Likewise, when he pre faces a legal document with a long list of "whereases", he is simply reciting pertinent facts for the benefit of the court to show the facts of the situation that lead to the execution of the instrument.

The difficulty with drafting a document in laymen's language i that to the trained analyst such anguage is susceptible of several meanings, and consequently likely to lead to litigation.
