It seems the very real question evolves down to this proposition: Does the proposed reford of our military establishment make t more or less likely that the secretary of Defense and the President of the United States vill hear the great problems ar gued out throughly? Will it enable nim to come to a definite and authoritative conclusion with the power of enforcement all the way down the line, resulting in action o carry out that decision?

The congress will soon have be-fore us a Bill to enact into Law hese reforms. The controversy enters on the amount of authoriy which should be given one nan—the secretary of Defense. ome are saying that to place such authority in one man is embracng the old Prussian type of militarism.
