Absentee Voting To End Tuesday In 2nd Primary

Some 40 persons have voted in the second Democratic primary, and absentee voting will end Tuesday.

Little interest in the run-off election has been shown in Eastland County, except in Cisco and Gorman, where there are run-off races for county commissioners posts. Most of the interest seems to be in Cisco, where the race between Clifford R. Pippen and Carl Lamb for the Precinct 4 seat is termed a toss-up. The two men gained run-off berths in a six-man race in the first primary. They seek the position now held by J. E. McCannles, who did not seek re-election.

In Precinct 2, E. M. Bennett, the incumbent, is opposed by A. M. Thurman. Bennett lacked just two votes having a clear majority over two opponents in the first primary.

The only contest which local citizens will vote on is the State Supreme Court race. Robert W. Hamilton faces J. Edwin Smith for Place 1. Hamilton led the ticket in the first primary and carried Eastland County 3360 votes to just 977 for Smith. He didn't get a majority over the state, however.

The local sponsoring organizations have a contract signed by Durham saying the game could not be cancelled unless both parties agreed.

Eastland Man Killed In Blasting Mishap

Paul Reed Dies In Route To Hospital

A twenty-two year old Eastland man died while being rushed to a Fort Worth hospital Friday, after he was struck in the head by a rock in a dynamite mishap near Gorman.

Dead is Paul Reed, a resident of Eastland for 19 years. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Reed, 608 S. Halbrook, Eastland.

Reed, an employe of Norge Construction Co., on the highway construction job between Gorman and Duster took shelter under machinery about 500 yards from where a rock abutment was being blasted. Other workmen, who took shelter under the same machinery, were uninjured.

Fellow workers said Reed apparently raised his head too soon and was struck by a large flying rock.

The injured man was rushed to a Gorman Hospital and almost immediately transferred to St. Joseph's Hospital in Fort Worth. He was pronounced dead upon arrival at the Fort Worth hospital.

Workers at the scene said that the blast which killed Reed was to have been the last charge of the day.

TWO INTERCHANGES Highway Bid Opening Set

Contract for construction of Interstate 20 (Highway 80) about seven and one-half miles east of Ranger to the Erath County line, will be let in Austin this Tuesday.

Bids will be opened by the State Highway Department. Specifications for the work have been set by the department and the Federal Government.

Two interchanges and six bridges are planned for the 3.7 miles of highway, according to an announcement from Gordon Smith, resident engineer.

Smith said the job would run over one million dollars, and would rank as one of the largest in the county. According to plans, one of the interchanges will be 200 feet long and the other 190 feet. They will be located overlapping State Highway 16 and the "Old Tudor Road" between Strawn and Desdemona.

A four-lane asphalt and concrete expressway, with frontage roads on sections and two grade separations, will be included in the project.

The job is expected to require 277 working days about 200,000 yards of base material a day, and

250,000 yards of earth work (grading), Smith said.

Building of the highway will probably start in July of 1960. The program is part of a network of interstate routes over the nation, financed by the Federal Government and states through which the highways are routed.

County School Board Announces Six Appointments

Six persons have been secured by the Eastland County School Board to work with county schools during the coming year. Dr. P. M. Kaykendall, Board chairman, announced today.

Upon the recommendation of B. R. Garrett, county school superintendent, the following have been hired: Mrs. Fiara Canon, assistant superintendent; James L. Hughes, supervisor; O. L. Samsay, supervisor; Mrs. Dahlia D. Steele, librarian; Royal Jack White, itinerant teacher; and Mrs. I. R. Arther, school nurse.

Peanut Crop Needs Rain

Eastland County's number one cash crop—peanuts—needs rain and it needs it now.

Boomed as a bumper crop just a few weeks ago, the county's crop of some 30,000 acres is now in serious need of water, farmers in the area agree.

Only 46 of an inch of rain has fallen this month, and many parts of the county haven't received even a trace. Temperatures in the last few days have climbed as high as 102 degrees officially, and unofficial reading have ranged as high as 108 degrees.

According to The Gorman Progress, there have been some reports that peanuts are already drying up in some areas, without filling out properly.

Peanuts, as late as Aug. 1 were looking exceptionally good throughout the area. Most farmers still agree that they could make an outstanding crop if they could get (Continued on Page Two)

three hours on any school day. All work must also be performed between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

With the opening of schools close at hand in Texas, farmers were reminded today that the Fair Labor Standards Act prohibits the employment of children under 16 years of age on farms during school hours.

The reminder was issued in Dallas by Regional Director William J. Rogers of the U. S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour Division, the agency which administers the law.

"The Federal child-labor law is designed to keep children under 16 off the farm and thereby permit them to continue their schooling," Mr. Rogers said. He pointed out that the law applies to both local youngsters and children of migratory workers.

The only exception to the law, he said, is for the farmer's own child working on his parents' farm.

"Children under 16 may lawfully work on farms before and after school hours and on weekends or holidays," he said, "but stiff penalties for willful violations can make the employment of children during school hours expensive."

Rogers also stated the Farmers can protect themselves from unintentional violation by requiring an age certificate from youngsters to make sure they are old enough for the job. In Texas, these certificates may be obtained as a public service from the Texas Employment Commission.

Farmers Can Save \$112 Million

Farmers could save themselves and the nation over \$112,000,000 a year if they would inaugurate a vaccination program against a cattle and swine disease known as leptospirosis, the American Foundation for Animal Health suggested today.

The disease causes premature births of calves and pigs. In recent years, however, vaccines have been developed which will prevent it, and a vaccination campaign is now being urged on a nationwide scale.

In calves, leptospirosis usually causes fever, prostration, labored breathing and jaundice, with death losses reaching considerable proportions. It also can cause a sharp drop in milk production among dairy cattle.

The disease is especially serious as a breeding hazard for swine, and infected animals may be spreaders or carriers for many months.

"We are foolish to confront one hundred million dollars in losses from a cause like this, when we now have a tool which will save us that huge toll," the Foundation said. "Systematic vaccination will pay great dividends to the farmer, and to the nation's economy as well."

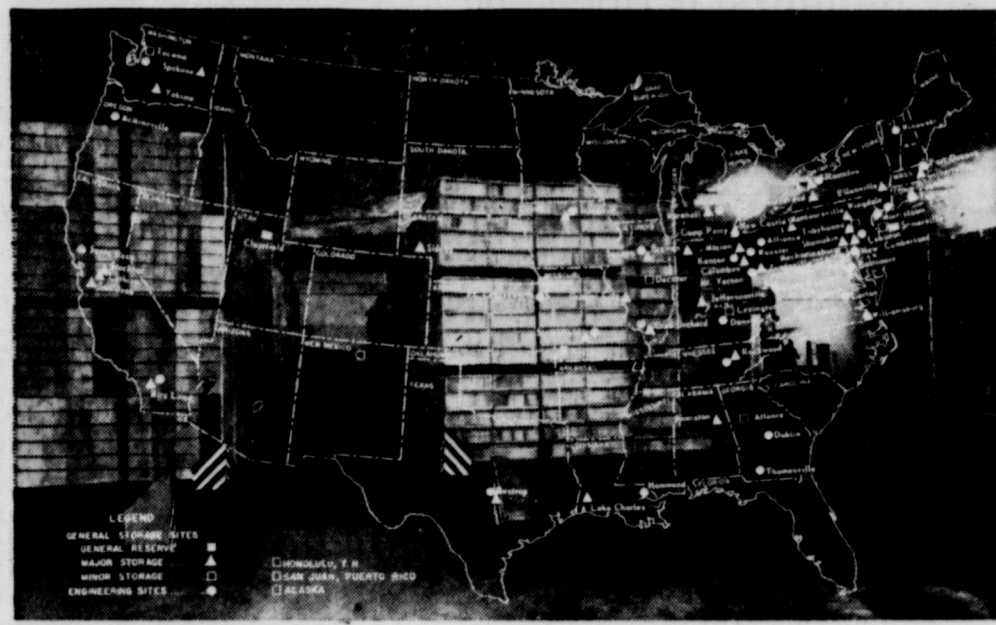

- A good question to ask then is: How can a wholesaler print and distribute thousands of catalogues to individual consumers, stand the cost of each sales transaction and still sell at "wholesale" prices?

The answer is: He can't. He is mis-using the word "wholesale."

By actual comparison, the cost of some merchandise listed in such catalogues is even higher than that charged for comparable items by the retailer.

CAUTION - CHECK THE PRICES IN THE "Wholesale" Catalogue YOU MAY SAVE MONEY!
