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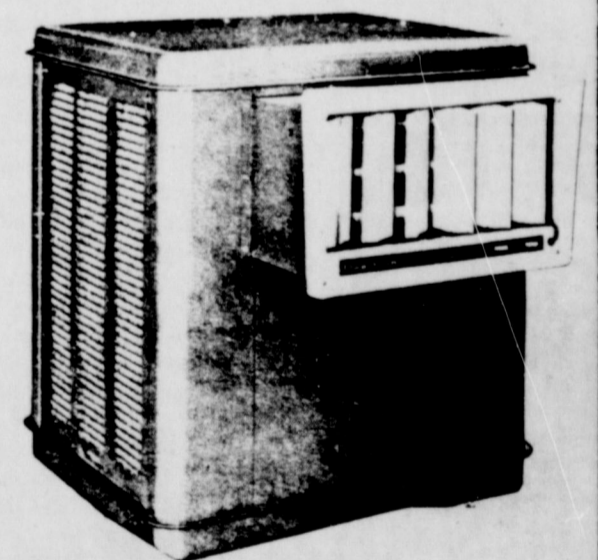
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Theresa Takes Tops

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Couples Attend Farmers Convention

OMAHA, NEB. (March 15) - Mr. and Mrs. Oral Davis, and Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Harding of district 4, Eastland County local of the National Farmers Union returned Thursday from Omaha where they attended the 71st annual convention of the Farmers Union.

"The highlight of our trip," said Mr. and Mrs. Harding and Mr. and Mrs. Davis, was the address given by telephone by Walter F. Mondale U.S. Senator from Minnesota, to the Convention Banquet.

Over 1,200 delegates and members attended, overflowing three downtown Omaha hotels, during the three-day convention.

A recurring theme among the many visiting speakers was a heavy condemnation of recent farm program cuts by the Nixon Administration. The toughest language was in a Tuesday night speech by Fred Simonton, executive director of the Midwest Electric Consumers Association, who called the Administration action "an unconstitutional usurpation of authority by the Executive."

Simonton issued a plea to the convention members to do everything possible to bring pressure on Congress to restore the two-percent loan program.

"We should not compromise on this issue," Simonton said. "Every member of Congress and the President should be fingerprinted on this issue. Let the record be clear."

In his keynote address Monday night, National President Tony Dechant called for a tough fight to resurrect what he called the "obituary list" of dead and dying programs for rural America.

"But", Dechant warned, "to make the light only on those grounds is but a rearguard action of forces in retreat. We cannot abandon those fights. To win, we must take the offensive. We must develop new ideas, new programs. We must fight on new fronts that we will choose."

Dechant characterized the convention as a working convention to work out the ground

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rules for the battle. He called for the establishment of three task forces to "spearhead our efforts in the year ahead." The categories will be domestic economic policy, international trade and the environment.

Dechant said the task forces will not be just for leaders but to mobilize friends and neighbors.

"No dedicated few will sit up nights to solve the problems that concern us. Our problems will be solved by hundreds and thousands of you, your neighbors, and your neighbors further down the road of rural America. Our task forces will give the decision-makers of this nation no rest in the year ahead," he told the audience.

Each afternoon session during the convention was

designed to kick off the new task forces.

The first session on domestic farm policy was keynoted by Rep. Tom Foley (D-Wash.) the third ranking member on the House Agriculture Committee and chairman of the Subcommittee on Grains and Livestock.

Tuesday's session featured a group of panelists including Farmers Union National Secretary Robert G. Lewis and Mike Cracknell, secretary-general of the International Federation of Agricultural Producers.

Wednesday afternoon was devoted to the environment and was keynoted by James Patton, former national president of the Farmers Union.

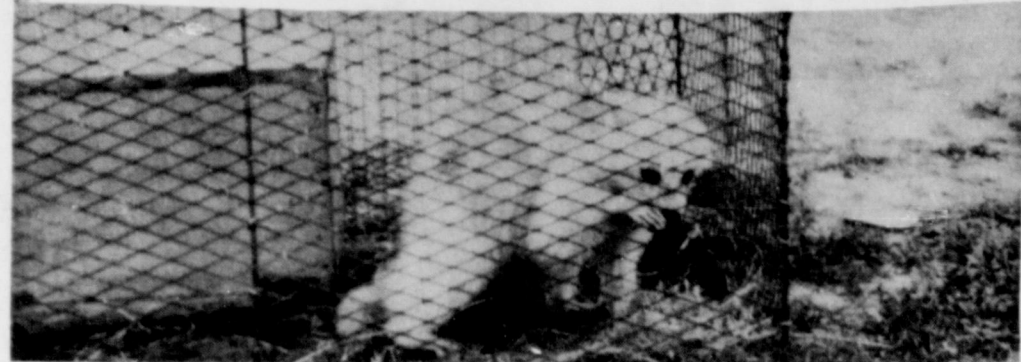

1 Killed, 1 Injured

Tuesday authorities were searching the state for a mobile home in tow believed to have been in an accident in Eastland County Monday which took the life of one man, severely injured another and sent another man to a hospital in shock.

One man was killed instantly and another seriously injured early Monday morning as they were struck by a passing automobile on Highway 6, 10 miles south of Eastland at the Carbon exit.

Killed was Willie Douglas Layne, 51, of Deer Park, a driver for J. V. Harrison Trucking Co. of Houston. Listed in serious condition at Hendrick memorial Hospital in Abilene is Floyd T. Woodcock of Pasadena, a driver for the same company.

Eastland Justice of the Peace Wells Dalton, who pronounced Layne dead at the scene, said the two truck drivers were going in opposite directions when they met and got out of their trucks to talk.

A car driven by Richard Sorrells, an employe of Ward's Supply, Breckenridge, rounded a curve striking the two men.

Dalton said Layne's body was severed at the waist and that Woodcock's right leg was severed at the knee.

According to Sorrells, a vehicle pulling a mobile home

and the Sorrells car apparently met in the space between the two trucks causing the Sorrells car to yield highway space, veer to the right and pen the two men against a parked truck.

Cisco Lawmen along with the Eastland County Sheriff's Department are investigating a burglary early Saturday at the City Drug in which the loss could amount to as much as \$1500 according to the owner, John Huffmyer.

City police reports show that entrance was gained by prying open a back door.

Taken in the burglary was a quantity of Polaroid film, several Butane Cigarette lighters, flash bulbs, 15 to 20 Timex watches, and a large quantity of drugs.

According to Chief Clyde Brymer there are several suspects.

At this time charges have not been filed against the other three.

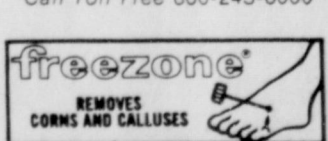

Water Corp. Gets Ok On Extended Service

The Olden Water Supply Corp. was granted permission to extend its lines southward and add additional customers to its service, as the result of action at the regular monthly meeting of the Eastland City Commission Monday evening.

Water Corp. President Pat Moseley and Secretary Dave Davidson attended the City Hall meeting and requested permission for certain contractual restrictions to be removed in order for the corporation to add customers. The Olden system purchases water from the City of Eastland, and certain restrictions were written into the contract, because Eastland secures its water from the Eastland County Water Supply District and most summers operates at near peak consumption from the district's treatment plant.

It was decided that the total gallon maximum restriction would be retained at two million gallons per month, but that the Olden System could exceed its 175 customer restriction and that it could serve industry.

The Olden system has been asked by the Eastland Industrial Foundation and others to offer water to the Leon Plant Industrial Park which would serve the Texas Electric Service Co. Transmission Division, EBAA Iron, F&K Tubing and others at that site. The Olden System could service the area with a gravity flow, and will make application either for a four inch or six inch line. The four inch line would cost approximately \$22,000 it

was reported. It is hoped that the application could be submitted, provided the Olden Corporation votes to proceed, before the end of the current Farmers Home Administration's fiscal year.

Presently the system is permitted only to go one-half mile south of Interstate 20.

On a motion by Commissioner Jay Staggs, seconded by Dale Bakker, all but the total gallonage restriction were removed. The motion carried unanimously.

City Manager Lewis Tiner reported to the Commissioners on the construction of the sewer line eastward to the Ramada Inn, stating that a number of obstacles had arisen including water and rock. The project is requiring the use of a great deal of dynamite, and the contractors were going to put an electric detonator into use this week.

In a brief financial report, it was shown that the city has received a total of \$15,189, in revenue sharing funds and of this amount, \$12,078.49 has been spent for materials in connection with the installation of the new sewer and water lines eastward.

Commissioners were reminded that the public hearing on the proposed renovation of City park will be held at City Hall on Monday, March 26, beginning at 5 p.m.

Mr. T. J. Tucker has recently returned to his home in Umbarger, Texas after spending a week with his father, Mr. E. T. Tucker, of Eastland.

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Medical Report Reveals Interesting Data

Lot of Deaths -- But With Reason

A Texas A&M University Research Report confirms what Eastland Counties have known for a long time -- medical facilities in this area are the best to be found just about anywhere.

Eastland County has a mortality rate from all causes that is more than twice the level of the statewide average, but there is a reason according to a one-year study made by the University's Research Center.

The study, headed by Prof. F. J. Trost of TAMU's College of Architecture, was an in-depth

look at rural health care delivery in the West Central Texas Planning Region, a 19-county area with Taylor County as its metropolitan nucleus.

Trost's study was conducted in the West Central Texas Region because of its high number of "7-C" hospitals, so classified by the Medicare Program because of facility or staff deficiencies which raise questions concerning their ability to provide high quality medical care.

The state mortality rate is 81.4 deaths per ten thousand

population and Eastland County has a mortality rate of 172.59 deaths per ten thousand, the highest rate in the 19-county area.

These figures might lead one to believe that there is perhaps something detrimental in the county's climate. This is not the case, however, and two good reasons account for the abnormal death rate in the county.

Age is the most significant health characteristic of the county's population. More than 20 per cent of Eastland County's inhabitants are 65 years of age or older, and the number is growing.

When compared to the national percentage of 10 per cent 65 years of age and older, the figure for Eastland County may not appear overwhelming. But it has been found nationally that the 65 and over age group requires four times as much hospital care as the remainder of the population.

Prof. Trost attributed the unusually high quality of health care in Eastland County as another contributing factor in the high death rate.

"Saying that good doctors and good hospital facilities are causing a high death rate sounds somewhat misleading," he said. "But in Eastland County, we found that the doctors and hospitals have a reputation that is drawing patients, lots of them, from outside the county."

"These patients most often suffer from heart disease and cancer, and, by the time they place themselves under the care of the Eastland County physicians, they afflictions were often terminal. Their deaths go on the record books in the Eastland County courthouse, hence the high statistical death rate for the county."

Another surprising result of the study was the relatively low Medicare payment in Eastland County, compared to the large percentage of older citizens. The county average is \$240 per recipient, among the lowest in the area and state. Comparatively, Throckmorton County averages \$439 per recipient and Shackelford County averages \$435 per recipient.

"These figures show," Prof. Trost said, "that while more health care is dispensed in Eastland County than in some other counties in the region, the population, particularly the older citizens, are able to better bear the cost of their own medical treatment, suggesting both an economic growth period in the county, and considerable tax dollar savings by Eastland County citizens."

"Our findings also showed that Eastland County enjoyed a larger number of physicians and nurses per 1,000 inhabitants than most of the other counties in the area."

Prof. Trost said, "Eastland has roughly one physician per 750 inhabitants, one registered nurse per 1,000 inhabitants, five LVNs per 1,000 inhabitants, and 22 allied health workers per 1,000 inhabitants. This can be compared with Kent County, which has no physician, one registered nurse per 2,000 inhabitants, and one vocational nurse per 2,000 citizens."

While hospitals and medical personnel offer general practice health service to citizens in Eastland, Cisco, Gorman, and Ranger, all offer full-time pediatrics to residents of the county. General surgery is offered in all the hospitals.

Prof. Trost said that perhaps the most pressing problem in rural health care delivery is the lack of physicians willing to practice in small communities. "We find that young doctors just aren't willing to locate in rural surroundings," he said, "and possible lucrative big-city practices and recreational and social facilities are predominant factors in keeping young doctors in metropolitan areas."

"We have found, in isolated cases, that young doctors are returning to a rural area to practice. We understand the son of one of the physicians in Eastland is returning to his hometown to practice."

Prof. Trost said one means of attracting young doctors to rural areas would be to sponsor a hometown boy at medical school with a scholarship. He said a rural boy would be more likely to return to his youthful environment than would a student who grew up in a metropolitan area.

Prof. Trost's study has generated a more intense state-wide research program in rural health care. Guidelines obtained from the West Central Texas study are being used to define health care problems in every rural area in Texas.

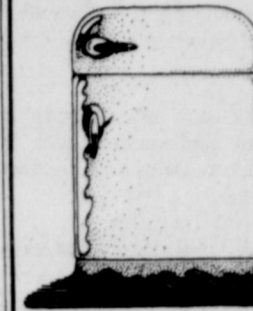
