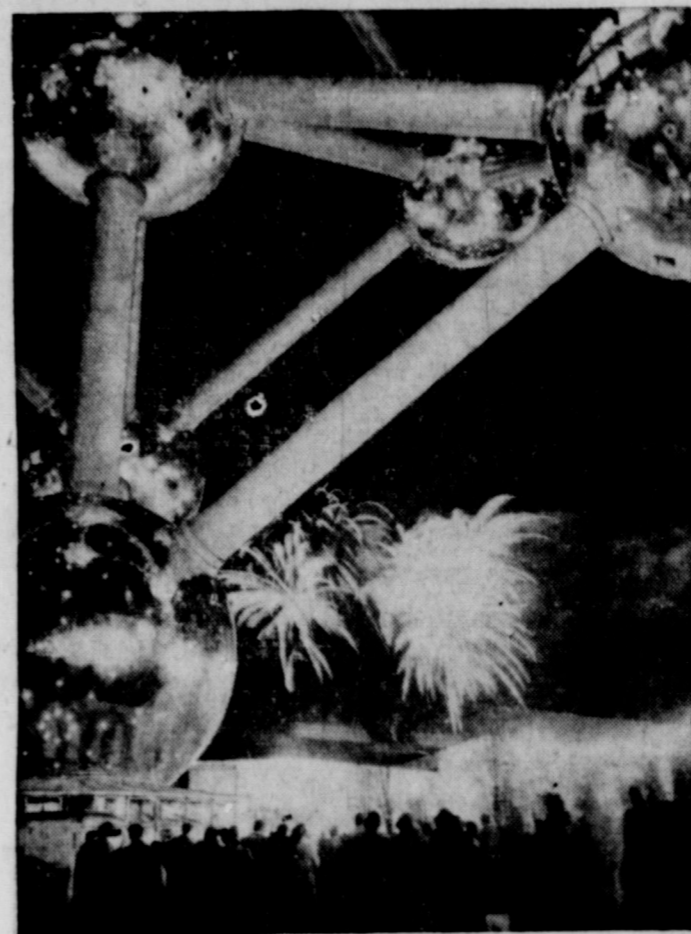

### ABOUT YOUR HEALTH



If you're like most people, you hate chiggers! Red bugs, as some persons call them, are those tiny, almost invisible mites that frequent grass lawns (especially Bermuda), tall weeds, and other grassy areas such as undergrowth in wooded sections. They are usually a light red or tan color. While a hungry adolescent, this pernicious little parasite can send strong men into spasms of itching misery and into fits of scratching. The mite itself does not cause much harm; however, scratching will. Infection can result causing painful boils and leaving a scar. In some areas of the world they are believed carriers of disease, but in the U. S., there is no such proven danger. It is the scratching which causes all the trouble. Griefs infection can bring on general bodily disturbances, fever and loss of sleep caused by forced periods of scratching during the night. Animals, birds and domestic fowl suffer from chiggers also, even snakes are not immune. The severe itching occurs when the chigger, in its efforts to feed, injects an anti-coagulant material to melt the skin layers so that he may feed. They do not burrow into the skin as commonly believed—they merely feed themselves and drop off, but the itching stays on. They congregate in tight areas such as sleeves, belt lines and neck. You can protect yourself by the application of a suitable repellent to these critical areas whenever you are about to enter a suspected chigger-infested area. If this fails, there are known palliatives to soothe the itching such as baking soda solution, ammonia water and alcohol. Chiggers are impossible to control except in cleared areas such as lawns, greens, camp sites, and picnic grounds where the ground may be mowed closely. For these areas, a treatment of five percent chlordane or toxaphene dust is effective at the rate of 40 to 50 pounds per acre (1 to 1 1/4 pounds per 1,000 square feet), and lindane dust of one percent concentration (10 ounces or more per 1,000 square feet.) Sprays may be substituted. All are dangerous to people! Fifty to 70 gallons per acre, following the mixing directions on the label, is usually sufficient (1 1/2 to 2 pounds per 1,000 square feet.) Bear in mind the dangers in the use of the dusts or sprays—use caution and put them away safely. Remember, insecticides can kill; chiggers only itch.

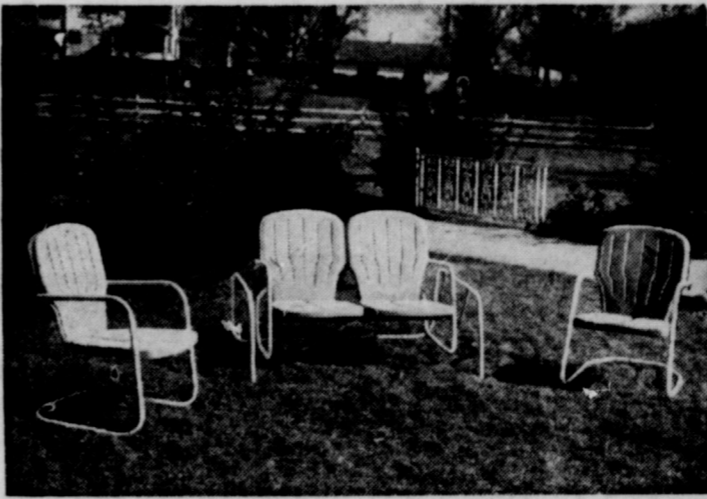

**IT'S THE LAW**  
In Texas

**"With All My Worldly Goods..."**  
June is traditionally the month for weddings, and many couples will be taking marriage vows within the next few weeks. A certain symbolic transfer of "worldly goods" is often associated with the wedding ceremony, but under Texas law the act of marrying another does not give you the right to take control of his property.

Generally speaking, each spouse has the right to control and dispose of his or her own separate property. The separate property

of a husband or wife includes pro-marriage, and that which is ac- property owned by either before quired by either after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be com- munity property until the con- trary is clearly proved.

Aside from the ordinary com- munity estate, there is a class of property known as the wife's "special community," which in- cludes all the income from her separate real property, and prob- ably the interest on bonds or notes, and dividends on stocks owned in her separate right. While the husband may have similar as- sets, the law accords them no par- ticular distinction from ordinary community property.

Although the history of the mat- ter is somewhat confusing, it ap- pears that under present day law the husband has control of ordi- nary community property; but con- trol of the wife's special commu- nity property is reserved to her.

Certain restrictions are impos- ed upon both husband and wife in exercising such control. For in- stance, the husband cannot legally dispose of community property in such a way as to defraud the wife, nor can he sell the home- stead without her signature and acknowledgment. And the wife's sale or mortgage of her separate real estate, stocks or bonds is not valid unless her husband joins with her in the transaction—he must sign and execute the neces- sary legal papers along with her.

There are laws exempting the wife's separate and special com- munity property from liability for debts incurred by the husband. Such liability is restricted to his separate property and the ordi- nary community property.

On the other hand, debts incur- red by the wife in obtaining nec- essaries for herself or the child- ren bind all property belonging to either party, including the hus- band's separate property. For other debts which she has power to incur, only her separate and special community property are liable.

All of these distinctions empha- size the advisability of keeping proper records. By doing so the various classes of community and separate property owned by a mar- ried couple will always be easily distinguishable. Each category will then receive the special pro- tection afforded to it by our laws.

security benefits can be paid to certain of your survivors. For the young man, with a wife and children, Social Security in many cases represents the best insurance protection that his family has. It can be worth as much as \$50,000 or more to his widow and children in monthly checks.

If you leave only a widow, she can be paid benefits beginning with age 62. There is no reduction in widow's benefits. In the case of a woman, her widower at 65 can benefit if he was dependent on his wife at the time of her death.

If there is neither widow, child- ren, nor dependent widower, your aged parents may get payments if they were dependent on you for their support.

These are the monthly surviv- ors' benefits provided by the law. You cannot name a beneficiary.

If you are insured at the time of your death, a lump sum will be paid to your widow or widower if you are living together. If there is no such widow or widower, then the person or persons who paid your burial expenses can get the lump sum. This lump sum is three times your monthly benefit amount with a maximum of \$225. It is in addition to any monthly benefits payable.

A widow, widower or parent re- ceives 3/4 of your monthly benef- it amount. The total payment to any one family from a single social security account cannot be more than 80 percent of the worker's average monthly earn- ings or more than \$200. If the unadjusted family payment would be more than the permitted max- imum, each dependent's share is reduced to bring the total down to the maximum amount payable.

A family's total is not reduced below \$50.00 by such adjustments.
