

Long Awaited Insurance Plan Now Available In This Area

A new force to bolster the economic stability of the operates in Alabama. Florida. Texas peanut industry is now available to growers in Oklahoma. and Virginia. Comanche, Eastland, Erath, and Hood Counties.

Corporation (FCIC:, an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, is now offering a non- profit insurance plan designed to help prevent annual investment costs of peanut g rowers from being wiped out when excessive moisture, wind, frost, freeze, or any other unavoidable causes damage or destroy the crop.

A temporary office where interested growers may obtain information and apply for the peanut insurance has been established at the Old SWPGA Office Building in Gorman, Texas.

Federap Crop Insurance representatives will be on hand to provide complete information and take applications weekdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Ben A. Jordan, Jr., Director of the Contract Service Center of Texas, Oklahoma, and Ne Mexico for FCIC with offices at College Station, will be administrator of the new program. He advises growers to contact the Gorman office immediately if interested in the insurance plan.

Federal Crop Insurance is a voluntary, self- help service offering growers protection on their annual crop investments. It is a cooperative program which helps peanut growers take a businesslike approach to the problem of protecting their capital investments. their credit, and their community economic strength. Centennial Fund Passes \$9.000 Mark

The 150th birthday of the Texas Rangers will cluminate in dedication of the Texas Ranger Hall of Fame in theautumn of 1973 at Waco.

Governors from throughout the United States and foreign dignitaries willbe present for the occasion, according to Clint Peoples, Senior Ranger Captain and chairman of the executive committee of the **Texas Ranger Commemorative** Commission.

The Commission was created by the Texas Legislature for the express purpose of ramrodding appropriate celebration of the occasion.

On Tuesday, february 20, banks throughout Texas will begin selling the official commemorative medal which is available in either oxidized bronze or .999 fine slilver.

Obverse of the medal bears the portrait of Ranger Captain eander H. McNelly from the original painting by Joe Ruiz Grandee which hangs in the White House. The reverse shows the Lone Star of Texas as it appears on the seal of state.

Proceeds from the sale will fund operating costs of the Texas Ranger Hall of Fame. Besides the two medals and a sterling silver commemorative plate produced by W.N.W. Mint Industries of Amarillo, daisy Air Rifle, Winchester and Smith & Wesson will have special Texas Ranger weapons on sale. There will also be a special issue of Bowie knives and tomahawks.

Melvin Warren has already made a special anniversary casting of his classic "Rangers on Patrol", a bronze sculpture of two mounted Rangers with pack animal. Artist Jack White will have a limited edition of his four Texas Ranger Captain protraits in the original black and gold "echruseo", and a special edition of the ever popular Texas Ranger bronze statue "The Authority" is also scheduled for production.





Precinct Lines To Be Re-drawn

Eastland County commissioners have agreed to redraw the county's precinct lines.

At the regular meeting of the county commissioners court Monday, the court heard a report from a special committee that had previously been appointed by the court to look into the possibility of redrawing the coun ty's precinct lines.

County Judge Scott Bailey said Wednesday that the eight member committee submitted a report recommending that

the court redraw the precinct lines so that Eastland, Morton plan. Valley and area approximately five miles west, five miles south and four miles east of Eastland would be in Precint 1; Ranger, Olden, Lake Leon and desdemona in Precinct 2; Rising Star, Carbon and Gorman in Precinct 3; and Cisco remaining in Precinct 4.

Upon presentation of the plan committee member Graydon Baze of Gorman, committee member Harry Sone of ising Star made the

motion that the court adopt the Somne's motion was seconded by committee member Mrs. Audie Wagley of Cisco. Bailey said the vote was unanimous.

Bailey also said that the commissioners court has asked Buddy Haun, resident engineer in Eastland for the Texas Highway Dept. to measure the number of miles of countymaintained dirt roads in the present precinct arrangement to see if the total number of miles perpprecinct will compare favorably with the

proposed new setup

Bailey said, it is to determine if the present apportionment of money in each precinct's road and bridge fund is equitable.







Agriculture Department News

Central Texas tarmers may be losing at least a million dollars annually from seedling and ground diseases infesting over half of the 136,000 acres in peanuts, according to john C. White, Commissioner of the Department of Texas Agriculture.

Fifty nine peanut farmers in Comanche, Eastland, Erath, Brown, and Callahan Counties participated in a survey conducted by the Texas Department of Agriculture to determine the amount of acreage affected by diseases and the types of diseases prevalent in the five- county area.

Farmers reported that 57 percent of peanut acreage has a disease problem. Because of good weather at harvest time there was a slight decrease in the percentage of irrigated acreage with diseases, but the figures still show that 67 percent were infested. The dry land acreage having ground diseases increase d from 26 percent in 1971 to 33 percent in 1972.

Southern blight and pod rot proved to be the most widespread diseases, affecting 75percent of the acreage reported. Both increased from five to ten percent in 1972.

Rhizoctonia decreased from 31 percent to 25 percent in 1972. Fusarium, although minor in total percentage, rose from 4 percent to 8 percent in 1972. Commissioner White stated, "Results from a field trial conducted by the Department's De leon Peanut Research Laboratory showed that 13 percent of 'ne seedling peanut plants had died by the time they were forty- one days old, mainly because of the seedling disease rhizoctonia. By the end of the trial, 49 percent of the plants had died from southern blight ar : yod rot.'

One · ae main problems in curtai ug the infestations is in . idenciying them and finding a means to control the diseases that will be effective, yet will not damage the environment. About 18 percent of the farmers reported ground diseases but couldn't identify them. Only two are visible without laboratory equipment.


