The 8-9 a.m. period accounted for 1.9 percent of the fatalities, lowest of those times listed while 6-7 p.m. had the worst total, 6.8 percent. In the nine hour period from 6 a.m. to 3 p.m. a total of 25.9 percent of the fatal accidents occurred while during the next nine hours 51.9 percent of the highway fatalities ified petitions signers, will be who voted in the last

As to the relative merits of the respective days of the week, there is no question that weekend travel is the most dangerous. The Travelers report said. Friday, Saturday and Sunday contributed 53.3 percent of all fatalities while Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday added up to 34.2 percent.

It was also pointed out that despite the few cars on the road from 1-6 a.m., 16.8 percent of all fatalities occurred within that period.





Where is the Word of God to be found. The most immediate place is "the proclaimed word"—the proclamation of the Church in Sermon and Sacrament. This is the Church's God-riven function. God-given function to ness to what God has said and

done, in Christ, Behind the proclamation of the Church is the "written Word" in Scripture. The Bible is the supreme written witness to the Word of God; that is, through human words God speaks His Word, to all who are enable to hear, by God's Spirit.

Behind both Church Bible is "the Revealed Word", the Word in its original form, out of which Scriptures and Church have sprung. The Re-vealed Word of the Living God in Christ Jesus, our Lord. Neither Church nor Bible are equivalent to God himself: They are witnesses to God's Word in Christ.

We must vigorously oppose any attempt to substitute a human word for the Word in Christ. On the one hand, human reason is not the standard or test of Divine Truth. On the other hand, we are not to identify God with Church, Bible, doctrine. God is Lord over reason, Church, Bible, doctrine and fashions these as He chooses, not as we choose. God's Word is sovereign and free, and not at all subject to the beck and call of

This Word of God, fully speaking, is the revelation of Himself as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We do not say, 'mere is a God, and this God has revealed Himself. We say, rather, God has revealed Himself, therefore there is this sort of God. The focal point of this Revelation is the Inwith that the gift of the Holy Spirit Who bears witness to the Incarnation and bestows the gift of faith. Jesus Christ is God with us: the Holy Spirit is God in us.

Man's knowledge of God must be the knowledge of that Rev-elation. We cannot find God in our own way, when and Our knowledge of God comes through His way, and we must wait for His revelation.

In no sense do we have any control over God. He is sovereign. He speaks first: we answer or do not answer; we hear or do not hear; we obey or do not obey. But our action is the result of our response to God's initiative. God is not to be found at the end of a human argument, or a human search: rather, as the Shepherd the sheep, God finds

what we do: we are saved by wnat God does, in Christ, by His Holy Spirit for and in us. We can not boast of our exploits before God: we can only entrust ourselves into

God commands man to hear and to speak His Word. But we must ever remember that every time man speaks it is human word that is heardhuman witness to the Divine
