Summer Training the new enlistme went into effect. **Marks End of Basic Training** The Army National Guard will conduct individual basic training for the last time at summer train-

ing exercises this year, the Department of the Army has announced. By next Oct. 1, nearly all Army National Guardsmen will have completed basic training or its equivalent and units will begin training as combat teams. Inis represents the highest degree of combat readiness in the Guard's peacetime history.

The rapid climb in the Army National Guard's training level can be traced primarily to enlistment requirements. Since April, 1957, units have enlisted only prior service men and individuals who agree to take active duty training. This year's annual field training, which began this month, will mark the end of basic training for those Guardsmen who enrolled before

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
