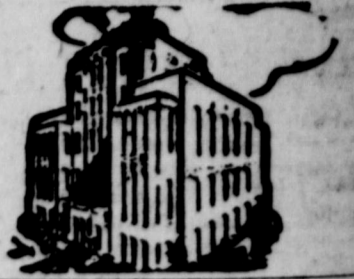

Eastland County continues to set a hot pace in the District 16 U. S. Savings Bonds race. During April Eastland County sales totaled \$78,970, pushing the county's total sales for the year to \$305,697, or 60.3 percent of the 1958 goal of \$507,000.

Winning pitcher was Gary Graham and the loser was Larry Houle. Clifford Thomas was the winning Lion pitcher in a relief roll. The loser was Thornell.

The Lions hammered home three runs in the first frame, four in the second, six in the third and two more in the fifth to leave the Dogs in their wake.

Saturday night's make-up games saw the Comets beat the Medics, 15-10, and the Lions edge the Bulldogs, 6-5.

Winner for the Comets was J. Houle and the loser was Terry Trendwell. The Medics scored six runs in the fifth inning to narrow the Comet lead to three runs, but the Comets got two more runs in the sixth, then held the Medics scoreless in the bottom half of the inning.

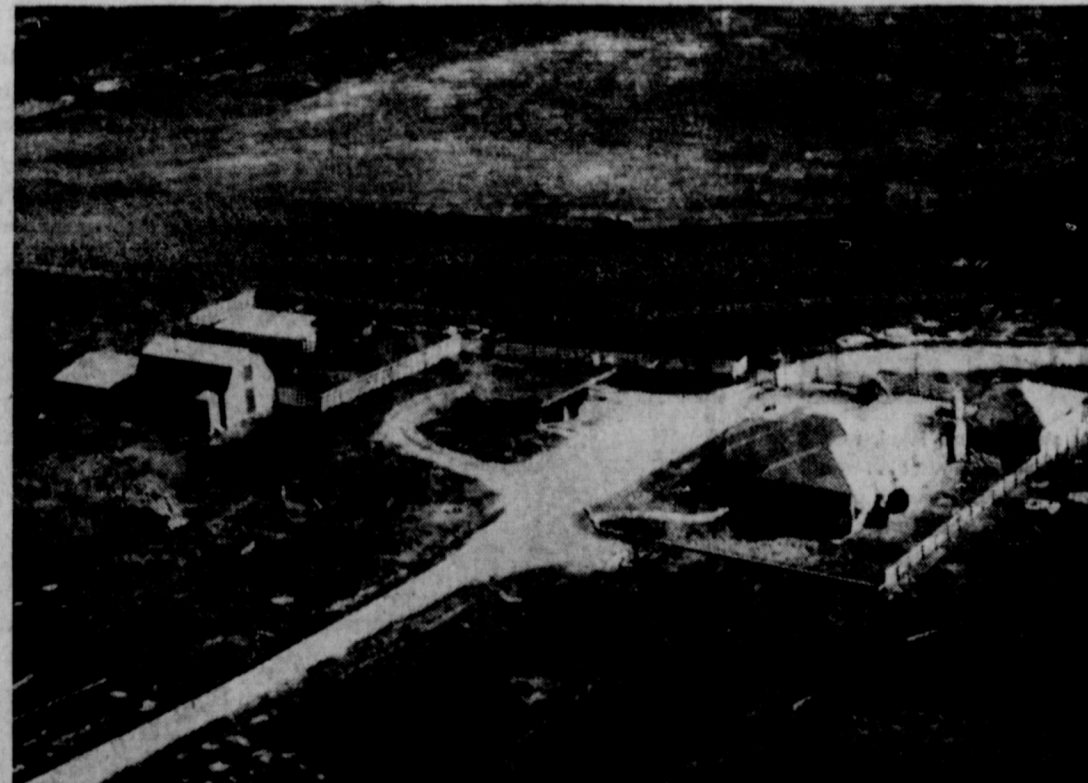
Jack Pockrus Dies Tuesday

the donors and issue the membership cards which will be received at that time. Blood contribution cannot be accepted by this bank from persons who have had jaundice, tuberculosis, syphilis, virus infections, malaria or other tropical fevers.

"Yes, there is a growing need for blood and until we recognize and meet that need lives will be lost every day of every year," Mrs. Fulley said. "Perhaps your life or that of someone dear and near to you may one day be among those in peril. Remember, those who care share."

Elmo V. Cook Receives Award

Elmo V. Cook, former county agent, was among the 26 federal, state and county extension workers to receive the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Superior Service Award in Washington, D. C. today. This is one of the highest honors the Department can bestow upon its employees.

The awards were made in ceremonies at the Sylvan Theatre on the Washington Monument Grounds. The presentations were made by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson. Cook's citation read — "For keeping farm and ranch families abreast of new agricultural developments for 28 years; for helping people recognize and solve their problems and for training other extension workers."

The award winner is a native of Mitchell county; a graduate of Colorado City High School and Texas A & M College and an employee of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service since June 1, 1929. He has served successively as county agent in Bosque, Runnels, Eastland, Taylor and Travis counties and for two years prior to his first appointment, taught vocational agriculture at Coleman.

His superior achievements were listed as the training of more than 2,800 different 4-H club members and 20 assistant county agents who now are leaders in many different fields; major improvements in farming practices, particularly in (Continued on Page Two)

The Texas State Treasury lists total cash in all State Funds as of March 31, 1958 at \$234,447,847.95.

The State Highway Funds runs the largest single fund balance with \$71,706,294.01.

County and Road District Fund runs \$7,041,012.13.

Highway Motor Fuel Fund runs \$13,551,685.39.

The total amount for Highways and Roads funds runs well over \$2 million. February balance was over \$8 million. Debits and credits for March ran respectively approximately \$38 million and \$43 million.

Besides the General Revenue, Confederate Pension, State Old Age Assistance, State Disabled Assistance, State Blind Assistance, and State Children Assistance, there are more than 180 other State Funds.
