



## **Texas Farmers Have Slightly Higher Income**

Texas farmers' cash income for the first seven months of 1954 was slightly higher than the same 1953 period, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.


Total farm cash income through July was \$798,100,000, a rise of \$67,320, or 1 per cent, over 1953. Cash return on commodities re-

mained fairly stable. Income from some crops increased significantly Cotton income was up 35 per cent over 1953 figures. Peanuts in come jumped 94 per cent. Apperciable gains also were made in grain sorghums, which climbed 12 per cent, and flaxseed, which edged upward 5 per cent.

Prices received in July by Texas farmers changed little from June levels. Minor gains in some commodities ofsfet loses in others. July prices were 5 per cent below July, 1953.

ALMOST everyone likes hamburgers. And they taste even better with these easy-to-prepare special relishes.

> Mayonnaise Pickle Relish # (Makes 1 cup)

One-half cup mayonnaise or salad dressing, <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup sweet pickle relish, 2 teaspoons grated onion, freshly ground pepper to taste. In a small bowl or a jar, combine mayonnaise or salad dressing with remaining ingredients; blend well. Cover and keep in the refrigerator until time to serve with hamburgers.

#### **Mustard Mayonnaise** \* (Makes 1 cup)

One-half cup mayonnaise or salad dressing, ½ cup prepared mustard, 1 tablespoon prepared horseradish. In a small bowl or a jar, combine mayonnaise or salad dressing

with remaining ingredients; blend well. Cover and keep in the refrigerator until time to serve with hamburgers.

> Catch-a-Fellow Salad (Serves 6)

Six hard-cooked eggs, chopped; 1/2 cup finely chopped celery, 1/2 cup finely chopped pimento, 2 tablespoons chopped, green onion; 1 teaspoon prepared mustard, ½ cup mayonnaise or salad dressing, 6 large tomatoes, salt and pepper to taste, crisp salad greens.

In a bowl, combine eggs, celery, pimento, onion, mustard and
