T. G. (Glen) Jackson, 78, county attorney of Eastland County shortly before the turn of the century, died at 7:30 p.m. Thursday in Gladewater, while enroute to Longview on business.

Mr. Jackson had motored to East Texas with M. J. Byrd, an oman, and they had separated at Gladewater, as Mr. Jackson was to proceed to Longview. His death occurred in a railway station or bus station.

Mr. Jackson had been in failing health for some time. He had lived in the Connellee Hotel in Eastland for several years. He was a life-long Methodist.

A native Texan, Mr. Jackson practiced law in Eastland for many years. His father, the late W. G. Jackson, saw service in the Texas Legislature.

Surviving are Mrs. Jackson, three daughters and a son. The daughters are Mrs. Maxine Finch of Andrews, Mrs. Frank Darden of South America, Miss Mollie Jackson of Odessa. T. G. Jackson Jr., his son, is in the Marine Corps in Japan. He leaves a grandchild, Frank Darden Jr. Mr. Jackson also leaves three sisters, Mrs. June Kimble, Miss Mary Jackson and Mrs. Lucy Brogdon, all of Fort Worth, and two brothers, Charles R. Jackson of Lubbock and L. G. Jackson of Rising Star.

The body arrived at Hamner Funeral Home, Eastland, Friday night, with arrangements for the services to be made upon the arrival of relatives from distances. The rites are expected to be set for 2 or 2:30 p.m. Sunday, in Eastland.

## Countians Back From Trip To Purina Farm

Shortly before they left there was a meeting of the Central Texas Turkey Growers Association held at the Fire Hall at Gorman. George McCarthy, executive vice president of Universal Mills, Fort Worth, was the speaker. He emphasized the need for cutting production costs for turkeys and also the need to increase consumption. In the nation he said 7 pounds of turkey per person per year is consumed while in some areas where the eating of turkeys is promoted the rate of consumption is 15 pounds per person per year.

Refreshments were served by the Gorman Better Business League. The next meeting of the Central Texas Turkey Growers Association will be held May 19 at Rising Star.

## Ward Track Meet, Hi-Y's 1st Project, Results In Tie, 38

Eastland's ward schools—South and West — battled to a 38-all tie in a track meet which was the first project of the newly-organized Eastland High School Hi-Y Friday afternoon.

It was such a good meet that the "Y" promptly put in an order for an additional trophy, so that each team might have an award. Also, ribbons were given by the "Y" to the first four winners in each event.

Thirty-one boys, from the 4th and 5th grades, participated in the meet. "These kids tried as hard as they could in every event," said the "Y's" Clyde Evatt, ward school track meet chairman. "They are just little fellows, of course, and did a lot better than we had expected, even."

With the 4th and 5th grades dismissed for the affair, it started at 2 p.m. Many parents were among the fans who turned out for it. The lads' classmates furnished spirited rooting sections.

Representing the "Y", besides Chairman Evatt, were Larry Tankersley and Henry Sims, starter and assistant, respectively.

## Oil News Eastland County Gains Location For Wildcat

Location for a new 3,600-foot cable tool wildcat was staked in Eastland County five miles south-west of Carbon this week.

It will be Sinclair Oil and Gas Co. No. 1 W. G. Elliott, spotting 330 feet from the north and west lines of Section 50, John Owings Survey, Abstract 400.

In the regular field, Frank Love and Co. of Wichita Falls staked No. 5 Robert Fox as a 1,300-foot rotary project six miles south of Ranger.

Drillsite is 1,500 feet from the south and 2,350 feet from the east lines of Subdivision 30, McLennan CSL Survey 2.

Completed as a regular field producer was Jack Chamberlain of Eastland No. 2 J. L. Dick, 4½ miles northeast of Eastland in Warren Lyman Survey.

Daily potential was 58.51 barrels of 40 gravity oil, plus 23 per cent water, pumping from 100 perforations at 1,470-80 feet and 1,486-1,501 feet. Casing was set at 1,542 feet, with total depth of 1,544.

In a business session preceding insect control discussion the grower voted unanimously to stage the annual Eastland County show. There had been some talk of discontinuing the show after no invitation was extended to hold it again at Cisco.

A new source of obtaining prize money and a place to hold the event will be chosen prior to show time in December.

Grower Simmons seemed to express the statement of the rest of the pecan growers when he said: "I am in favor of holding the show even if we have to hold it under a tree."

A committee composed of members of the growers, working in conjunction with County Agent J. M. Cooper of Eastland, will likely be named to arrange for a place, a time and prize money for the 1955 show.

Following the business session County Agent Cooper, who initiated the pecan field day 10 years ago, demonstrated a new method of keeping crows out of pecan orchards.

Mr. Cooper had a bunch of firecrackers, the fuses of which were inserted between the strands of a

The Rev. Calvin Bailey of the Second Baptist Church, Ranger, spoke to the Eastland First Baptist Church Men's Brotherhood Thursday night on "The Layman's Responsibility."

It was a covered-dish-supper meeting at the church, with President Bill Blackmon presiding. The affair was well attended. Considerable emphasis was given the 30-day trial tithing campaign which the brotherhood is encouraging among churchfolk. The purpose is to interest non-titheers to try it for a month, at least.

## Further Polio Serum Delay Is Anticipated

Further delay in second-round polio shots for Eastland County and other southern points was anticipated today by County Health officer Dr. L. C. Brown.

"News reports this morning so indicate," said Dr. Brown. "It seems that this is occasioned by furnishing supplies just now to some northern states."

"Doubtless it will result in a delay of another week or two. We have not been advised definitely as to how long it will be."

The plan had been to give the second vaccinations Tuesday, May 3, two weeks from the first inoculations.

As before, the free vaccinations will be for first and second grad-

ers. "It is planned to give the serum to schools from communities of 250 children," said Dr. Brown. Here in Eastland the local chairman is Dr. W. B. Barrow. The place for the inoculations locally is Eastland Memorial Hospital.

Dr. Barrow said fine co-operation has been given by the persons concerned — children, doctors, nurses and hospital.

While some cases of polio were reported recently to have developed after use of one brand of vaccine, Dr. Brown said that none had been reported following use of the brand serum used in Eastland county and that he had not heard of an additional one in the case of the other serum.

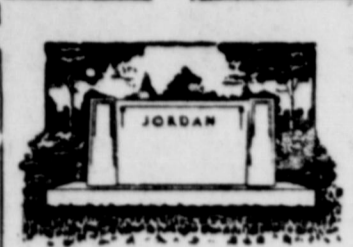

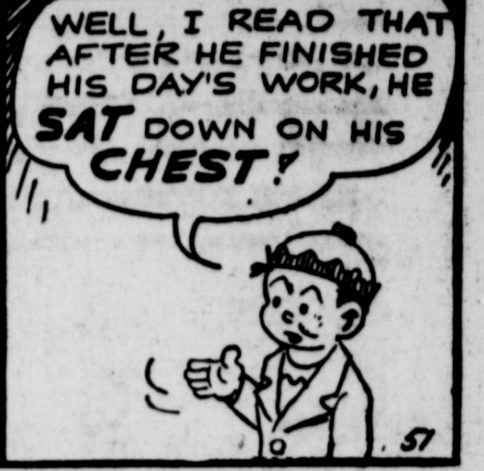
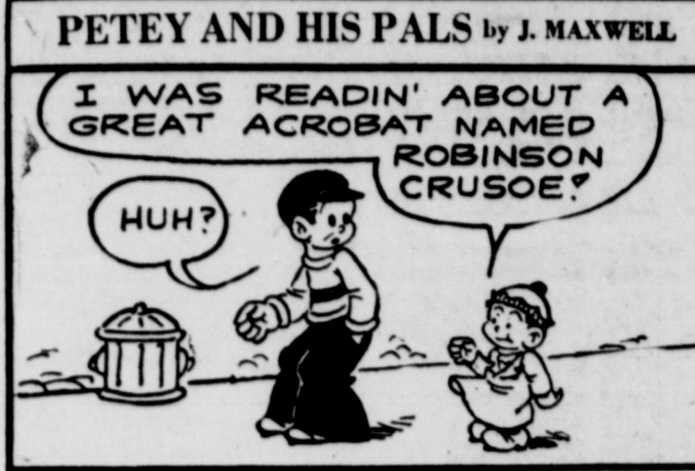
Before the game, Carbon, Scranton and Desdemona were in a three-way tie in games won

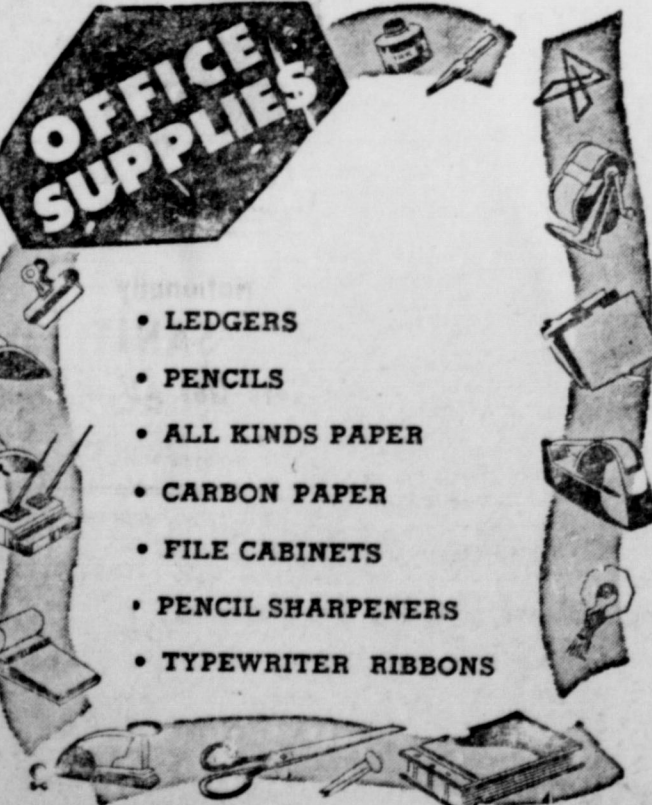

### Eastland County HD Clubs Are Celebrating National HD Week

The eight Home Demonstration Clubs in Eastland County are observing National Home Demonstration Week, May 1-7. During this week recognition is given to all home demonstration clubs over the nation.

Many people ask, "What is a Home Demonstration Club?" They are organizations of rural homemakers whose members agree to be cooperators or demonstrators in the demonstrations being stressed in the county. Their purpose is to help make the job of homemaking easier, to help the homemaker make the most of what she has, and to improve family and community life.

This year completes a three-year major demonstration program on living room improvement and gardening in the county. In addition to this, clubs will do work on safety, fire prevention, civil defense, crafts, poultry, braided rugs, personal improvement, homemade gifts, book reviews, recreation, and family life education. Each program is presented in an informative, interesting manner, and participation of all members is encouraged.

In addition to the regular club programs the members cooperate with a number of organizations, such as the Red Cross, the Heart Fund, the Cancer Society, the Polio Drive, and with the 4-H Clubs in the county.

All Home Demonstration Clubs belong to the Texas Home Demonstration Association which is a federation of home demonstration clubs. This serves as a cooperative and coordinating agency for the state-wide activities of home demonstration clubs and as a medium for the expression of the desires and interests of rural women and as a means of cooperating with other organizations of similar interest. Each county has a THDA chairman. The Eastland County Chairman is Mrs. John Love, Cheaney Club. Mrs. Bill Tucker, Cheaney Club, serves as District 8 THDA chairman.

Council delegates, club presidents, and council committee chairmen from each club meet the second Wednesday of each month in Eastland for a County Home Demonstration Council meeting. This serves as an advisory committee to the agent, as a demonstration in organization, and as a means of communication between the community and the agent, between the clubs, and the THDA, and between the various organizations with which they cooperate. Council chairman is Mrs. Ernest Scheaffer, Word HD Club, Cisco. Mrs. Bill Tucker, Cheaney Club, is vice-chairman; Miss Willie Word, Word HD Club, is secretary, and Mrs. York Eberhart, North Star HD Club, Rising Star, is treasurer.

The eight Home Demonstration Clubs in Eastland County are North Star, Pioneer, Pleasant Hill, Okra, Word, Lake Cisco, Flatwood, and Cheaney, consisting of approximately 130 members. The clubs meet twice each month at regular times. Membership is not restricted; anyone may be a member.

### Glasgow's Kelvin Hall Unable To Hold Crusade Crowds In Last Week

GLASGOW — With the successful All-Scotland Crusade of Evangelist Billy Graham now in its last week, Glasgow's Kelvin Hall is no longer able to hold the crowds, and little revivals are breaking out in churches all over the country.

"There is a tremendous religious revival sweeping the northeast of Scotland," Billy said in an address at Kelvin Hall, where 18,000 sat inside and 3,000 stood outside. Billy went out and spoke for a few minutes to those who had been unable to gain entrance, gave an invitation, and 35 responded.

Numerous reports have been received of revivals under way in churches where pastors are giving the first invitations of their ministry for worshippers to accept Christ and love Him seven days a week. "Scotland can light a torch that will be seen around the world," said the evangelist.

On the two final days of the campaign in Glasgow Billy will speak to over 200,000 persons at Ibrox and Hampden stadiums. Next Monday & Tuesday he will hold giant rallies in the north of Scotland, Inverness and Aberdeen, for those who were not able to get to Glasgow. After that he will rest for seven days before going to London's Wembley Stadium to address over 100,000 on seven consecutive nights.

The European tour will begin in Paris on June 5. Meetings have been scheduled in big halls and stadiums at Zurich, Geneva,

Frankfurt, Mannheim, Stuttgart, Nuremberg, Dortmund, Rotterdam, Oslo and Gothenburg.

Billy did not refer to the star Susan Hayward by name, but remarked during a Kelvin address, "I read a report in the newspapers that one of our most beautiful Hollywood stars — 35 years of age, a million dollars in the bank, name all over the world, an Academy Award winner — has been taken to a hospital suffering from an overdose of sleeping pills. I have been in Hollywood many times. Many of the people are the most miserable you've ever met. They find that all the glamour does not satisfy the soul. Happiness is only found in Christ."

During the week Billy made one of his brief answers to criticism. Some of the watchdog citizens who have cried "emotionalism", "hypnotism", and urged him to hold special services for animals, noticed that occasionally a child would be crying as he walked forward to make a decision for Christ. To this the evangelist replied, "It's a funny thing they can go to the pictures and see gangsters shooting it out in grim battle, cowboys in hair-raising situations and the most moving love scenes which upset them emotionally. But if they shed one tear for God it's a terrible thing. Something is wrong in the thinking of a world where this situation exists."

Song Director Cliff Barrows highly praised the engineering accomplishments that made it possible for a choir in Bangorwailes to sing for the Scots at Glasgow's Kelvin Hall. When the song came over the loudspeaker, he said, "I think there must be some angels who are joining in along the line." He remarked, "We heard the song of the Lord in a very literal sense — the song from voices in Wales and Glasgow — but prior to the song was the work of others whose labors made the song possible. It's a simple thing to say, but it is very true that if we work for Him today we will sing for Him tomorrow."

Billy will return to Scotland May 24 as a private visitor to the General Assembly in Edinburgh. A debate will be held Friday night by the Glasgow University Union and the Oxford Union Society on the motion: "That Billy Graham is an Undesirable Migrant". While the debate is in progress, Billy will be addressing about 80,000 people of Scotland at Ibrox Stadium.

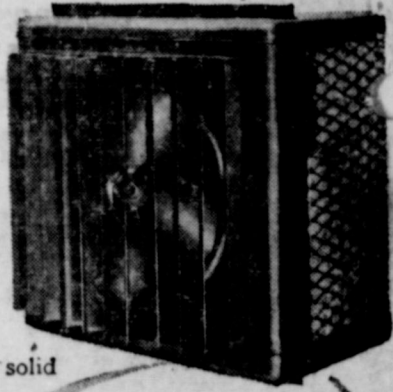
