lose their elasticity and the heart muscles thicken with the extra work load. Result: high blood pressure, and ultimately heart damage.

What causes the arterioles to tighten and constrict? No o n e knows. High blood pressure sometimes goes up for a period of days or weeks—or even longer—and then drops back to normal. Sometimes it may jump from pure nervousness while your physician is examining you. Perhaps there is a connection between hypertension and the strain of modern life. People who work under constant stress, who worry too much, are often susceptible. Heredity is a probable factor, and the condition occurs most often in persons between 30 and 50.

Low blood pressure seldom causes trouble. Afflicting relatively few people to a serious extent, the condition is usually a symptom of a specific disease which can frequently be treated successfully. The thing which will count most in adding years to the life of hypertension sufferers is the willingness to change their living habits, following the rules of moderation in everything. By getting under a doctor's care and following a few simple rules for moderate living, they can probably work and enjoy life as long or longer than their

next-door neighbors without high blood pressure. There is nothing to gain from worrying about your chances of developing hypertension. Just make it a point to have a physical examination at least once a year. And worry and argue as little as possible.

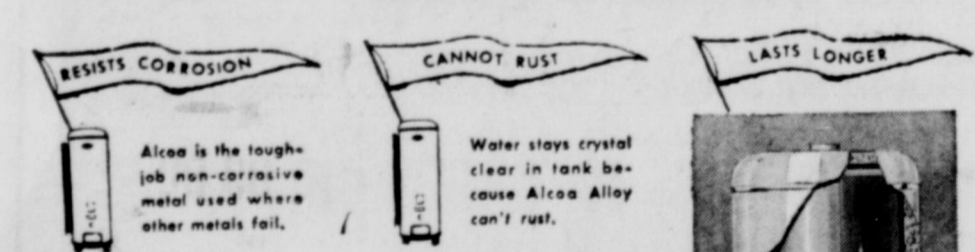

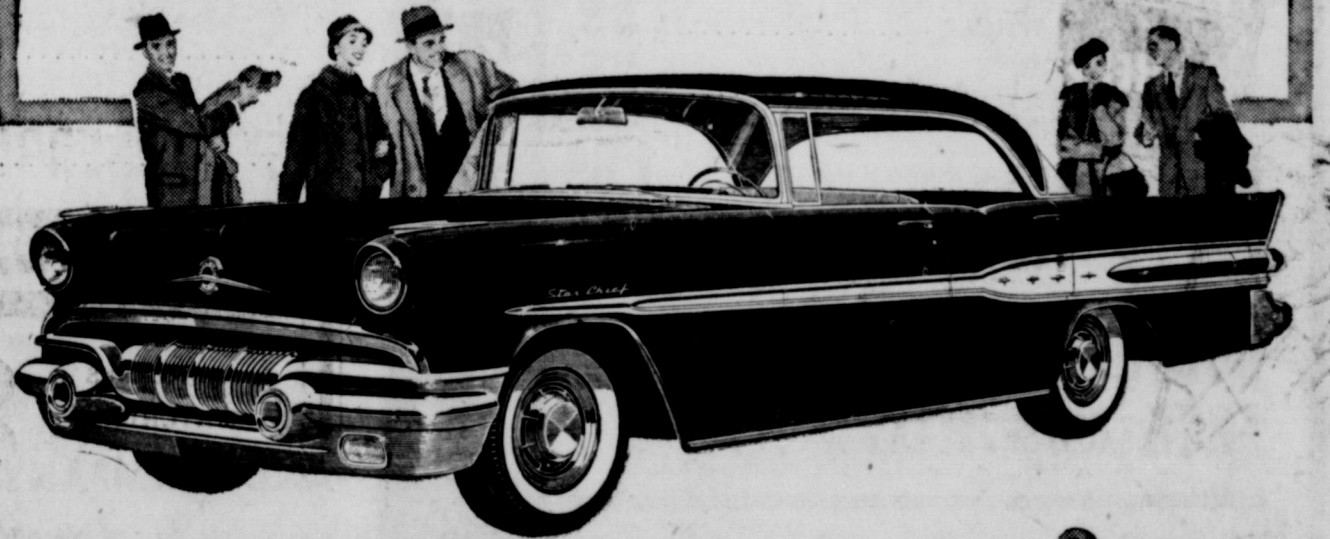

### Effects of Liquor Depends More On Drinker Than Drink

"The drinking problem isn't only alcohol—it's people," says Dr. Leon A. Greenberg, who heads research in Yale University's famous Center of Alcohol Studies. "Pre-

sent scientific knowledge provides no physiological explanation of why some people—4.7 million out of the 70 million drinkers in the United States—become alcoholics. It appears, mainly, to be a personality problem."

Dr. Greenberg's findings are revealed by Herbert Yahracs in an article, "What Happens When You Drink" condensed from Popular

Science, in April Reader's Digest. The Yale studies show, for instance, that if you add water to your whiskey the alcohol gets into your blood stream just as fast. If you add soda water it will get there even faster, because carbonation speeds the passage through the stomach. If you are a large person you will feel less effect than a smaller person does. That's be-

cause you have more blood and other body fluids to dilute the alcohol.

Experiments at the Center of Alcohol Studies indicate that a little alcohol—the amount found in two or three cans of beer—calms the nerves and eases tensions. A can of beer contains about the same amount of alcohol as an ounce of whisky, but beer and wine contain solid materials such as protein and carbohydrate which slow up the rate at which alcohol gets into the blood.

Other facts brought out by the Yahracs report on the Yale studies:

If you drink slowly enough—say half a highball or three quarters of a can of beer over 60 minutes—the alcohol will be oxidized by the liver as rapidly as it is absorbed, and you will not feel it.

The chief danger in driving after a few drinks probably lies in the fact that your confidence zooms—and you take chances.

Dr. Greenberg's answer to the question, "What about the permanent effects of drinking?"

"In the moderate drinker we haven't found any. Alcoholics—people who can't stop after a few drinks—are another matter. . . . They often suffer severely from nutritional deficiencies. Most of them have a diseased liver, too, and one in ten has delirium tremens or some alcoholic mental disease."
