Every sensible person knows that his savings should increase along with his earnings, until his financial resources are sufficient to insure him against loss of employment, decreased earning power and old age.

But it is hard to teach people that actual security yields more pleasure in life than spending. The great majority regard present pleasures as more desirable than future comfort.

BOB BURDETT TO HIS SON

My son, remember you have to work. Whether you handle a pick or shovel or a set of books, digging ditches or editing a newspaper, ringing an auction bell or writing funny things, you must work.

THE WORLD SERIES

It is the World Series, that unique American institution which annually grasps the minds of men, allowing them to do little work while such a momentous thing hangs in the balance.

The World Series is more than an American institution. It is a state of mind, peculiar to the western world. No where else on the face of the earth, could you get millions of men to neglect their business, to jostle around in a crowd, brave possible rains and scorching sun to find out whether or not Babe Ruth got a walk or a home-run.

Can you imagine millions of Frenchmen excited over a world series baseball game? They'd shrug their shoulders, retire to a sidewalk cafe and over their wine glasses calmly await their newspaper—if interested at all.

Picture, if you can millions of Englishmen heated up over whether Grover Alexander struck out Tony Lazzeri in the ninth with the bases loaded two down and with two strikes and three balls? Cricket? Yes, but baseball never!

But this annual hysteria of America is a healthful indication. Healthful in that with all his supposed penchant for pursuing the silver dollar, the American at heart is a sport loving, square-shooting, hero worshipping, rabid baseball fan.

Men are but boys grown tall, the click of the bat on horsehide still has its appeal. It takes the mind of man from his business cares, puts him back on the sand-lot and for the moment he is Babe, frowning ferociously, and as the pitcher winds up and lets go a fast one, he steps into it, the ash connects with the ball which drops over the right field fence, the runners on the loaded bases trot in home, and Mr. American, in imagination, smilingly doffs his hat to the applauding thousands as he crosses the home plate.

Its a peculiar American malady—physicians might diagnose it as "world seriesitis," but it's the surest sign that God's in his heaven, all's right with America.

ON LEADERSHIP

Governor Smith made these salient points in his speech in St. Paul:

Aside from his constitutional duties in connection with the operation of the Government, my idea of the President's position is that of a leader of thought of the American people. And if I were asked today what, in my opinion, was the fundamental weakness of the last two Republican Administrations, I would be compelled to say it was the lack of such leadership.

It would have been impossible for me to have secured the governmental reforms that I fought for in the State of New York unless I carried the problems directly to the people themselves.

I am never embarrassed talking on any public question. If there is any embarrassment, according to the record of the Republican Party and the Republican candidate (on inland waterways), they are suffering from it and not I.

Again I declare that what is needed is action. What is needed is leadership. What is needed in the disposition on the part of the responsible authority to carry these promises (of inland waterway development) into effect. They cannot be dragged from the moth bag every four years and offered as vote getters to the American people.

The whisperers would have the people believe that I favor the letting down of the restricting bars and an opening of the flood gates that immigration may pour into the country. Nothing could be further from the truth.

The American farmer asks no bounty. He asks no charity and no financial assistance from the Government. He asks that the Republican promise of putting his business on an economic equality with industry be carried out.

The Republican candidate in his speeches to date has developed no constructive plan (of farm relief).

ALL OVER THE WORLD

No annual report carries as much interest to those who see in the progress of the humanities the greatest hope for making international peace a real fact than that of the Rockefeller Foundation. And no institution born in this country has done as much to convince people—yellow, black and tan, as well as white—that America can be unselfish.

The world is familiar now with the International Health Division, through which an organization adequately financed and manned helps Government to develop and strengthen their own health work. Yet each recurring report of the Foundation contributes amazing information to the progress of the work. May concluded the second year of the West African Yellow Fever Commission. Now the lessons learned in Cuba under Walter Reed are to help clear the scourge from the Gold Coast. American malaria is coming in for an intensive study designed to root it out. The foundation has its agents at work on the hookworm at points as far apart as Egypt and Jamaica.

It is far too extended a story to dig out of the report itself. And it is a story that involves sacrifice on part of the personnel as well as organization on the part of the foundation. But it is a fascinating account of the never-ending struggle to end disease and to bring the happiness of health to a troubled world.—Dallas News.

Senator Sheppard makes by elimination a clear definition of legitimate reasons for opposing the Democratic nominee when he says: "To refuse such a man support because he has personal views opposed to prohibition is to take a position subversive of the country's welfare. To refuse such a man support because of his religion would be to follow a course absolutely foreign to the spirit of America."—Fort Worth Star Telegram.
