WHY NO SEWER PLANT? Many have a right and are asking. The city voted bonds but as yet, there's been no earth turning. The following letter, though lengthy, helps answer a lot of questions.

A number of cities in Texas, including your, have applications pending for federal funding for construction of sewage treatment facilities. In view of the current status of the availability of such funds, we feel that an explanation is due in order that there be no misunderstanding as to why these funds are not forthcoming, and so that planning on the part of city officials may be handled accordingly.

You know, I'm sure, that federal grant money to Texas was severely curtailed for the current fiscal year when the formula for allocation to the states was changed from the basis of population to the basis of "need." Because Texas, for quite a number of years, has moved forward with a strong pollution abatement program, and thus was considerably ahead of most other states in that respect, our "need" was considered to be of lesser degree and consequently a portion of the funding which would have been allocated to Texas was allocated to other

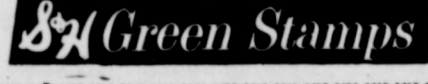

The weather cooperated well and we had a good afternoon practice session in James McCracken's pecan grove.

While some things have been going on for 20 years other are just beginning. One new

event is the Payton Scott's Club calf sale. Payton and Johnnie and their children; Theresa, Neil and Sam are going to sell 85 selected club calves in a special sale at the Eastland County show barns, Sunday, May 6 at 1:00 p.m. Payton knows how to select winning show calves. He has driven over Nebraska, Kansas, Iowa and South Dakota buying the

best calves he could find. The Scott's are expecting people from all around the state as well as neighboring states to come to Eastland on May 6th for the sale.

We would like to congratulate the communities of Nimrod and Kokomo for being selected as finalist in the district Community Improvement Contest.

They were selected from a list of communities in nineteen counties on the basis of record books turned in.

The two communities will be toured by judges and guests next Wednesday, May 2. Everyone is welcome to attend the tours and see the accomplishments of these two communities.

Screwworms like lots of moisture, so recent widespread rains over the state are clouding the outlook that has been generally bright up to now.

The next few weeks will be critical as the weather gets warmer, warmer temperatures and surplus moisture situation are dangerous combination of screwworm development.

A case confirmed April 17 in De Witt County indicates that screwworm flies are beginning to move northward from overwintering areas.

Officials with Screwworm Eradication Project at Mission have pointed out that up to now cold winter and spring weather has delayed northern screwworm fly migrations from overwintering sites in Mexico. But an influx of warmer weather could change the situation quickly.

In order to stay abreast of the situation and the initiate sterile fly drops where they are needed, screwworm program officials must depend on reports from individual farmers and ranchers. That's why it's so important to check regularly and to submit any worm samples to the Screwworm Lab for identification. Prompt reporting is essential for sterile fly drops to be effective.

The county Extension office has kits for mailing worm samples found in live-stock. Samples should be sent to Box 969, Mission, Texas 78572.

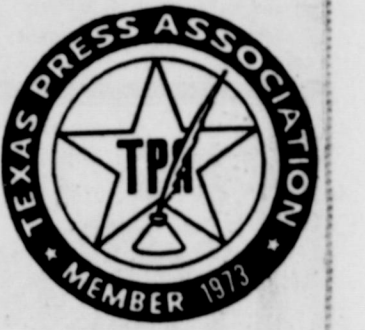

states. Then, as you also know, the President further reduced to a considerable degree the total amount of grant money which the Congress had provided. Without going into all of the legislative details, the final outcome was a national budget of \$500 million for construction or improvement of sewage treatment facilities.

Within the past 30 days, then, we learned, quite by accident, that all of the \$500 million had reportedly already been allocated to 13 states and Texas was not one of them. So, as the situation currently stands, all of the federal grant money available at this time has been allocated and there simply are no federal funds available for use by the Texas cities which have submitted applications through the Texas Water

Quality Board to the Environmental Protection Agency.

The regional office of the Environmental Protection Agency has made statements on several occasions to the effect that the \$500 million figure is not "set in concrete." However, at the present time the federal agency has given Texas no encouragement regarding the release of grant money to the State, nor have federal officials indicated a date at which we might expect to receive funding.

Under the circumstances, I think we must conclude that the State's own effort to fund construction projects is the only effort on which we can, for the present, rely.

In that connection, the state does have some money which, if it can be released by legislative action, will be of some help. This occurs because state matching grant funds which were required by the old federal law are no longer

required by the amended law. Consequently, some of the monies (\$100 million) which were provided by the legislature and a constitutional amendment in 1971 for state matching funds are on hand. Bills are currently before the Senate (S.B. 846 by Herring) and the House (H.B. 1343 by Clayton) to release these funds for use on construction projects. You might like to contact your State Senator and your State Representative regarding this legislation.

While this is encouraging to some extent, I can give the cities with grant applications pending little further reassurance except to say that we are doing everything that can be done at the state level to find a solution to the problem of lost federal funding.

Additionally, we have learned that it will be necessary for at least some of the 150 cities which have grant applications pending to make revisions in their applications before they will be approved by EPA. This means, most likely, that the entire application process will need to be repeated in most of those cases. Specific information in this regard will be supplied to the cities concerned when it becomes available.

It is extremely unfortunate that these developments have occurred just at a time when we in Texas were able to see a very bright light at the end of a very long tunnel so far as our water quality problems are concerned. We regret exceedingly that we are not in a position to help your city at this time but we will keep you advised of any further developments which might occur. If we can be of assistance in anyway, or if you desire further information, please contact the Austin office of the Water Quality Board.

We also are enclosing information regarding the State Priority Rating System which may be of help in understanding how your city's place on the priority list is determined.

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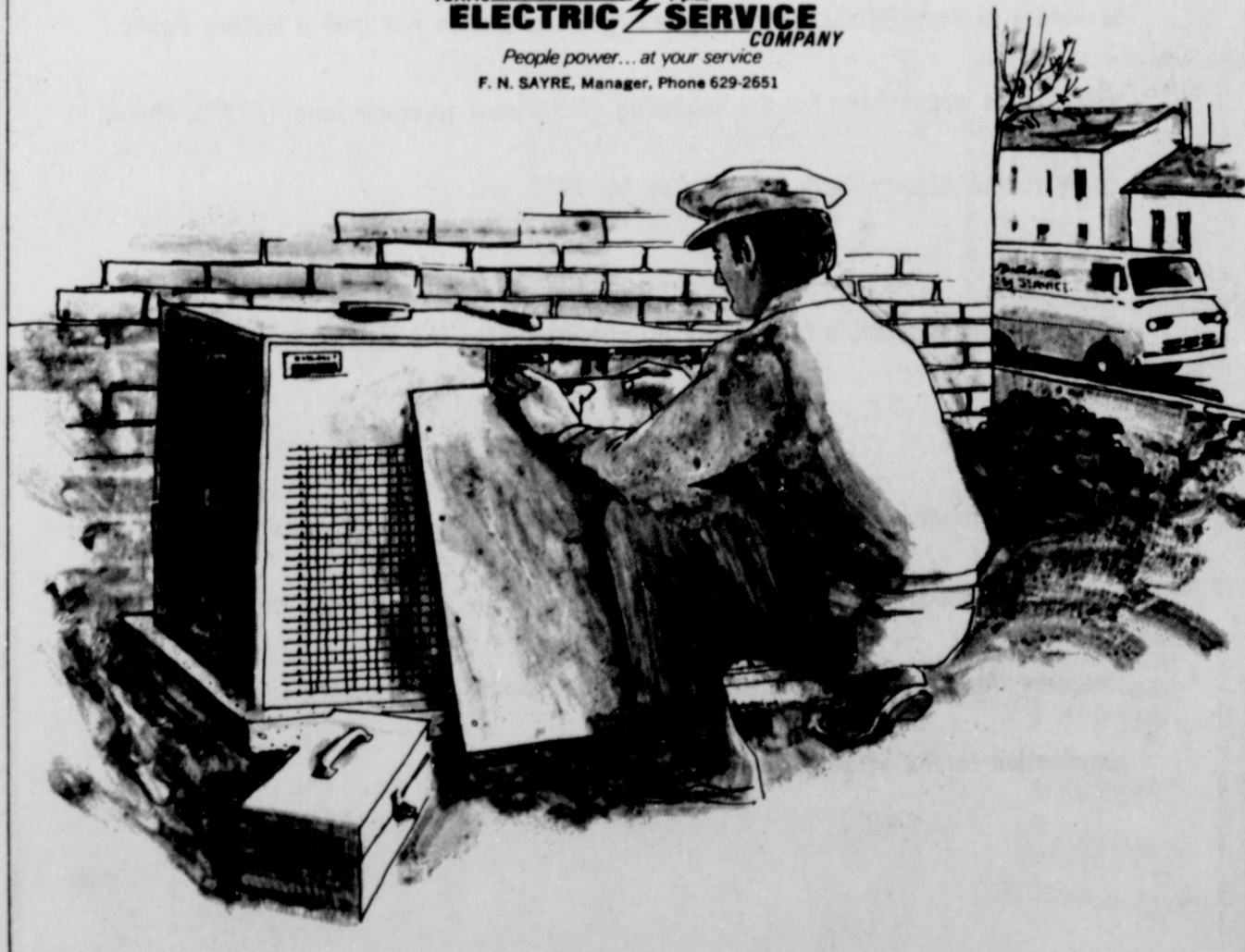
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Las Leales Invites Guests For May 7

The Vanns are a couple whose club work is international. They are active members of the Dickens Fellowship of London, and they are also active members of Denton organizations. Mrs. Vann has served as chairman of the AAUW luncheon group, the American Home Dept. of the Woman's Shakespeare Club, and the Education Dept., Pioneer District, State Federation of Women's Clubs. Currently she is chairman of

the Arts Dept. and of the Cultural Heritage division of the Pioneer District. She is a member of Another Mother for Peace and is university area chairman for the Heart Fund. She and Dr. Vann participate in many school affairs, as she is a room mother and he is president of Sam Houston Elementary PTA. Dr. Vann was a founding officer of the international organization, Research Society of Victorian Periodicals. He was a participant in the Canadian sponsored Dickens Conference in 1970.

They also attended the annual Dickens festival held in Broadstairs on the coast of Kent. During the festivities they visited with two great-grandsons of the famous novelist - Capt. Peter Dickens and Eric Dickens Hawksley.
