SCS DISTRICT NEWS 'Cooperation' Need Stressed By Group

(Editor's Note: The following article was prepared by members of the Upper Soil Conservation work unit.) Maximum conservation is achieved when all programs, agencies, and each level of government is cooperating fully with local people and groups of people.

Team members in this immediate area include the Upper Leon and the Palo Pinto Soil Conservation Districts and the district supervisors, the Agricultural Conservation Program Service and the Eastland County ASC Committee.

The two Soil Conservation Districts in this area were created by local people as local units of government created under State law.

The Agricultural Conservation Program Service furnishes federal cost share help to land owners in applying approved county conservation practices.

District Supervisors and Committeemen of the ASC committee are all local farmers and ranchers elected to their terms of office by their local landowner neighbors.

Conservation contractors are to be especially commended for their contribution to the local conservation effort.

Seaberry Gains Another Honor

Virgil T. Seaberry of Eastland has been officially notified that he has been elected a fellow in the American College of Trial Lawyers.

Membership in the association is limited to one percent of the lawyers licensed to practice in a state.

Harvey O. Payne of the State Bar of Texas said Seaberry was elected to the exclusive group at a recent meeting of its Board of Regents.

Payne said, "The American College of Trial Lawyers is one of the most distinctive legal organizations in the world.

Seaberry, a graduate of the University of Texas, has practiced law in Eastland since 1919. He is immediate past president of the Texas Bar Association.

His election to the College was based entirely upon his qualifications as disclosed by a two-year investigation and has no connection whatever with his past service with the State Bar, however.

ures showing the average farmer makes 60c an hour compared to \$2.07 an hour for industrial work.

White's Comments
State Agricultural Commission: John White said farmers had been the 'whipping boy' too long. He said that agriculture is at a crossroads and must go forward or backward.

All the farmer asks, he said, is 'action when they are right and an explanation when they are wrong.' He accused Republicans of trying to make the farmer appear to be a beggar.

He urged putting farm to market road construction in front of super highway work, but later said, 'every tourist that comes into the state is worth as much as a bale of cotton and he is about twice as easy to pick.'

"The farmer is the only fellow I know who sells wholesale and buys retail," he concluded.

The Majestic Theatre was almost full and hundreds of persons went to Eastland City Park following the meeting for barbecue.

Murray Cox broadcast his farm program during the noon hour from the Majestic stage.

S. veterans of wars before World War I will receive increases in their Veterans Administration pensions next month, Edward P. Onstot, manager of the VA regional office in Dallas said today.

The wars concerned, Onstot explained, are the Spanish-American War, Indian Wars, Civil War, and the Mexican War of 1846-1848.

The increases, which will range from \$7.27 to \$12.50 per month and will be reflected in the pension checks mailed out at the end of July, are authorized by Public Law 85-425.

Slated for increases are all widows of veterans of the Spanish-American War or the Mexican War of 1846-1848, who are receiving VA pension.

Also sharing in the increase will be most—but not all—widows of Civil or Indian Wars veterans. Mr. Onstot pointed out that the law does not provide an increase for such widows who are less than 70 years of age.

Mr. Onstot emphasized that widows already on the agency's

pension rolls need take no action to get the raise. It will be paid automatically.

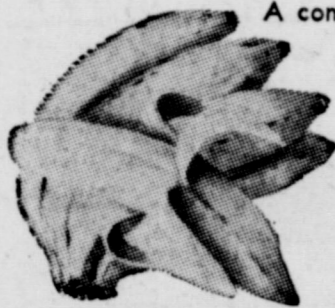

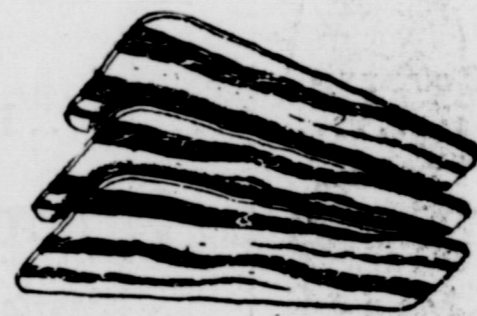

Water Sports
Can Be Dangerous

COLLEGE STATION — Texans own a lot of pleasure boats—286,000 in 1957—and their interest in water sports continues to increase, reports Ed Cooper, extension wildlife specialist. Each year about 10,000 new fishing licenses are bought by fishermen in the State and crowds continue to grow at popular lake, river and seashore spots.

But, warns Cooper, fun and enjoyment can end in disaster as it did last year for 293 Texans who were drowning victims. This needless loss of life can be prevented, points out the specialist, if water sport participants would only observe the rules of water safety.

Learn to swim. It is a good sport and may save your life. But Cooper advises swimming with another

person and in a safe place. Know the area where you intend to swim and before diving make sure the water is deep enough and that no hidden objects such as submerged rocks are present.

Respect the water and don't try to perform beyond your own limitations. Water can be a deadly enemy or a friend. Try to remain calm should you experience trouble while in the water, says Cooper. Don't swim immediately after eating or when overheated or tired and always keep safety equipment available, he cautions.

It is wise to wear a life vest when riding in a small boat. Should you be involved in a boating accident, don't leave the boat. Most small crafts will float even when filled with water or overturned.

Finally Cooper advises against overpowering a boat. Motors too powerful make a boat hard to control and may cause upsets or other accidents.

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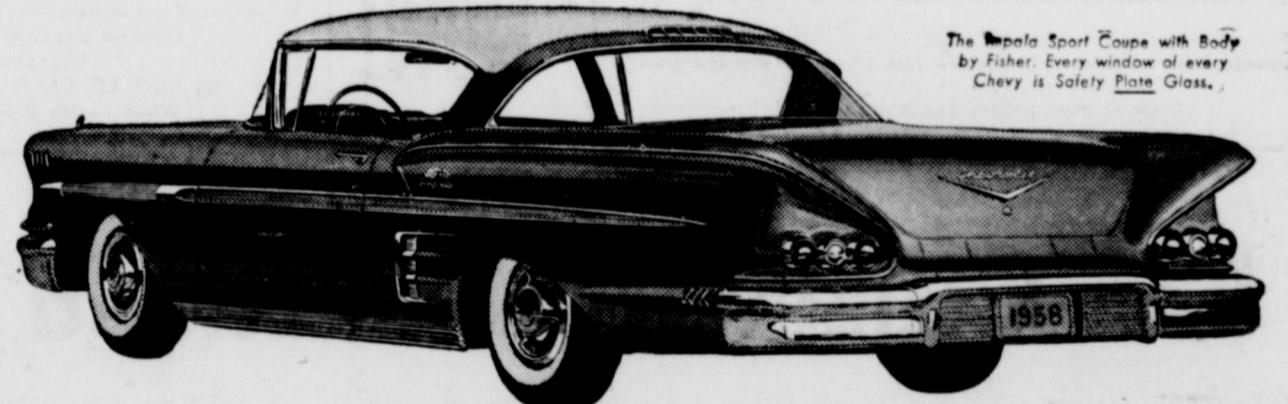
