The Baptist people in Texas are certainly to be congratulated for their good judgement in selecting J. C. Allison as their father of the year among Texas Baptists. In naming Allison to this honor the Baptists have honored one of the best men among all the men in their denomination in the entire country as well as giving a little honor to West Texas.

Mr. Allison brought honor to himself, his family, his town, his state, his country and his church.

He's a good citizen, the kind we could use more of.

Now if we Methodists could do as well for ourselves as the Baptists have done for themselves, Eastland will again be honored.

We Methodist don't, as far as I know, come up with a father of the year each Father's Day but we've got a magazine up at Chicago called "Together" that is looking for the typical Methodist family of the year. The First Methodist Church of Eastland has nominated the Henry Van Geem family for the typical family of the church. I think that's a good selection, but there are some people who think I'm biased or Henry and his family. In the last year of coaching at Texas A and M, a sports writer asked Ol' Bear Bryant what he thought about John Crow's chances of getting the Heisman Trophy for the best football player in collegiate circles for the year.

The Ol' Bear replied that if Ol' John Crow didn't get that award they might as well quit giving it.

I feel the same way about Henry Van Geem's bunch and the typical Methodist family-of-the-year award. If they don't get it, I want to go on record right now in saying that the Methodist publication "Together" might just as well quit giving it at not. If the Van Geems don't get it I am going to be very suspect of the award's being on the level.

He got a tape recorder and had the boys sing three or four of their best songs into the tape recorder. He sensed there was something wrong with the musical results of our quartets singing but he could not put his finger on it.

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## Carl Johnson Dies Last Night In Sleep

Carl Johnson, prominent Eastland business and president of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, died in his sleep last night, apparently of a heart attack.

Mr. Johnson, who owned and operated Carl Johnson's Dry Goods store on the north side of the square, had been in business in Eastland some 25 years. He was active in many phases of community life in Eastland, and is immediate past president of the Lake Leon Country Club.

Death came at approximately midnight for Mr. Johnson, but his wife realized he was dead only when she tried to arouse him this morning.

Funeral services were still pending at pretime today. Mr. Johnson is survived by his wife, a daughter, Mrs. John Beatty of Fort Worth; and two grandchildren.

Mr. Johnson, in his early 50's at the time of his death, came to Eastland in about 1921. He operated the Kileman store here for several years before going into business for himself.

He was a longtime member of the Eastland Voluntary Fire Department and had held almost every office in the Chamber of Commerce.

## Next Homecoming to Be Bigger--Golden

"Our 1960 Homecoming will be even bigger and better than the one we had in 1957," Jim Golden, president of the Eastland High School Alumni Association said today. Golden said his organization is now readying plans for the giant 1960 undertaking that will make the "biggest homecoming held in 1957" look like a family picnic.

His organization has completed its staff by electing a full set of officers to plan the Homecoming. L. E. (Gene) Harrison 2416 Salerno Drive, Dallas, is vice-president; Miss Norma F. Vickers, Eastland, secretary; and Russell Hill, Eastland, treasurer.

On the backs of these people will fall the job of master-minding the 1960 Homecoming. All of these people were connected in one way or another with the first Eastland Homecoming and that experience will be helpful in planning the 1960 Homecoming, Golden said.

"We had so many people to register last year that our registration system broke down," Golden said. "The girls working on the registration desk simply wore themselves out and gave up before noon the Saturday of the Homecoming. And that evening at the barbecue we ran completely out of food and had to hire the assistance of four grocery stores. Many of our people went to local restaurants and drive-ins for supper, giving up trying to get into the City Park for the giant barbecue."

"This time, we'll know more about what to do with such a big crowd on our hands. There will be plenty of good food for all this time."

Golden said the 1960 Homecoming will be held the week preceding the second Saturday in June. The big days of the event will be June 9, 10 and 11, 1960. The first event was the case with the 1957 event, will be the Homecoming Golf Tournament and the Homecoming itself will reach a climax June 11. A huge entertainment program will be staged in City Park as well as a giant barbecue, Saturday, June 11th. Plans for the big party are still under way and will not be announced until they have been

## Nine Hurt In Five Weekend Accidents

Five separate Eastland County accidents injured nine persons and caused thousands of dollars worth of property damage over the weekend.

One of the accidents occurred Sunday, three Saturday and one Friday.

Six persons were injured in a three-car pile-up in Carbon Saturday afternoon, and three others injured in a head-on collision north of Eastland on Highway 6 Saturday afternoon.

Injured in the Carbon accident were Arnold B. Boswell, 34, of Alpine, Calif.; Charles Wayne Arledge, 23, of Colorado City; Ruby Lee Dickie, 13, of De Leon; Jo Ann Boswell, 10, of Alpine; Debra Jean Boswell, 3, of Alpine; and Dave Ruth Boswell, 27, of Alpine.

Two prominent Eastland businessmen, Hood King and Curtis Keen, were injured in the wreck north of Eastland. A third in-Wilford Lee Treadway of Breckenridge. None of the injuries were serious.

The rash of accidents started Friday afternoon at 12:15, when a 1956 Oldsmobile—driven by Nellie S. Horton of Orange—and a 1948 Ford pickup—driven by Bobbie Joy Brown of Cross Plains—collided eight miles west of Rising Star on State Highway 36.

No one was injured in the crash, but property damage to the Olds was estimated at \$400, and damages of \$75 were incurred by the pick-up. The Oldsmobile was traveling west on Highway 36 and the pick-up was going south on a side road. The brakes on the pick-up failed, according to Highway Patrolman Al White, who investigated.

The second mishap took place at 4:05 p.m. Saturday. A 1957 Olds, driven by Charles Wayne

## Treasurer's Office Sought By SCS Unit

Eastland County Commissioners Monday were officially asked to turn over the office now used by the County Treasurer to the Upper Leon Soil Conservation Work unit. At the same meeting, Commissioners received the petition sent to them by Joe McNeely of the Kokomo community which asked that the paving project across Lake Leon dam not be pushed in front of other county road improvements.

The Commissioners took no action on either the requests for the office space or the petition, but did announce they would reach a decision on the office move at their next regularly scheduled meeting, July 14th.

The request for new office space for the SCS unit was made by representatives of the county AFC Committee and the Upper Leon Soil Conservation Committee.

F. E. Blackwell served as spokesman for the group. He pointed out that the ASC and SCS have shared office space since 1951. He told Commissioners that the ASC now need all the office space, and that the SCS unit must have a new office.

The County Treasurer's office is next door to the ASC office, and the convenience of having the two offices close together, so that 1700 farmers in the district can be better served, was stressed.

E. E. McAlister, who heads the SCS work unit, said that the ASC office now has equipment stored in the hall which should be in use. He said that there was no other answer for the SCS but to seek new office space. McAlister told the Court he now has about a third of the space he needs.

Commissioners were told that the ASC and SCS offices were so closely related that they should be in the same office if possible. Blackwell declared farmers would be greatly inconvenienced if the SCS office was forced to relocate in another section of Eastland.

Commissioner J. B. (Tip) Arther was not present at the meeting. He is on his vacation. That prompted Commissioner Carter of Rising Star to say that the Commission would have to wait until their next meeting to act.

All Commissioners present, and County Judge John Hart, said they realized the problem faced by the SCS, and would do everything possible to work something out.

All commissioners apparently had read the petition submitted to them by McNeely. The petition opposing the immediate

building of a paved farm-market road over Lake Leon dam, was signed only by McNeely, but the writer claimed that Kokomo farmers opposed the four mile stretch of highway which would complete a hard surface road around the lake.

Commissioners didn't discuss the petition, except to acknowledge receiving it.

## Little League Zone Tourney Dates Are Set

Cisco, will host this year's Area 6-B Little League tournament July 14-15, with teams from Eastland, Ranger, Clyde and Cisco participating, it was announced today following an Area meeting Sunday in Graham.

Area 6 was divided into four zones for the playoffs. Zone A will have teams from Wichita Falls, Iowa Park, Seymour and Haskell and will be played in Seymour.

Zone C will have teams from Olney, Graham, Breckenridge and Albany, and the playoffs will be in Graham.

Teams competing in the Zone D tournament in Brownwood will be from Coleman and the two Brown leagues.

Winners of each of the Zone tournaments will class in Graham July 17-18 in the District tournament.

In the Zone B tourney, Ranger will play Cisco in first round play and Clyde will test Eastland. Winners of the games will meet for the championship.

Attending the meeting from Eastland were James Wright and J. T. Gregory.

## Olden Citizens Favor Increase In Tax 80 to 26

Olden citizens Saturday voted in favor of increasing the Olden Independent School District maintenance and bond tax rate from \$1.25 to \$1.50.

The higher tax rates were needed to meet the new state regulations in regard to the number of teachers and subjects offered. The School Board plans to offer Chemistry and Physics after equipping a science laboratory will also be funds. More teachers will also be added to meet the minimum requirements demanded by the Texas Education Agency.

Mead told officers he came upon a 1946 pickup driven by Thoma Duane Sadberry of Route 4, Cisco, from behind and had to hit his brakes to avoid a collision. Sadberry was attempting a left hand turn at a slow rate of speed at the time.

Highway Patrolman White said the accidents pushed the county's total up to 14 for the year.

## Eastland Gets 2.40 Inches of Rain In Hour

Eastland got its heaviest rain of the year Sunday when an official 2.42 inches fell.

The rainfall pushed the total for the month up to 4.33 inches, or 1.87 inches above normal. The total for the year now stands at 15.19, which puts the rainfall for the first six months at 1.34 inches above normal.

Sunday's rain came in one hour. It left city streets running with water and sent water over the top of the Eastland Lake spillway. The rainfall is expected to re-fill Lake Leon.

Crop damage was light, and farmers said the rain would be of more benefit than harm. The rain was lighter in the south part of the county than it was here.

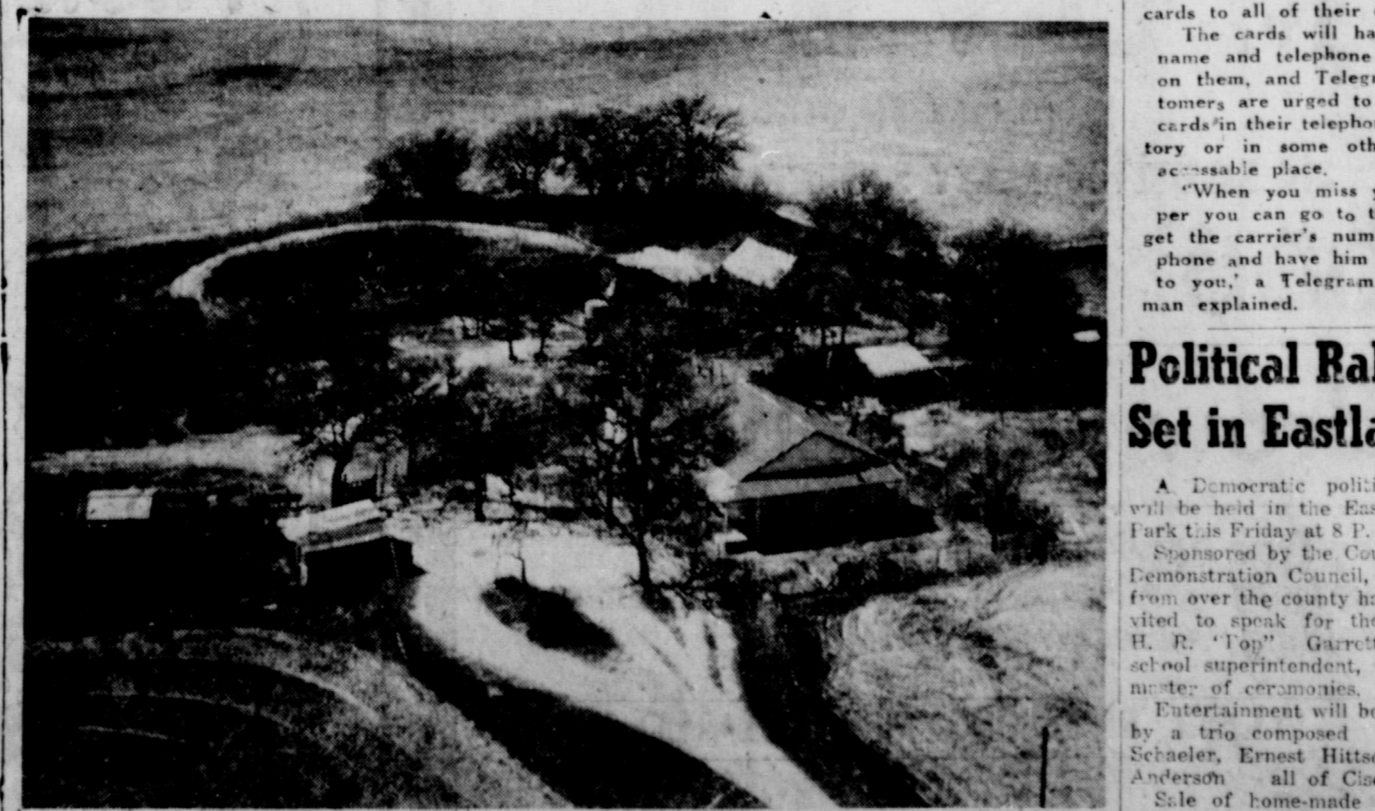

**YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY**  
(Editor's Note: This is the 11th in a series of articles compiled by C. M. Vaden, Jr., field representative of the Abilene Social Security Office.)

Social Security is a self-supporting insurance system. It is financed through Social Security taxes paid by the employee and his employer, and by the self-employed individual. The present tax rate is 2 1/4 percent for the employee and 2 1/4 percent by the employer. The rate for the self-employed person is 3 3/8 percent. In order to keep the program self-supporting, tax increases are provided in the law each five years beginning with 1960 through 1975. The increase in the employee and employer will be 1/2 percent until a maximum of 4 1/4 percent is reached in 1957. The increase for the self-employed person is 3/4 percent until a maximum of 6 3/8 percent is reached in 1975.

Social Security taxes, as are all federal taxes, are collected by the Internal Revenue Service. They are then placed in the Social Security Trust Funds. For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1957, total tax collections were approximately 6.5 billion dollars. Interest on the approximately 23 billion dollars in the funds amounted to \$661 million.

From the trust funds are paid the Social Security benefits and the costs of administering the program. Payments from the trust funds for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1957, were approximately 6.5 billion in benefits and \$150 million for operating expenses. This latter figure represents about 2.2 per cent of taxes collected. It includes not only the cost of administration of the Bureau of Old Age and Survivors Insurance but also the cost of the Treasury Department for issuing Social Security checks.

The 2.2 percent cost, we believe, represents an efficient administration of your Social Security program.

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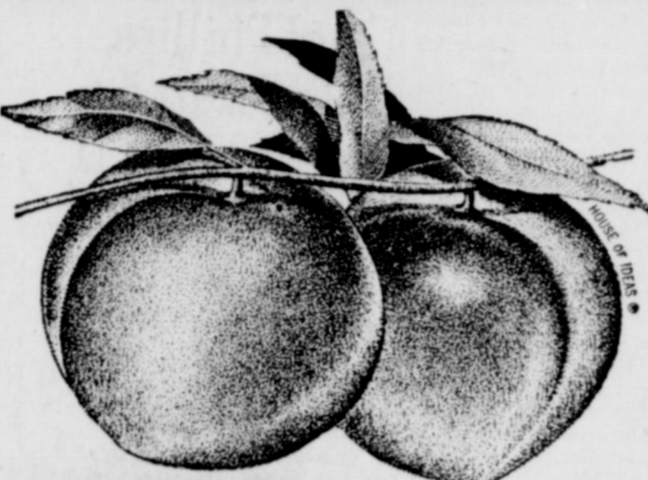

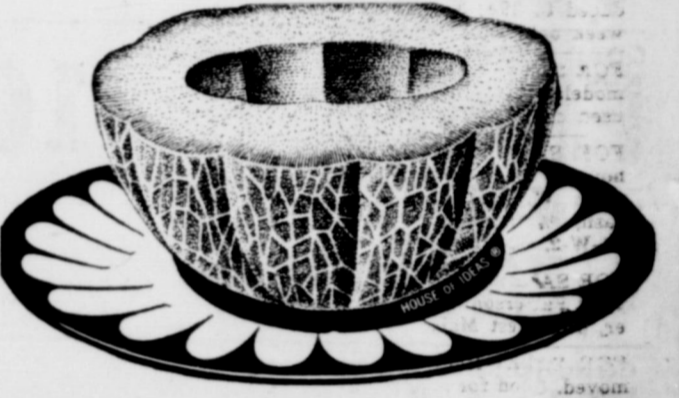

### Summer Training Marks End of Basic Training

The Army National Guard will conduct individual basic training for the last time at summer training exercises this year, the Department of the Army has announced.  
By next Oct. 1, nearly all Army National Guardsmen will have completed basic training or its equivalent and units will begin training as combat teams. This represents the highest degree of combat readiness in the Guard's peacetime history.  
The rapid climb in the Army National Guard's training level can be traced primarily to enlistment requirements. Since April, 1957, units have enlisted only prior service men and individuals who agree to take active duty training. This year's annual field training, which began this month, will mark the end of basic training for those Guardsmen who enrolled before

the new enlistment requirements went into effect.  
The 363,000 men expected to attend 1958 annual field training will represent more than 5,000 units from each of the 48 states, the District of Columbia, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico. They will train at approximately 170 field training sites.  
Last year, some 375,000 Army National Guardsmen attended field training. The reduction in attendance for 1958 is a result of decreased over-all strength (424,000 to 400,000) and the increase in the number of Army National Guard personnel who will be taking six months training at the time their units are engaged in field training.
