Pioneer Settlers of Carbon

The John Neuborn and Hill Guy families were living in the foothills of the Ozarks near Thayer, Missouri. Hoping to make a better life for themselves, the two brothers in 1894 chartered a railway car to move their possessions to Texas. On a previous trip, they had been favorably impressed with the land near Carbon.

The old friends and kindred, who were to be left behind, accompanied the two Guy families to the railway station. The train whistled in the distance and it was too much for two of the children to tolerate. It was frightening to Nora the daughter of John and they broke away from the crowd and took refuge in a shack near the trail way station. Members of the families retrieved the frightened children and held them tightly until all were on the train. Their esteem for Texas must have grown for John still lives in Carbon and Nora who is Mrs. Willie Nagel makes her home in Dalhart.

Other members of the J.N. Guy family were J.D. (Jim) who farmed at Carbon after his health failed while preparing himself to be a pharmacist. In later years he worked at the SCS office in Eastland W.H. (Will) Guy, M.D. graduated from the University of Texas Medical School at Galveston. He and the late Dr. T.E. Payne of Eastland were classmates. Dr. Guy practiced medicine in Carbon. Gorman and Dublin until his death in 1945. Amanda, Mable known affectionately as May, Nora, Maude, and Viola were the other children of J.N. and Mary Guy. Mable Guy Hilborn died while still a young lady.

John Neuborn Guy's original plan was to find land that would grow cotton. This he found to his liking about one and one half miles southeast of Carbon. He amassed a sizable tract of land. There was a strip of land in front of what was, in later years, the home of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Boles that did not belong to anyone. John N. homesteaded the land and added it to his other acreage. The deep sandy loam produced a bale of cotton to the acre. With his large family and the aid of a hired hand or two, his work force naturally lent itself to his success as a cotton farmer. One hired hand fitted into the picture so well that he never left the scene. He was Nate C. Morris who married the oldest daughter Amanda. Mrs. Morris now lives in Eastland.

Mr. Guy's habit of sitting in a cane bottom chair by the side of the fireplace reading, gave him new ideas of how he could use his land. He is remembered by Opal Morris, his granddaughter as being hidden by his great ewspaper in front of his face.

Because of his search for new ideas, he turned his attention to literature sent out by the Texas Department of Agriculture on the growing of fruit. By 1895 he had set out fruit trees. Stark Brothers of Missouri was his most trusted nursery. Stark trees are now advertised as trees with a pedigree. As time went by, he had invested forty-five acres of his land in

apples, peaches, pears, figs, persimmons, grapes of all sorts, and many other fruit.

By 1904 the fruit enterprise was flourishing. An open-air cannery, in which the furnace was enclosed by a low brick wall, was used to process the tin cans of fruit. Large oak trees in the back yard gave nominal relief from the heat to the family as they worked at canning. The tin cans were sealed with an older iron which was kept red hot. The iron was used to melt the stick of solder which joined the lid to the can. The seam of the can often taxed the patience of the person who was soldering the can. These cans were sold and shipped by rail to distant places.

The fruit canned in glass jars was used by the family. Fresh fruit was taken by hack and wagon loads to Eastland and Cisco for sale.

J.N. Guy, his two sons and the two older daughters attended the World's Fair in Saint Louis. Theodore Roosevelt officially opened the gates to the fair. Mr. Guy exhibited a glass jar of peaches. He won a medal which was inscribed on one side with the following: "Bronze Medal, Louisiana Purchase Exposition." The other side reads "Universal Exposition, Saint Louis United States of America MCMIV." The medal is now kept with pride by the daughter, Mrs. Nora Nagel.

Mrs. Iantha Guy Elliott (Mrs. Carl) now of Big Spring recalls seeing the prize winning jar of

Mrs. Johnson was born Sept. 26, 1873, in Riley Springs. She was a graduate of Union College in Sulphur Springs in 1893. She married T.M. Johnson Oct. 10, 1900, in Sulphur Springs.

They moved to Eastland that year and lived here most of their lives. He died in 1936.

She was a member of First United Methodist Church, the Eastern Star of Eastland and the Pioneer Club.

Survivors are one son, Morris Johnson of Bakersfield, Calif.; one stepson, Joe Johnson of Corpus Christi; three daughters, Mrs. Tonsie M. Benschaw of Planchard, Okla., Mrs. Gladys Harris of Midland and Mrs. Bernice Marrs of Monahans; one stepdaughter, Mrs. Mary Davenport of Eastland; 13 grandchildren, 22 great-grandchildren and two great-great-grandchildren.

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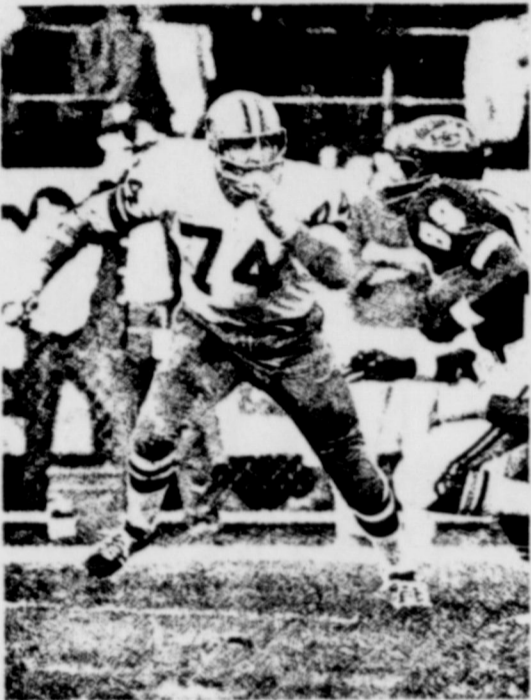

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"Capitol Cookbook" Copies Will Be Available May 9

Sue Creighton, wife of Sate Senator Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, has written a cookbook that will interest good cooks as well as collectors of works on Texas history. "Capitol Cookbook" is a collection of recipes from every living former Governor's wife, dating back to Mrs. Dan Moody in 1926, each lady Senator, the wife of each state Senator and the wives of state officials who have served Texas since 1960. The bound volume also includes recipes from the newly elected officials of the 63rd Legislature of 1973.

Wednesday, May 9, copies of an autograph signing reception to be held in the Driskill Hotel honoring each lady who contributed recipes for the book. The event to be held in the Maximilian Room of the Hotel will be from 4 until 7 in the afternoon and is open to anyone who would be interested in obtaining an autographed first edition copy.

Special honorees will be the first ladies of Texas: Mrs. Dan Moody, Mrs. Allan Shivers, Mrs. Price Daniel, Mrs. John Connally, Mrs. Preston Smith and Mrs. Dolph Briscoe; Lt. Governor's wives Mrs. Ben Ramsey Mrs. Preston Smith, Mrs. Ben Barnes, Mrs. Bill Hobby and members of the Senate Ladies Club. "For many years there has been a Congressional wives cookbook published in Washington, D.C. but this is the first time a book has been published in Texas that reflects Texas political history," explained Mrs. Creighton. With few exceptions, "Capitol Cook-

book" includes recipes from all Texas state leaders through the entire decade of the sixties," said Mrs. Creighton. "There are over 300 excellent family recipes that do not require long involved preparation."

The thought was not completely new to Mrs. Creighton. During her tenure as president of the Senate Ladies Club in 1965, she had been asked to write a history of the club. The idea of a cookbook with anecdotes about the writers was appealing. So she began to collect their recipes. Many mailings, personal calls and the final rush to include the 16 new senators wives elected last November made it a busy time. "Then too, I learned it is hard to commit a story to the written word without losing something in the interpretation. So finally, I had to omit the personal comments and let the recipes remain."

Mrs. Creighton's cookbook was featured by Joske's Department Store and the

Association of Texas Agricultural Products during the recent Fiesta activities in San Antonio, and the Austin store promoted it in a program called "Tastes of Texas". Mrs. Creighton discussed the book, and dishes were prepared and served from the cookbook recipes. "Capitol Cookbook" is being published by Texian Press of Waco which specializes in Texas historical reference books.
