## County's Livestock Show Opens Thursday

The annual Eastland County Junior Livestock Show gets underway today (Thursday) at the show grounds north of Eastland. All livestock are to

be entered by 10:00 p.m. tonight. The show will continue through Saturday according to Pat Moseley, President of the Eastland County Livestock

Raisers Association. The association officers and directors plan and conduct the annual livestock show for the benefit of 4-H and FFA youth

of Eastland County. Premiums for the winners are provided by individuals and business people who purchase ads in the stock show catalogue.

Grover Hallmark of Eastland, secretary of the association says approximately \$2,000 will be awarded as prize money to county boys and girls.

About 340 animals have been entered in the show according to Bill Claborn, Superintendent of the show. The breakdown of animals in each division are as follows: 100 market hogs, 70 lambs, 40 steers, 13 dairy heifers, 10 goats, 47 breeding beef, 39 breeding sheep and 19 breeding hogs. Rabbits will also be entered in the show.

Judges for the show will be Bob Traweek of Dublin - dairy, Dennis Ellebracht - sheep and goats, Ken Pettit of Fort Worth - lambs, Ricky Lusty of Tarleton State College - beef and Bill Scott of Abilene - swine.

The 4-H Adult Leaders Association will sponsor the concession stand which will open Thursday evening at 4:00 p.m. They invite visitors to

visit the concession and purchase meals while attending the stock show.

The show will end with the annual show sale of animals at the Eastland Auction company Saturday night. Steers, market hogs and lambs will be auctioned to merchants and individuals.

The Ides of March 1973 has no relation to an "Et tu" or a "Brute". It simply signals the opening night for "The Odd Couple"

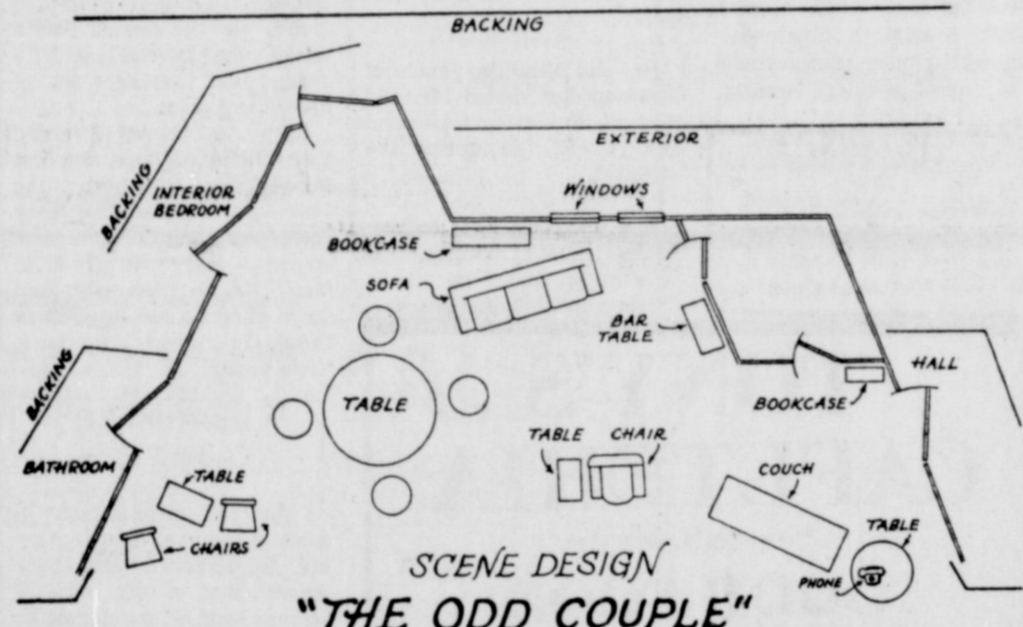

I was just thinking today of some of the first things in my life. For instance I was in the second year of my ministry before I rode in an automobile.

Grant Daniels, of Hobart, took my wife and me to Scranton to a revival service one night. I remember the first radio I ever heard was in Carbon. The year Jim Ferguson defeated Tom BBall for governor. I remember the person who told me about the results of the election said, "Tom Dingler just got the report on his raidator."

Incidentally, I used to go across the street to Toms house and listen to a Methodist preacher in Fort Worth. I remember he was an excellent preacher and I was blessed by his messages.

One day the week we moved to Carbon I asked Tom Dingler to lend me his wheel barrow, and he said "On one condition," "What is that?" I replied, "Please have it when I come over to get it back," he said. We were fast friends after that.

The first time I saw television was in London, England on my way home from a visit to the Holy Land. The program was the annual boat-race between Oxford and Cambridge. On the take-off, the Oxford boat overturned and the crew came shivering up from the cold February water.

I remember the first time I stood in a pulpit to try to preach. I don't know who suffered more, myself or the congregation.

I remember the first time I kissed the girl who later became my wife, but that is none of your business. So!

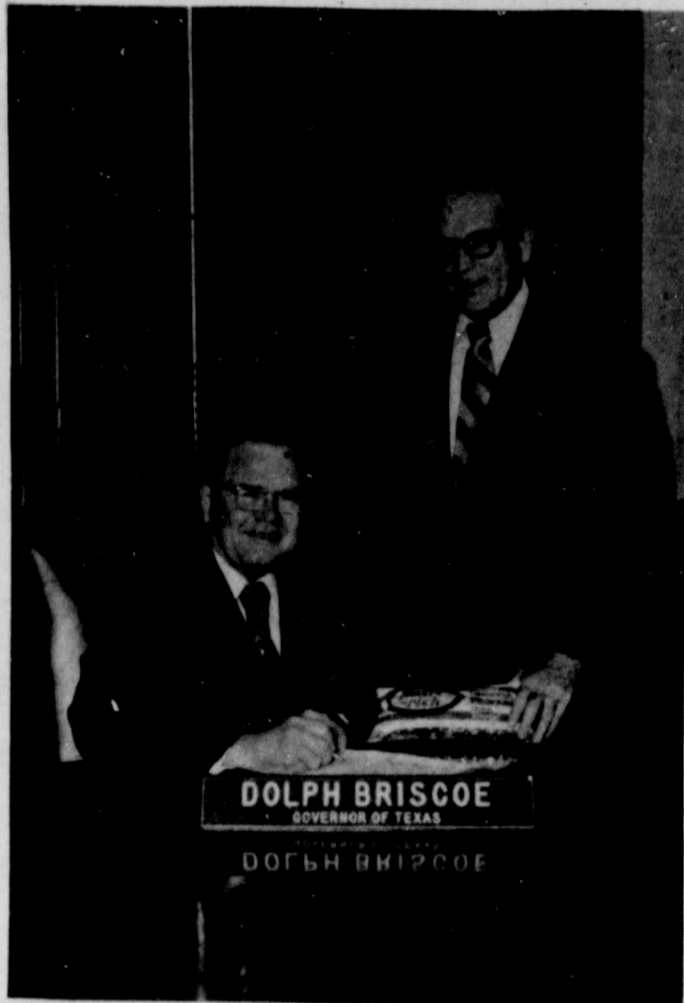

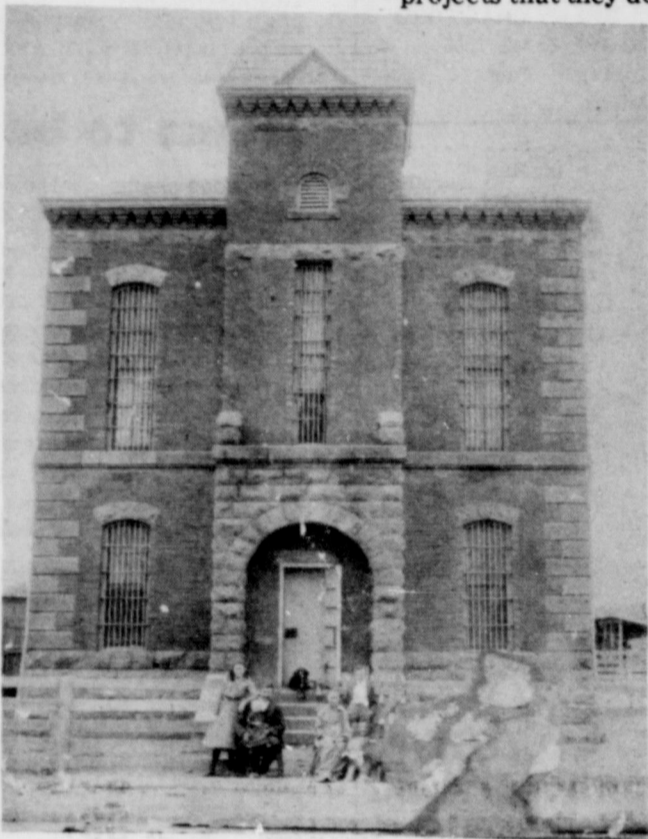

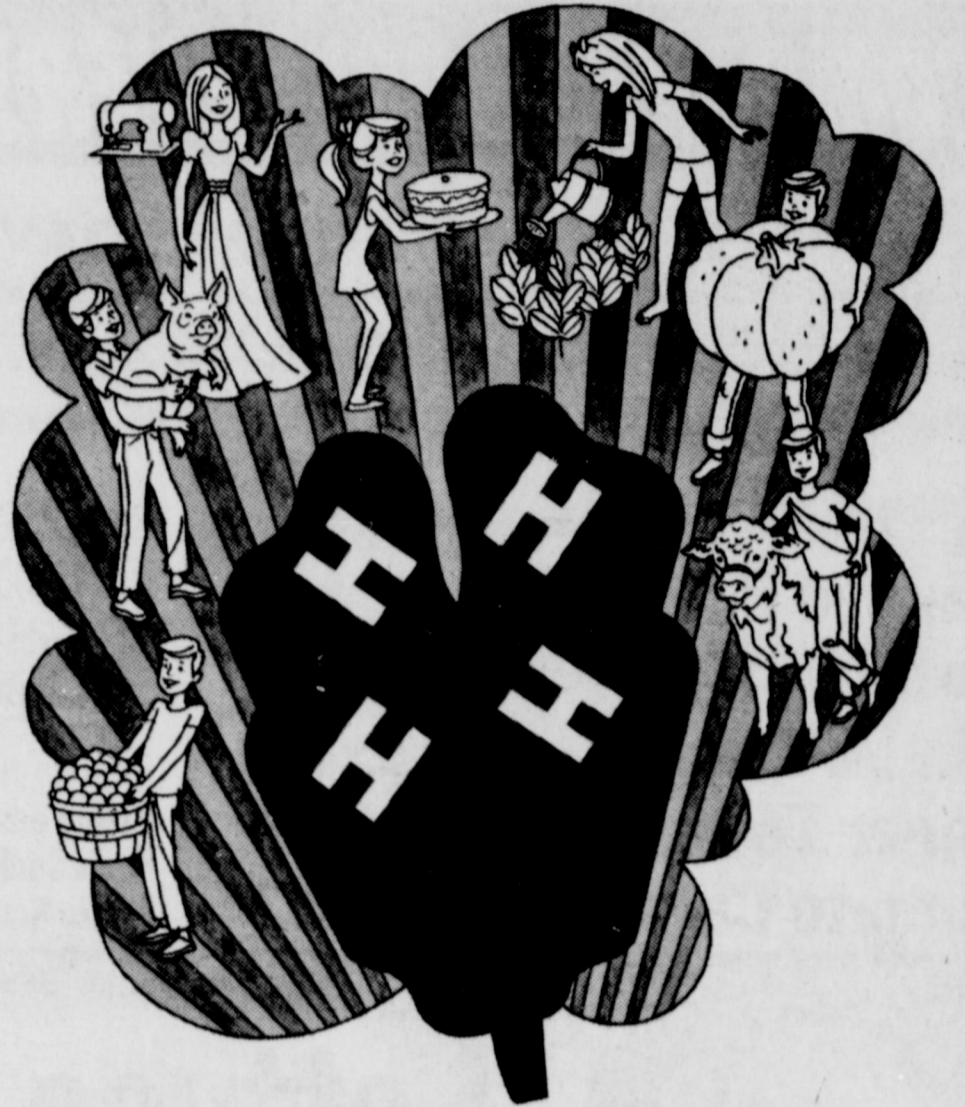
