Senator Yarborough's request weather in the past week, and for an "expression from the peofrom all indications we can expect ple on this serious question" came after the Council of State Chamber of Commerce had also asked for "a public outpouring of letters" on the subject.

A move by Senator Yarborough to cut income taxes for all Americans by raising exemptions from \$600 to \$800 to help end recession was defeated in the Senate at mid-March.

"Since that time, several ecoomists and many individuals have told me that they strongly favor the tax reduction I am urging. I think if we are to have a tax cut, it should be cut for all of the people and not another tax cut for a privileged few.' '







Further, it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to fish for, take, catch, or attempt to catch any fish in the waters of Lake Leon by the use of any net, seine, snag line, trap or other device not here in authorized; and the possession, within two hundred (200) yards of Lake Leon, of any tackle not authorized by this act shall be prima facie evidence of violation hereof.

#### ARTICLE V

It shall be unlawful in Lake Leon to use for bait any game fish or fish commonly known as Gold Fish, except when they are cut up and used as cut bait. It shall be lawful to use for bait, when lawfully caught, acquired


