Annual Scouters Junior Leaders Training Is Set

April 15 Is Deadline For Auto Inspection

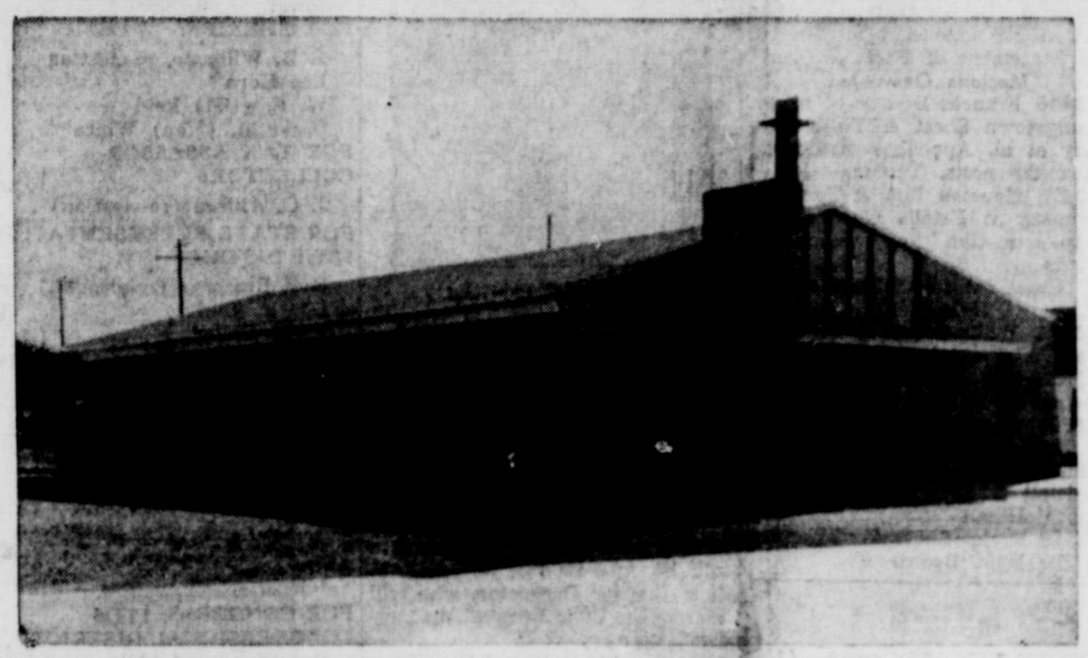
Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that more than two-million motor vehicles remain to be inspected before the April 15 deadline. He urged all Texas motorists to obtain their new inspection stickers at an early date.

Garrison reported that more than 4,300,000 will be inspected in Texas this year. To date only about half that number have gone through inspection lines at some 4,400 inspection stations located throughout the state.

The DPS director pointed out that inspection stations cannot inspect vehicles during wet, rainy weather, a condition normally prevailing during late winter and early spring. To make sure every vehicle owner is able to obtain his 1960 inspection sticker in time, Garrison suggested that plans be made now to visit an inspection station, before inspection lines grow long.

Janis Little Is Awarded Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship at TU

Fourteen University of Texas seniors and graduates have been awarded 1960-61 Woodrow Wilson National Fellowships for first-year graduate work leading to careers in college teaching.

Fellowships are \$1,500 each, with dependency allowances for wife and children. The Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation also pays the fellow's graduate school tuition and fees.

University of Texas fellows and their fields of graduate study are: Janis Virginia Little, Eastland, German literature; Carol Elizabeth Barnett, Kenmore, N. Y., linguistics; Carl B. Collins, San Antonio physics; Robert L. Hargrave, Jr., Sonora, South Asia government; David Andrew Kendrick, Gatesville, political science; Martha Jane Mast, Midland, French; David Lewis Masher, Austin, philosophy.

Stuart Neal Pullen, An Antonio, political science; David Royce Reagan, Waco, history; Ernst Ignatz Schurer, Austin, German literature; John Paul Smith, Austin, philosophy; Dorothy Ann Stroup, Fort Leavenworth, Kan., botany; Servando G. Tijerina, San Diego, Latin American studies, and John Edmund Woods, Houston, Middle East studies.

Six of the 14 followed the "Plan II" liberal arts degree program in their undergraduate work. The four-year invitational program is open only to outstanding high school graduates.

Woodrow Wilson Fellows are nominated by faculty members and then go through a careful process of selection, including personal interviews. Most of those selected are in the humanities and social sciences, although a few are chosen from the natural sciences. Professional fields such as law, medicine, engineering, education, home economics and business administration are not within the program's scope. Fellows may express a preference to attend any graduate school in the U. S. or Canada, subject to review by the Foundation and acceptance by the college or university selected. The Foundation makes direct grants (\$2,000 for each fellow) to graduate schools at which Woodrow Wilson Fellows are enrolled, for the support of graduate students beyond the first year.

The quota of Woodrow Wilson Fellowships for a region is governed by the number of college degrees awarded in the region. The Texas-Louisiana quota this year was 59, out of the national total of 1,000.

Dr. Roger P. McCutcheon, University of Texas visiting professor of English and consultant in special programs, is Woodrow Wilson Fellowship Foundation national representative for the South. Dr. Otis A. Singletary, College of Arts and Sciences associate dean, is regional chairman for Texas and Louisiana.

Dr. McCutcheon describes Woodrow Wilson Fellows as "self-starting students who have learned how to use their brains and love it." Those who have studied foreign languages in high school and college have a better chance of selection than those who have not, he points out. Most graduate schools require that candidates for advanced degrees be able to read two foreign languages.

The fellowship program began at Princeton University in 1945. After 1952 the fellowships were underwritten jointly by the 37 members of the Association of American Universities, including the University of Texas, and by the Carnegie Corporation and General Education Board. In 1957 a large grant from the Ford Foundation made it possible to increase the number of fellowships to 1,000 a year.

Floyd Bradshaw Candidate for State Senator

A constructive Record. Not a Platform of Promises.

Floyd Bradshaw, a candidate for a second term in the Texas Senate, is a veteran of World War II and has served four terms in the House of Representatives from Parker, Wise and Jack Counties. He is a school teacher, married and has a wife and four children. He is a graduate of East Texas State Teachers College and a member of the Christian Church.

Bradshaw has consistently worked to promote soil and water conservation, better roads, schools, aid to the needy and benefits for veterans. He was author of the constitutional amendment giving Texas servicemen and women the right to vote. While in the House of Representatives Bradshaw served as Chairman of Education, Claims and Accounts and Sub-Committee of Appropriations Committee for Junior and Senior Colleges. Upon being elected to the Texas Senate, he was appointed to five major committees. He is presently Chairman of the Insurance Committee, Chairman of Senate Finance Health, State Affairs, Education and Claims and Accounts.

During the interim, he is serving on the Cost of Government Committee to find ways and means of cutting out wasteful and unnecessary spending and the Texas Educational Standards Commission.

Senator Bradshaw was author of several insurance reform laws that brought about strict regulation that put many insolvent companies out of business. He was author of two Bills that repealed several hundred old outdated laws that hampered the freedom and operation of local county government. Bradshaw has vigorously opposed restrictive regulatory laws promoted by special interest groups.

Some of the laws sponsored by Bradshaw are listed here for your consideration. Rebuilt fire-trailer Deaf Mute school; relocated and rebuilt old Blind, Deaf and Orphan School for colored children; New training school at Gatesville to segregate young offenders from hardened juvenile repeaters; flood control and water improvement districts in Eastland, Denton, Jack, Palo Pinto, Wise and Parker Counties; resolution creating agency to handle surplus property for schools and school lunch program. Bradshaw has been active in supporting measures to enact animal health legislation that would benefit the farmer, dairyman, and rancher.

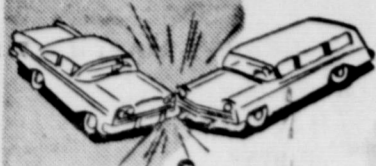
