Age is the most significant health characteristic of the the county's population. More than 20 per cent of Eastland County's inhabitants are 65 years of age or older, and the number is growing.

When compared to the national percentage of 10 per cent 65 years of age and older, the figure for Eastlane County may not appear overwhelming. But it has been found nationally that the 65 and over age group requires four times as much hospital care as the remainder of the population.

Prof. Trost attributed the unusually high quality of health care in Eastland County as another contributing factor in the high death rate.




