



Gone forever, perhaps, those days. Yet, believe it or no., there are a few commodities in general use still selling around the 1925 figure. We have in mind, just now, gasoline-the oil industry's principal product and, thus, of much interest to our oilbelt.

Other than taxes, over which the industry has no control, and which we are up 250 per cent, gasoline now costs only slightly more than it did in 1925.

Why? Such factors as vast consumption, scientific research and intense competition.

It seems to us that the industry is to be congratulated for (exclusive of the huge taxes) holding the price line, which, of course, is to the distinct advantage of a vast number of people.



Tax Problem Is Clarified By Government

The Internal Revenue Service, today clarified the new provision of the Federal income tax law which permits a taxpayer to treat as one property any separate mineral interests which constitute all or part of an operating unit.

A taxpayer electing the benefits of this provision is required to submit certain evidence in support of his election, and some misunderstanding has existed as to the evidence required.

Temporary rules published on December 31, 1954, require the taxpayer taking advantage of this provision to attach to his return property maps and other explanatory data necessary to identify the operating unit and the properties such operating unit which are being aggregated, as well as the properties which are being treated separately.

It is not necessary to submit maps and other detailed informafor any mineral interests which are not within an operating unit for which the taxpayer has exercised an election to aggregate. The detailed information is required, however, for all interests within any operating unit for which the election has been exerwithin such unit which the taxpayer has elected to treat as sep-

"Potatoes In Popular Ways" is the title of a U.S. Department Agriculture booklet which points out important facts about this nourishing, but often under-valued vegetable.

"Penny for penny," says the booklet, "they have more energy-giving value than any other vegetable." When you est them daily, you get "a goodly portion of your Vitamin C quota, besides B vitamins, iron and important minerals." And, it points out, potatoes need not be fattening.

"A medium-sized potato has about 100 calories - no more than an apple. If you are watching your weight, watch the gravy, butter or other fat that you put on the potatoes. It's those that pile up the calories," says the Department.

To get most food value from potatoes cook them in their jackets. Boiling is preferable to baking—retaining more vi-tamins and flavor. So start with potatoes boiled in their jackets, even if you ultimately intend to serve them creamed, mashed or any other way.

Good potato values come in Union Bag and Paper Corporaon's mesh window paper bags. They are well ventilated and protected from light burns and excess condensation. Clear printing on paper bags lets you see at a glance the grade and size of potato you are buying.

In baking potatoes, wash and dry them, then bake in a hot oven (425° Fahrenheit, 40 to 60 Rubbing a little fat on the otato before baking



will keep the skin nice and soft. You can save fuel by baking potatoes while you ovencook other foods. If the other food requires a moderate oven, allow a little extra time for

the potatoes to bake. In boiling potatoes, first scrub them, then drop them into a kettle of boiling water. Put lid on and, when finished, drain at once so the potatoes don't get water-logged.

.Buy potatoes in quantity they are cheaper that way. And keep them in a cool, but not cold temperature - preferably in a dark place.


Student Burned In Chemistry Experiment


KLONDIKE QUEEN



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

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

The unit is lettered "Charlotte-Mecklenburg County Mobile Control Center." The trailer provides a complete office with such items as tiled floor, fluorescent lighting, complete insulation throughout including plywood in roof, and jalousie type windows.

It can be moved to a rural area, miles from possible targets, as these mobile offices carry two-way radio equipment. In a way it has the same principle as the recent elaborate equipment installed by the City of Los Angeles in which three Fruehauf trailer units formed mobile communications centers which could, if necessary, ring the entire metropolitan area of the city and each one could become the main office in the event that the headquarters located in the city were knocked out.

The self-employed farmer, rancher, or cotton ginner wil begin to have in 1955 the same sort of protection for himself and his family against income loss by reason of old age or death that other selfemployed persons gained in 1951.

The old-age and survivors in surance provisions of the Social Security Act have a purpose that might be summed up in this short phrase: "Replacement of a portion of a lost income where the loss as caused by old age or death. Later articles will deal with how large a replacement is possible, and to whom such payments are made.

Large corporations have intricate profit and loss statements and batteries of accountants busily engaged in compiling them. Most maintain rather detail ed records of inventories, receipts. losses, etc. What sort of records must the former keep in order to know whether he must make a special social security report in 1956 on his 1955 earnings?

There are no set rules or particular bookkeeping systems prescribed by the law. However, the records, of whatever nature they may be, must be sufficiently complete to support a finding that there was or was not a net profit for the year. And, to keep his social security protection in force even though drought or other bad
