

NO. 20 Bad Bebts—Year in Which Deductible

To be allowed as a deduction from gross income, a bad debt must have been determined by the tax-payer to be worthless within the taxable year for which it is claimed and, where books are kept, it also must have been charged off within the same year. The necessity for this provision is obvious. If a debt could be deducted without requirement that it be charged off the taxpayer's books, the certainty of its worthlesaness would be open to questions. Neither the taxpayed nor the government could be certain that a debt would not be claimed more than once.

If a bad debt were allowed as a deduction, without regard to the year when it became worthless, such charges could be accumulated o be deducted in a year when there

If in the exercise of sound business judgment a taxpayer concludes, after making every reasonable effort to determine whether there is likelihood of recovery, that the debt is of no value, deduction for such debt is allowable. Court action as proof that the debt is worthless is not essential.
