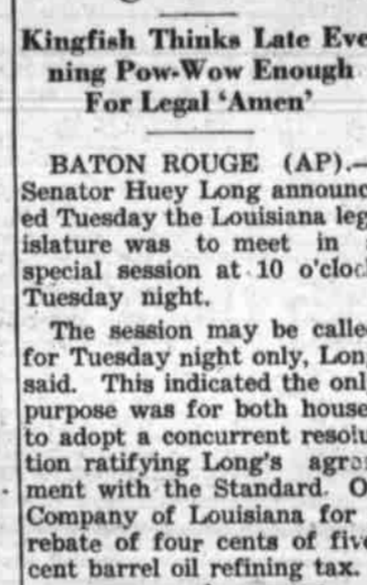

Many of them are the victims of post-war migration restrictions, routed from their homes after many years when tightening sur-

villance brought about by the flaring spirit of nationalism and economic conditions revealed their immigration papers were not in order.

Their plight, as they wander from place to place with stunted, despairing faces, is stirring widespread sympathy in England despite the myriad dark problems of poverty and unemployment at home.

Lord Marley, international president of the relief committee for the victims of fascism, has proposed that an international organization be set up to raise funds and direct the flow of refugees to whatever country is able to receive them.

"At present," he said, "I can see only one country which could harbor them—Russia."

"But it is not fair to expect Russia to receive them unless compensated, hence the need of a world-wide organization which can place funds at the disposal of whatever country agrees to take these unfortunate people."

Such organizations, he said, have already been started in London, Paris and New York.

By HARRY MONTGOMERY SACATON, Ariz. (AP)—History is repeating itself in a 2,000-year cycle on the Pima Indian reservation in the valley of the Gila River.

The same fertile acres which 2,000 years ago produced beans, squash and cotton under the irrigation of the Ho-ho-kan—"those who have gone before"—then reverted to desert when the water supply failed, is being reclaimed and made to support the almost forgotten Pimas.

Where the ingenious and industrious Ho-ho-kan, whose identity never has been established—laboriously dug shallow irrigation ditches with his crude stone implements, a great fleet of Diesel-powered tractors today is transforming the desert into farms.

Water Supply Restored Instead of the meager supply of water which the early-day agriculturists were able to take directly from the Gila river, their successors today are entitled to half of the water impounded by the giant Coolidge dam, completed in 1929, primarily to restore to the Pimas their rights to the waters of the Gila.

The project, which is nearing completion, calls for the irrigation of 50,000 acres—probably many times more than the Ho-ho-kan with his primitive methods ever dreamed of cultivating. Approximately 35,000 acres has been prepared already and much of it now is growing wheat, cotton, alfalfa, barley, and vegetables, or has been planted to fruit trees—date palms, citrus, apricots, plums, figs, and others.

Thirty-six tractors, pulling implements which largely have been designed on the reservation for the particular type of work demanded of them, are subjugating 500 acres a month, preparing it to receive the water impounded at Coolidge dam.

Earth Ripped Open With these machines the Indians rip open the earth to provide irrigation ditches which dwarf the narrow and shallow canals the Ho-ho-kan laboriously dug with stone

hoes. But wherever traces of the old ditches are discernible their general course is followed in constructing the new ones.

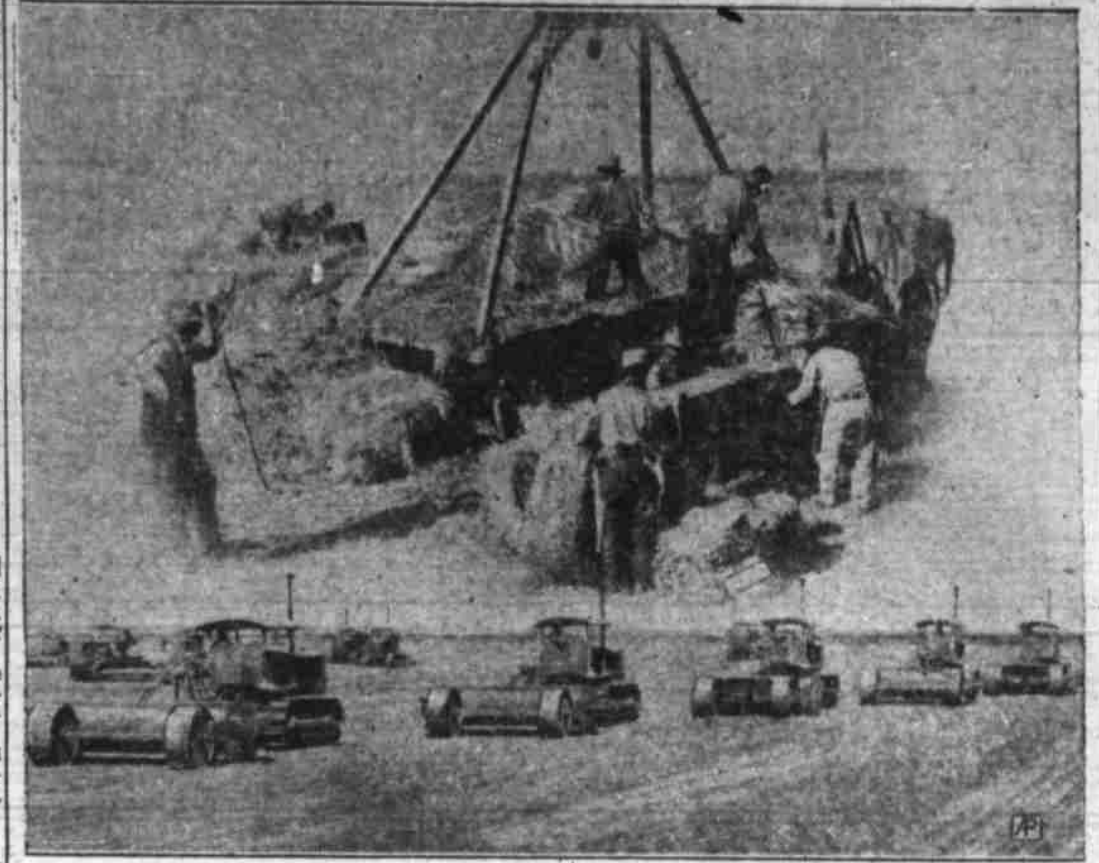
The process of development is speedy. Mesquite and palo verde trees, which grew to considerable height during the 50 years the land was idle, are yanked out by the roots. Indians chop the trees into cord wood.

Hydraulic scoops, laking four cubic yards at a "bite," remove hills and ridges, and special constructed harrows and levelers bring the land to floor smoothness.

Each family is allotted 10 acres of irrigated land. The Pimas are known to have tilled the valley more than 250 years ago.

Archaeologists, who claim the land was irrigated 2,000 years ago, can not account for the disappearance of the primitive agriculturists, but believe a shortage of water probably was responsible; just as in the case of the Pimas a few generations ago.

NEW MEXICO CATTLEMAN IS SLAIN

SILVER CITY, N. M.—A dispute of long standing over the boundary between adjoining properties of Thomas Nichols and Jack Curston, 61, neighbors at Red Rock, Monday led to Curston being fatally wounded and Nichols being lodged in the Silver City jail.

Following the shooting, which occurred near Red Rock, a community west of Silver City, Nichols walked into the sheriff's office in Silver City and said to Deputy Sheriff Sam Stearman, "I just shot Jack Curston."

Unaware of Death Investigation disclosed that Curston had just died at his home in Red Rock, where he was taken following the shooting. Nichols was unaware when he surrendered that Curston had died.

Nichols, 61, was placed in jail while authorities proceeded with an inquest at Red Rock.

Corner Post Removed Sonarman said that there had been a blood between Curston and Nichols for some while. The quarrel which ended in Curston's death apparently started over the alleged removal of a corner post marking the boundary line between the men's property, he said.

Sheriff Owen Matthews and District Attorney J. W. Hodges were in Red Rock today attending the inquest and investigating the shooting further.

Nichols would not discuss the tragedy.

Highway Head Appointment Draws Interest

AUSTIN 179—Sharp interest in Governor James V. Alfred's impending selection of a state highway commissioner Tuesday spotlighted his continuing task of making his administrative posts for the state government.

Who the governor would select and how the nomination would be received by the senate, which must confirm the nomination, was eagerly awaited.

As far as Alfred has scored 100 per cent in nominations, as none has been refused nomination, but filling the post of highway commissioner, who also will be chairman, presented a ticklish situation. Much pressure has been exerted to obtain reappointment of W. R. Ely of Abilene, whose six-year term expired Feb. 15.

Best by many petitions, Alfred announced he had sufficient recommendations in support of each candidate and pleaded for the time to study the records.

Next in interest on the governor's list of appointments to be made soon was that of a regent of the University of Texas to succeed Beaufort Jester of Corsicana, chairman. Alfred said he would not reappoint Jester.

Most other important posts in which incumbents' terms end during Alfred's administration, will be filled after adjournment of the legislature. Texas appointments will require confirmation in a future session.

Other nominations Alfred may make during the session include three of nine regents of the Agriculture and Mechanical College; membership of the state commission of the blind; pink bollworm commission; Texas historical board; five of 12 members of the board of medical examiners; sundry commissioners of mesquite parks; and five members of the board of veterinary medical examiners.

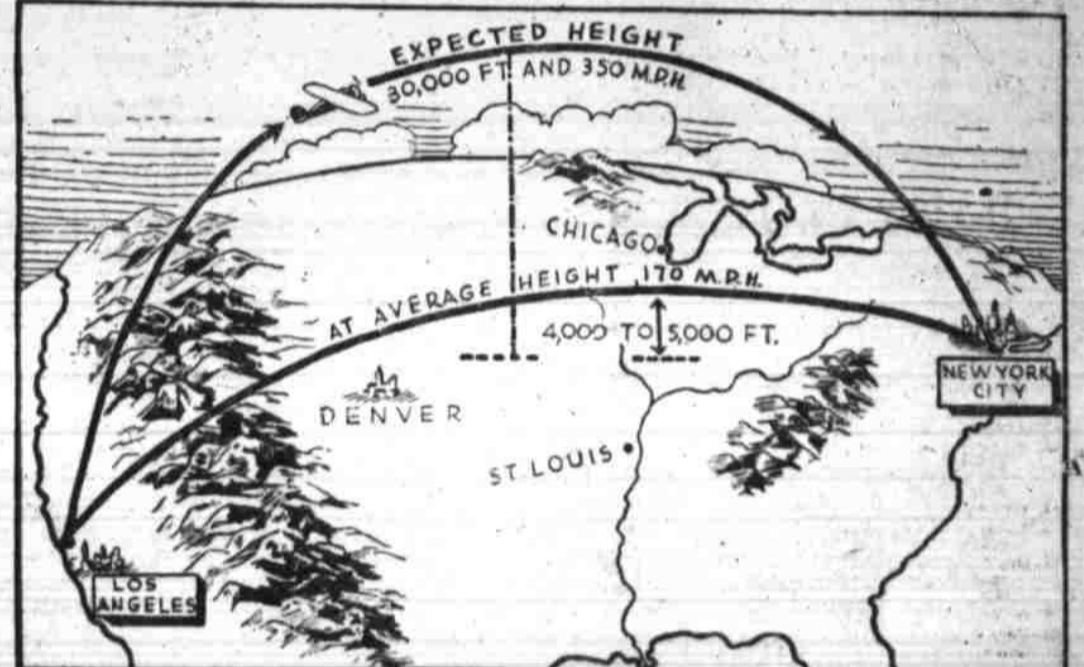

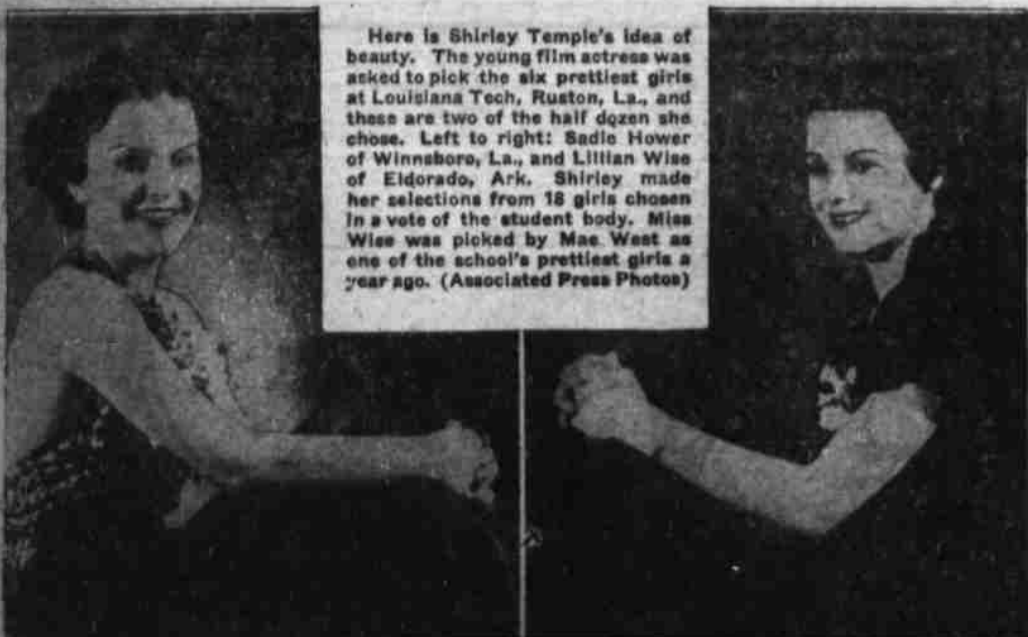
