City Manager James Young has also announced that there will be free parking in Eastland all day long Sat-urday. All parking meters will be covered up that day. Employees and owners of stores were urged not to park on the square, however, so that there will be as many parking spaces available as possible.

Most downtown stores have completed their Christ-mas decorating and others are still in the process. With a record peanut crop already assured, Christmas shopping is expected to be extra heavy this year.

H. J. Tanner, chamber of commerce manager, reminded area shoppers that most Eastland stores are giving away valuable tickets during the Yule season. On Saturday, Dec. 27, \$100 in cash prizes will be given

Santa's visit Saturday will be the first of three pre-Christmas stopovers in Eastland. He will return again the following two Saturdays, bringing a sack full of candy each trip.

Downtown Christmas lights were turned on here Thanksgiving night. The special lighting, plus numerous attractive window displays, have attracted window ping hours.

In predicting the best shopping season in eight years, Tanner pointed to healthy crop reports and the number of new businesses which have recently opened here. He said that more than 700 persons registered at the recent opening of Harelik's department store in one day. "That should prove that the potential is certainly here this year," he declared.

Eastland stores, which are heavily stocked, are stressing the slogan, "If it is worth buying, you can buy it in Eastland."






