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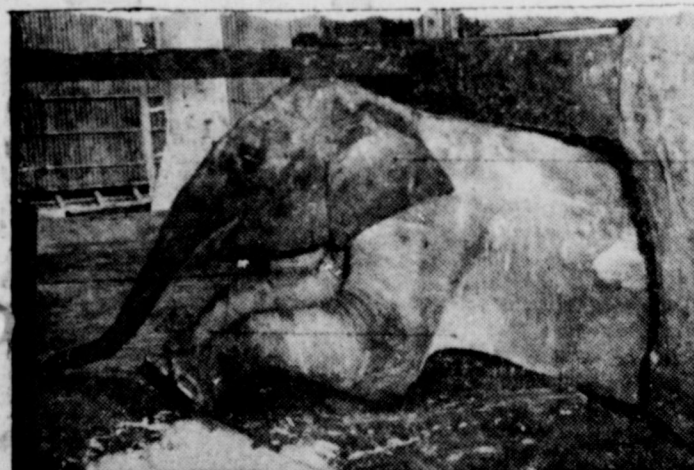

State Commander Due At Legion's District Meeting

W. A. Hazlewood, Jr., of Sweetwater, 17th District Commander will preside. Membership plans for the district will be discussed. The American Legion official membership year will begin with a statewide "L" Day Crusade, October 20.

This will be in charge of Culp Krueger of El Campo, state membership chairman.

COUNTY AGENT'S IMPRESSIVE RECORD OF SERVICE WILL BE RECOGNIZED AT NAT'L MEET

J. M. Cooper, Eastland county agricultural agent since 1945, is one of six Texans named to receive the National County Agricultural Agents Association's Distinguished Service Award for 1954. He was selected by the Texas Association, and the announcement was made by Bexar County Agent R. B. Tate, chairman, State Selection Committee.

The awards are made annually to county agents who over a period of years have made outstanding contributions to agriculture. Formal presentation, a highlight of the annual national meeting, will be made in Salt Lake City, Utah. Cooper plans to attend this October 11-14 meeting.

Cooper's first Texas Agricultural Extension Service appointment was made on February 1, 1938 when he was named county agent in Trinity county. In April 1942 he was transferred to Stephens county and in 1945 to his present position.

In Trinity county he is credited with organizing the Davy Crockett-Trinity Soil Conservation District. He was best known in east Texas for his pasture work. Hairy vetch, White Dutch and other clovers were introduced as cover and pasture crops.

4-H boys under his supervision gathered pine seed, and from them in nurseries grew pine seedlings for reforestation. Communities were organized and through these groups educational programs on the latest methods of crop and livestock production were taught. Several wildlife conservation areas were also established under his direction.

In Stephens county he helped to organize the Upper Clear Fork of the Brazos Soil Conservation District; introduced vetch as a soil building crop for the county and through an expanded 4-H program, commenced many new demonstrations including swine improvement. Also carried on many community and county activities connected with the war program.

In Eastland county he is directing programs which have been developed around commodity group interests. He has organized a county dairy association; the Central Texas Turkey Growers Association and more recently a county pecan show which is the only one of its kind in Texas. His work in the field of horticulture is well known.

Tours and field days held on the farms and ranches of demonstrators have been used by Cooper to spread educational information on the use of new and improved farm and ranch practices. The acreage planted to alfalfa has increased in the county as has the number of trench silos used. Soil and water conservation, 4-H club work, community improvement and many other activities all get attention in the Eastland county extension program.

Cooper is a native of Shelby county and a 1931 graduate of Texas A. and M. College. Prior to his extension employment, he taught vocational agriculture, and worked for the Soil Conservation Service and the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

He has just completed a two-year term as a director of the Texas County Agents Association and for the past two years has served as chairman of Favors Committee of the state group attending annual national association meetings in Chicago and Philadelphia.

County Escapes Major Wrecks Over Labor Day

No major accidents were reported in Eastland County during the long weekend holiday for Labor Day, from Friday night to midnight Monday.

An accident which happened at 6:30 a.m. Sunday, 2.6 miles south of Eastland on the highway to Carbon involved only one vehicle, and resulted in the driver being charged with driving while intoxicated.

State Highway Patrolmen investigated the accident and arrested H. M. Goins, 46, of Fort Worth. He made bond and was released from the Eastland County jail Monday.

The patrolmen reported that the 1950 Ford pickup truck driven by Goins was considered to be a total loss as a result of the accident. Goins is said to have been riding alone and lost control of the vehicle and it was demolished when he ran off the highway. He was not injured.

Early Tuesday an unidentified man was reported to have been beaten, robbed, and thrown from an automobile near Cisco, but details were not available at press time today.

A new regular field project two and one-half miles southeast of Eastland was announced by Arco Oil and Gas Co. of San Antonio.

It will be the No. 5 L. C. Doan Heirs, slated for 1,600 feet from the east and 1,400 feet from the south lines of Section 2, Block 6, ETRR Survey.

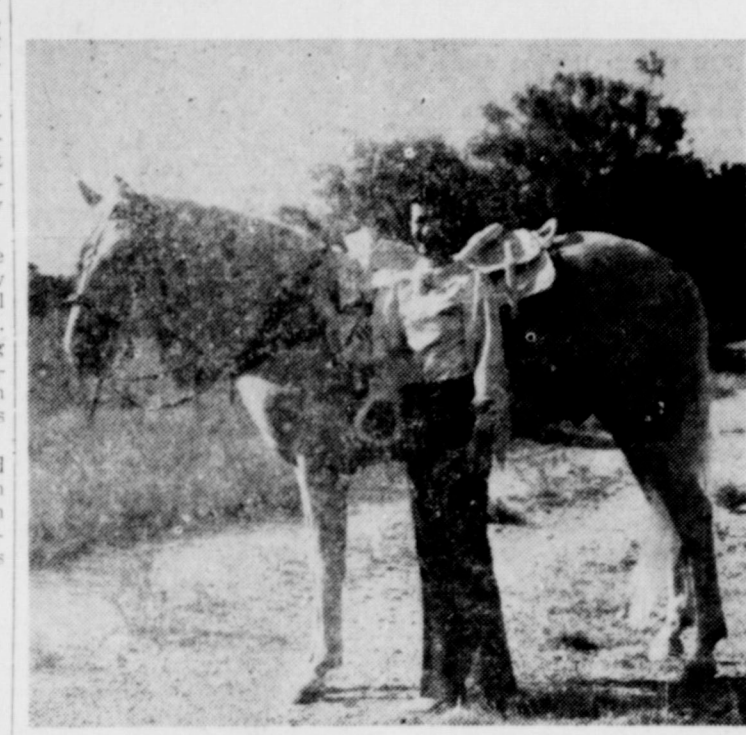

Late reports today on the condition of Ruth Mariam, Ranger rodeo performer and trick rider, who is in a Denver, Colo., hospital, indicate her injuries are not as serious as first reported. She is suffering from a broken jaw and multiple bruises, and was in a state of severe shock for a number of hours, following injuries received about 11 p.m. Saturday on a road near Brighton, Colo. She also is suffering from loss of a considerable amount of blood.

According to information received by her mother, Mrs. Elsie Fraser, from Frank Mariam, her husband, who is at her bedside in the Denver Hospital, it will be several days before she is able to make the trip home.

Enroute to her home in Ranger from a rodeo appearance at Douglas, Wyo., in connection with the Wyoming State Fair, Mrs. Mariam was traveling alone. She was pulling a horse trailer behind her car, and ran out of gasoline several miles from Brighton, Colo. occurred about 10:30 p.m. Saturday.

An unidentified man in a light truck stopped and offered to assist her, and agreed to take her to a nearby service station. He passed the first station open, and shortly after that started to leave the main highway turning onto a side road. At this point Mrs. Mariam attempted to get out of the truck, and her assailant beat her. She finally managed to jump from the truck.

She remained on the side of the road until she was found by a deputy sheriff about 7 a.m. Sunday. At that time she was in a semi-conscious condition. She was able to tell officers a part of the account of the incident, before she lapsed into a coma. She was still in an unconscious condition at the time her husband arrived in Denver late Sunday.

Denver hospital authorities contacted the Ranger Police Department Sunday morning and advised that it was urgent for them to locate Mr. Mariam. The message was relayed to him at the drilling rig where he was working about five miles from Eastland. He was flown by private plane to Abilene where he took a commercial plane to Denver, arriving there about 11 p.m. Sunday.

Mrs. Fraser said that doctors thought Mrs. Mariam received most of her injuries when she jumped from the truck. She regained consciousness after her husband arrived in Denver.

The identity of her assailant had not been learned this morning, although Denver officers were reported to be working on clues in the case. It is thought that he did not stop after she jumped from the truck.

Officers found her car, trailer and horse at the point where she said she had to leave them when she ran out of gasoline in the car.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Mariam are widely known in rodeo circles, and in the past years both have appeared in all of the major rodeo event throughout the country. Frank retired from active contests in rodeos a year or more ago, and is working for a drilling firm at Eastland.

Corned Beef Salad — So Good That Maggie Eats It With Jiggs

Everyone likes corned beef and it doesn't need cabbage to be tops in eating. This main dish salad will have Maggie demanding that Jiggs "better had," "come across" with her fair share. This recipe makes plenty for seven, unless there are several "Jiggs" in your family. Try it now — it's wonderful eating!

INGREDIENTS
1, 12 ounce can corned beef, diced; 2 cups hot or warm cooked white rice; 1-2 cup diced cooked beets; 1-2 cup diced celery; 1-2 cup sliced carrots; 1 teaspoon grated onion; 1-2 cup creamy French dressing; salad greens.

METHOD: Mix together the corned beef, rice, beets, celery,

carrots, onion and French dressing. The beets give the salad a lovely red color. Cover and chill about 1 hour or serve at room temperature, if desired. This salad is best if it is not too cold. Serve on salad greens.
This recipe makes 7 servings.

The Khapra (cap-ra) beetle a native of India, Ceylon and Malaya, has been found by USDA entomologists in California, Arizona and New Mexico. It's small and brown and looks much like some other grain-feeding bugs. Uncontrolled, it could become a serious pest of stored grain and grain products. If an unfamiliar bug shows up in your stored grain, report it to your county agent.

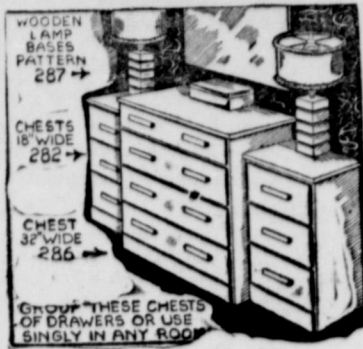


ALL-STAR CLING PEACH WHIP
 1 cup Evaporated milk
 12 finely cut marshmallows
 2 tablespoons cut-up maraschino cherries
 1-2 cup finely cut nuts
 1-4 cup sugar
 2 cups canned, cling peach slices (No. 2 1-2 can)
 1 teaspoon unflavored gelatin
 1-4 cup orange juice
 2 tablespoons lemon juice
 Put Evaporated milk into ice cube tray of refrigerator. chill

until ice crystals begin to form around edges. Put marshmallows, cherries, nuts and sugar into a large bowl. Drain peach slices well and save juice. Save 10 peach slices to decorate top. Dice rest of peaches into marshmallow mixture. Soften gelatin in orange juice in measuring cup. Heat 1-2 cup of peach juice to boiling. Remove from heat and add softening gelatin, stirring until dissolved. Then stir into peach mixture in bowl. Chill until needed. Put ice cold milk into a cold quart bowl. Whip with cold rotary beater by hand or with electric beater at high speed, until fluffy. Add lemon juice and whip until stiff. Fold into peach mixture. Garnish with peach slices. Keep chilled. Makes 6 servings.

Childish Fears Must Be Taken Seriously And Handled Sensibly

Most children have fears, and most of their fears have easily traced beginnings and can be handled by patient re-education. But the childish fears that are the most puzzling are those that have no apparent basis, says child expert Irma Simonton Black in Redbook Magazine. There are, however, reasons for these seemingly irrational fears, and ways that you can help your youngster overcome them:
 "Some of your child's fears may have easily understandable origins. His fear of dogs may have started when a barking dog chased him; his fear of water, when a wave knocked him down.
 "You can handle such fears easily by patiently re-educating your child. The child who is afraid of dogs may be led to approach a cuddly puppy. The child who was frightened at the beach may regain his courage after a few days spent at the water's edge. You must also be patient with your child and give him time to regain confidence.
 "But the more puzzling fears are those which appear to have no basis at all. However, there are various reasons for these odd fears. Your child may literally
