All of the baked products entered will be sold. The judges of the Bake Sale will be Mrs. Sue Day and Miss Martha Graves, both of

The rules for the Bake Show are

1. There shall be six divisions of products with a requirement for each:

Pies-must enter one whole pie Cakes-must enter one whole Candy-must enter at least 6

pieces Cookies-must enter at least 6

Nut Bread-must enter at least one loaf Salted Nuts-one cup

2. All entries must contain pecans. this county or adjoining county

may enter products in this show. 4. All entries must be entered and in place by 11 a.m. when the judging will begin (Dec.11). 5. Judges will be trained home

6. Score cards will be used to judge entries in all six divisions and cash prizes and ribbons award-

Ferguson pointed out that farm ers electing to take Plan B must register their choice at the county ASC office. If the referendum on December 15 favors marketing quotas for the 1960 upland erop, farmers have until March 16, 1960 to register for Plan B.

If the operator intends to grow his cotton under Plan A, no action need be taken. But, Ferguson said failure to elect Plan B will autoon the farm for 1960.
