

VA Benefits Can be Reduced

An estimated 200,000 service men who have GI insurance policies under in-service waiver of premium payments might-in the event of death- cause their survivers to receive reduced benefits payments, says Edward P. Onstot, manager of the VA regional office in Dallas.

On the otner hand, he adds, in some cases an in-service waiver might increase the VA benefits

survivors would receive. Onstot says the generally higher death payments authorized last year by the Survivor Benefits Act do not apply to the survivors of those who die while their GI insurance policies are under inservice waiver of premium payments.

However, such survivors may be eligible for the old and gener ally lesser amounts of death compensation payments.

"Generally higher" or "generally lesser" do not mean "always," cautions. Several factors determine which

the greater benefit, he says, These include the serviceman's number and kind of dependents, and his basic monthly pay.

Not affected by an in-service waiver is the payment of the GI policy proceeds to the designated beneficiary or beneficiaries, he points out.

Servicemen whose policies are still under in-service waiver should determine whether-in event of death-the waiver's existence world be in the best interests of their survivors. If not, they should cancel the waiver and resume full payment of premiums, Onstot ad-





If you have large quanities of bands which are available free at most large post offices. Use the Complete address.

Complete street number, rural route or post office box number should be used on all mail, s complete with avenue, parkway or drive. Avoid abbreviation of street and state names. Incomplete ddressing is often unnecessary, too, because mailers have full adiress available.

Use zone numbers wherever possible.

It is surprizing how many people fail to do this, even when the zone numbers of the addresses are well krewn to them. The zone numbe ecifically identifies the particu-

is addressed. This provides faster handling and speeds the delivery of mail bearing similar street names. Be sure to include your zone number in your return address. Check your postage scales.

All mail with inadequate post age is now forwarded. If your scales are incorrect, this mean embarrassing postage due collections must be made from the addressee. This can generate resentment, and ruin the value of otters, particulary business letters. Also, letters with inadequate postage require extra handling and may be delayed.

Where it may be necessary to prove that a particular letter was delivered, "Certified mail," offering many advantages of registered mail at less cost, is a good way of cutting down on postage bills (Be sure, however, that cash and irreplaceable papers are sent by registered mail.)

Consult your local postmaster you have a mailing problem. The Post Office Department s anxious as you are that your mailings be correctly prepared.

Your local postmaster will be appy to advise you on technical ailing problems arising under new postage rates and how to use he mails most economically and efficiently.
