# Eastland Plans for Centennial Celebration

Initial plans were mapped Wednesday afternoon when the Eastland Civic League and Garden Club, The Eastland Chamber of Commerce and the Eastland Jaycees joined forces

to stage the celebration for Eastland residents. In the planning session, it was agreed that all proceeds from the event would go to the Eastland Centennial Memorial

Library. Presidents of the three organizations will serve as co-chairmen of the Eastland City Centennial Celebration. They are Mrs. H. J. Bulgerin, Civic League; J. T. Carter, Chamber of Commerce; and Larry Rollins, Jaycees.

Other officers are Beverly Nicholson, secretary, and Mrs. Eula Corbel, treasurer. The group authorized Dale Bakker to proceed with his program for Brothers of the Brush and Ginger Mangum for the Centennial Belles.

Others attending the meeting held at the Texas Electric Service Co. Reddy Room were Bruce Pipkin, Marene Johnson-Johnson, Mrs. Austin McCloud, Grover Hallmark, Monroe Rollins and H. V. O'Brien.

Activities are being planned and will be announced in this newspaper as they develop. It was agreed that a Birthday Party suitable for the occasion will be held. The City of

Eastland will celebrate its 100th birthday two years from now in 1975, so the party for the county will be preparatory for a good long celebration, it was pointed out.

Most of the other towns in the county are making plans for celebrations too, so there apparently will be plenty of activity during the month of May.

## Eastland Grows By 72 Acres

Eastland grew by some 52 acres this week with the annexation of Camp Inspiration in action at the regular monthly meeting of the City Commission.

Mayor Durel Reid presided with all commissioners present Monday evening when a good number of matters were handled.

Approval was also given to make application with the Leon-Bosque Resources Conservation Development project for the modernization of The City Park. The project will fund up to half of the cost in a five year development program. A master plan has already been delivered for the park.

Commissioners generally agreed not to go into the high frequency radio system at this time.

The annual contribution to the Eastland Library was made in the amount of \$1,000, and dates set for the Annual Spring Cleanup are the first two weeks in April.

The important Civic Defense Ordinance was approved and will be put into effect here with Police Chief John Morren the CD Director.

It was agreed that the City Swimming Pool will not be opened this year unless a Certified Red Cross Supervisor can be secured to operate the pool.

In a discussion of a plan to build sidewalks along Sadosa and Madera Sts. in the Elementary School area, it was agreed that the city would pay half the cost of such construction if the school would agree to pay the other half.

A lengthy discussion was also held on methods which could be implemented which would induce those persons who are not presently within the city limits, to ask to be annexed to further help the city in its expanding and growing.

The Rev. Charles Whitton and Darrell Basham attended the meeting and requested annexation for the church camp on the west side of town. Survey data and field notes were presented.

Commissioners agreed to increase the salaries of some Social Security employees up to the new maximum limit.

## Farm Union Petitions Washington

Texas Farmers Union President, Jay Naman of Waco, has announced that petitions bearing the signatures of thousands of Texas farmers, Ranchers and rural community leaders are being mailed to the White House and key members of Congress.

The petitions request the cooperation of the Congress and the Administration to reinstate the Rural Environmental Assistance Program (REAP), the two percent REA loan funds, the emergency loan program of the Farmers Home Administration, and other rural program cuts.

Those receiving the petitions are Senators Lloyd Benson and John Tower of Texas, Senator Herman Talmadge of Georgia, Senate Agriculture Committee chairman, congressman W.R. Poage, Chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, other key congressmen; and the White House.

The farm organization spokesman emphasized that in a democracy many avenues of action are open for constructive change. Farmers union is exploring all avenues of action to secure the reinstatement of these vital rural programs which have been eliminated. We are joining other Farmers Union states in circulating petitions and will be participating with them on fly-ins

## Notice Given On Possible Peanut Program Changes

Formal notice has been given recently by the USDA in the Federal Register of plans to exercise three administrative measures to reduce peanut price support program costs on the 1973 crop -

1. To make a deduction from farmers stock peanuts to help defray costs of inspection, storage and handling. We assume this will be \$14.52 per ton since this is the figure that was used in the January 22 and 23 meeting of the Advisory Committee. This means that there would be a support price and a loan price. Growers would receive the loan price for their peanuts (support less \$14.52 per ton).

2. Eliminate price support on segregation No. 3 peanuts. This would mean that segregation peanuts (those with Aspergillus flavus mold) would be priced at

the level being paid by oil mills for peanuts from which is produced restricted meal. In other words, there would be no guaranteed price on No. 3 peanuts and the price received for such peanuts would be negotiable between the farmer and the crushing mill and

3. Eliminate the Shelled Purchase Program. This plan allows shellers to sell to CCC shelled peanuts of less than top quality at guaranteed prices. This change would probably mean that more farmers stock would go under loan since less would be purchased commercially by shellers in all probability. It would also mean that sheller incentive in participating in the Quality Control Program would likely be reduced. At present shellers are required to participate in the PAC (Quality) program in

order to be eligible to sell peanuts to CCC under the Purchase Program.

All interested persons are being given 30 days, until March 9, to file letters or briefs with USDA either supporting or opposing these items. USDA will make a decision within 30 days after March 9 or by April 9.

The Texas Peanut Producers Board, Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association, along with the Oklahoma peanut Commission and the Oklahoma peanut Growers Association are maintaining close contact with associations in other areas and the USDA in an effort to work out program alternatives aimed toward alleviating these restrictions.

## Fullerton To Speak To Texas Exes

Byron Fullerton, Freedom Foundations award winner, University of Texas law professor, and unsuccessful politician in his race for lieutenant governor in 1970, will be guest speaker for the U.T. ex-students annual meeting March 2.

Fullerton, known for his humor and wisdom, will address members of the three-county Oil Belt Texas Exes Club, meeting this year at the Derrick Restaurant in Breckenridge. Exes from Palo Pinto Eastland and Stephens Counties, who number 421 in all, will gather for the annual celebration held on Texas Independence Day each year.

Saul Pullman, Dewey Cox, and Scott Bailey are taking reservations for the event, with the first 125 being accepted. A visiting hour in the Wildcatter Club will precede the steak dinner and program in the restaurant. Both are located in the First National Tower Building.

Fullerton, associate dean and director of continuing legal education at the University of Texas law school, received national recognition in 1960 when he wrote and helped produce, "Trial by Jury, USA" for high school students. It was adopted as the nation wide program by the American Junior Bar and subsequently won a Freedom Foundations award in 1963.

Fullerton's primary duties at the University have included coordination of the Law School's statewide legal institutes and conferences, secretaryship of the Texas Law Review, and work with the Law School Foundation.

He is a former high school teacher, an assistant attorney

general of Texas, and has been in private practice in Austin. He was on leave from the law school during the 1970-71 fall semester while a candidate for lieutenant governor.

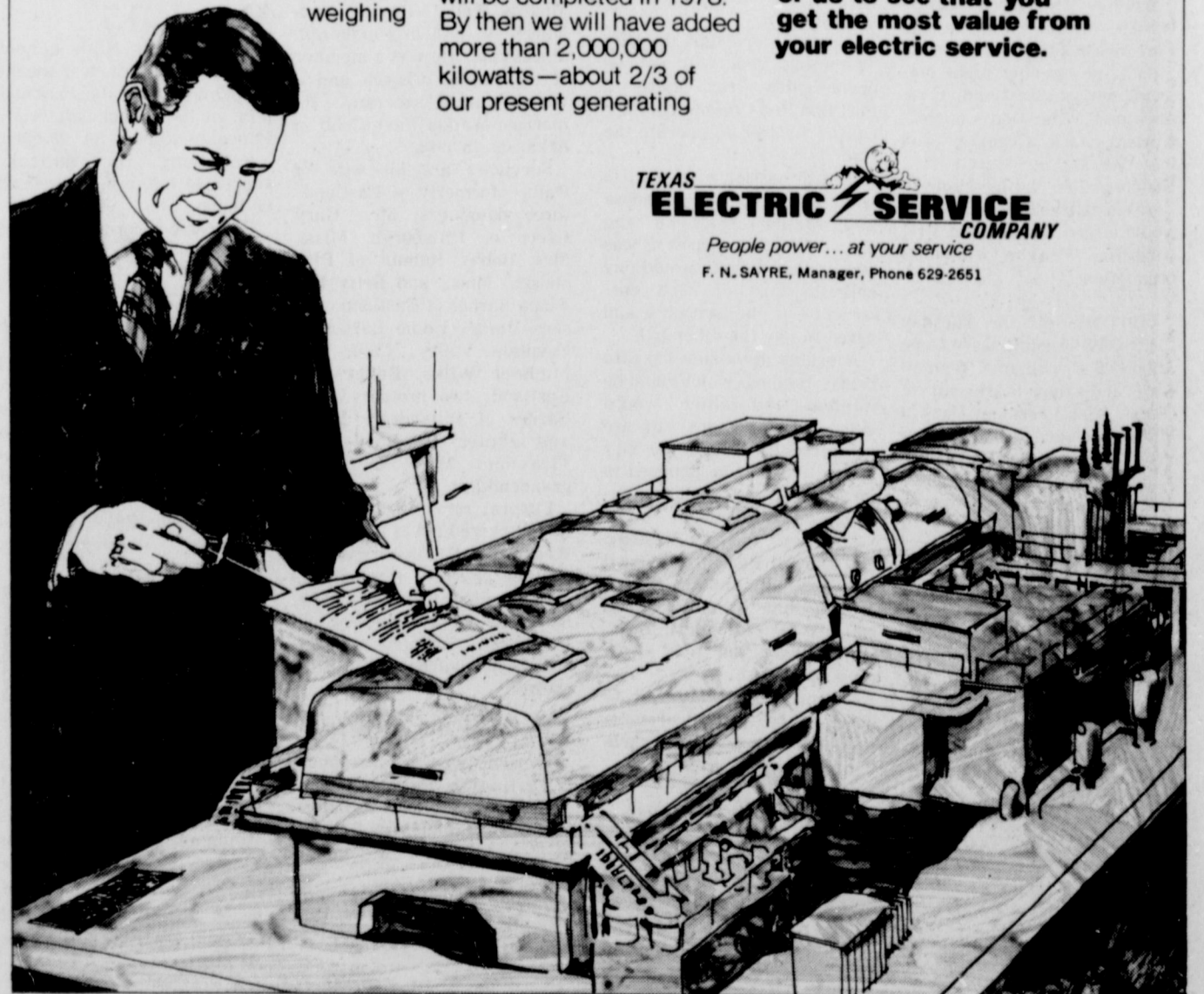

Why couldn't some of our lunchroom personnel go and observe some elementary menus in other schools? Jane Long School in Abilene, I understand, (Probably all Abilene Elementary Schools are about the same) have an excellent menu.

A school cafeteria isn't suppose to make a profit is it? Does ours?

Many mothers say they feel the same way about our lunch program.

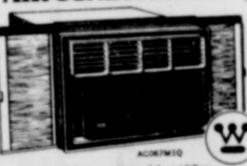

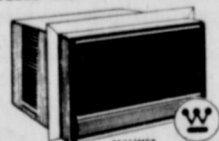

**Home Orchard, Garden Clinic Planned Feb. 27**

A Home Orchard and Vegetable Garden Clinic will be held on Tuesday, February 27 at the Texas Electric Reddy Room in Eastland. The meeting which will begin at 1:30 p.m. is open to the public announces county extension agents, Janet Thomas and De Gordon.

With the rising cost of food items, growing vegetables and fruit is one way to definitely lower the family's grocery bill. A large amount of garden space is not always required for vegetables which can be grown satisfactorily in small areas such as flower beds. Minigardens are very popular and only require containers such as clay pots, buckets, wooden boxes, or wire baskets for a family to have fresh vegetables.

The Home Orchard and Vegetable Garden Clinic will be most informative. Instructors for the Clinic will be Extension Service specialists from Texas A&M University.

The specialist will discuss varieties of fruit trees, their care, pruning, and insect control. All phases of vegetable gardening will be included in the Clinic with information on vegetable gardening sites, preparation of soil, fertilizing, when to plant, insect and disease control, and varieties of vegetables for good yield.

The Clinic will give everyone an opportunity to have their personal questions and problems answered. Also the county extension agent stated that homeowners with only two or three fruit trees in their yards would find the Clinic beneficial.

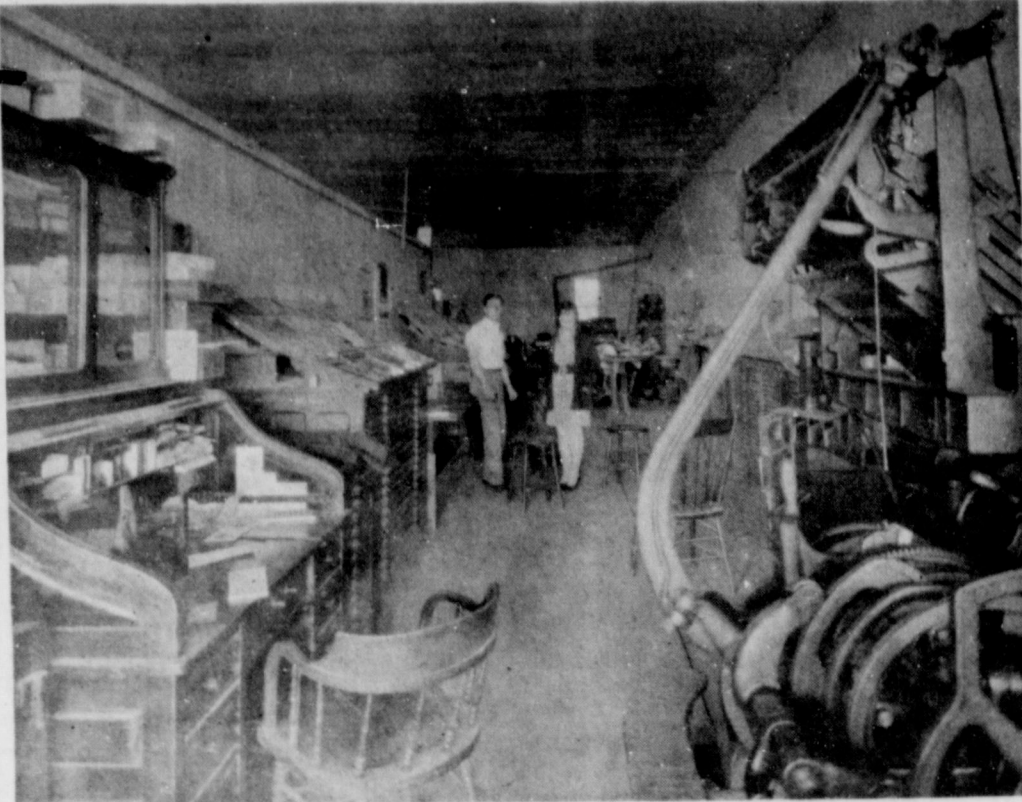

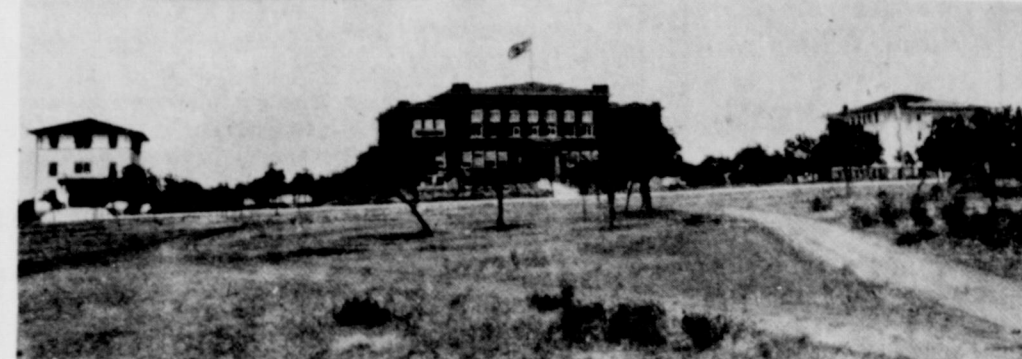
