Larry Hollis picked up eight yards in two tries and Clint Humphreys, Mav quarterback, got five for a first down on the 18. Hollis got another yard, then the Mavs were penalized back to the 22. Humphreys went to the air and hit Halfback Billy Don Turner over the middle of the line on about the 15. Turner turned on the speed and turned his nose for paydirt. He got to the one before driven out of bounds, and on first down Humphreys took it across. Hollis passed to End Philip Lewis for the extra points, and the scoring was over for the night.

Hollis kept DeLeon off balance with some beautiful punt returns. He had runbacks of 17, 15, and 29 yards.

Television Educational Network To Feature Well Known Educators

Dr. James B. Conant, president of Harvard University, who is directing a study of the American high school, is among the outstanding educators who will appear on the state-wide Texas educational network during the 1958-1959 school year. H. R. (Pop) Garrett, county school superintendent, has revealed.

"Texas Curriculum Studies," to be televised as a public service by 29 Texas television stations beginning the first week in October, is co-sponsored by the Texas Association of School Administrators and the Texas Education Agency.

Main objective of the new series is to stimulate state-wide study of the school curriculum, grades 1-12. All viewers of the telecasts, including lay citizens, will be asked to make suggestions and recommendations to the eleven study commissions which were activated earlier this year by the State Board of Education and which will be continuing their studies throughout the 1958-59 school year.

In addition to Dr. Conant, guest instructors who will appear on the television series include Dr. Alvin C. Eurbach, vice-president of the Fund for the Advancement of Education; Dr. Frederick Eby, noted Texas educational philosopher; Dr. Hollis Moore, Tyler superintendent; Robert Ashworth, Amarillo superintendent; Dr. L. D. Paskev and Dr. W. T. Guy, The University of Texas; Mrs. Dorothy Ercken, Southern Methodist University; Dr. C. C. Doak, Texas A&M College; Dr. James Taylor, Southwest Texas State Teachers College; and numerous other Texas educators and classroom teachers.

The television series will emphasize the exploration of new ideas

in the areas of guidance, the natural sciences, mathematics, English, and the social sciences, but will have implications for the total school curriculum. Lee Wilson, assistant commissioner for instruction, Texas Education Agency, will serve as moderator for the television programs.

Experienced teachers will be viewing the television series as members of in-service study groups which will be formed in virtually every Texas school system. Each local superintendent is asked to provide opportunities for lay citizens to participate in the preparation of suggestions and recommendations to the curriculum commissions.

As in the past two years, more than forty cooperating teacher education institutions will enroll college graduates for a telecourse based on the educational programs. Upon satisfactory completion of the telecourse, students will receive a teaching permit valid in Texas for one year and renewable for two additional years.

"Texas Curriculum Studies" is a successor to the "Adventures in Education" series last year which had 543 television students.

The local superintendent determines in his own satisfaction whether a person recruited through the television course is the best qualified person available to fill a specified teaching vacancy. Each college or university establishes its own procedure for screening and enrolling applicants and determines the additional course requirements which must be met by each enrollee desiring to qualify for permanent certification.

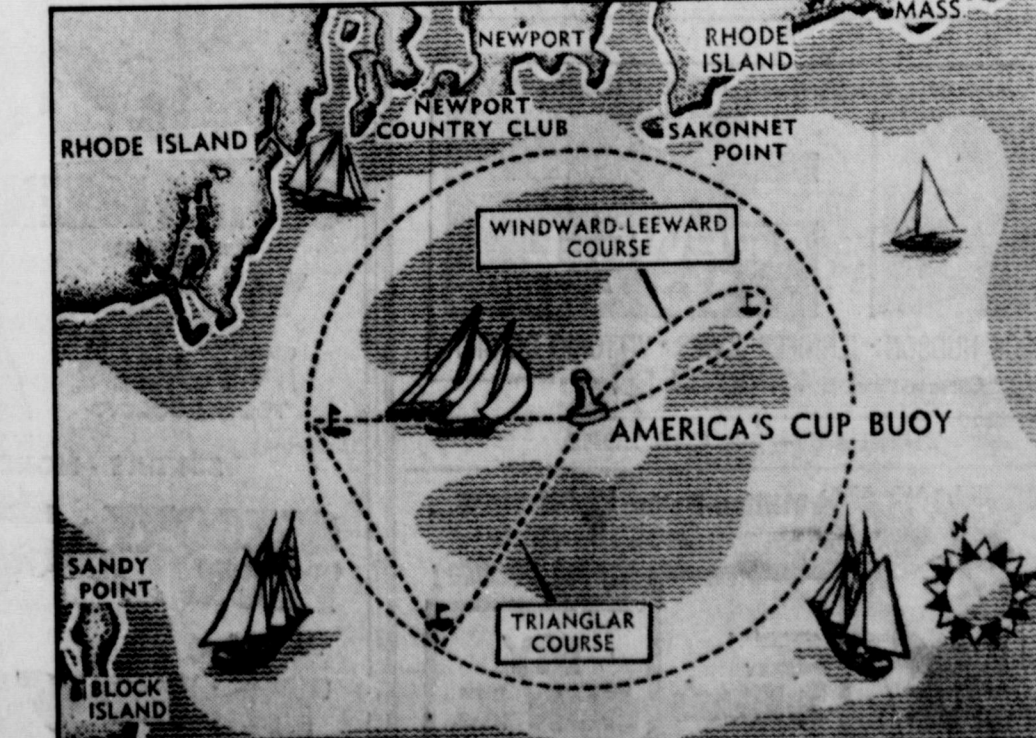

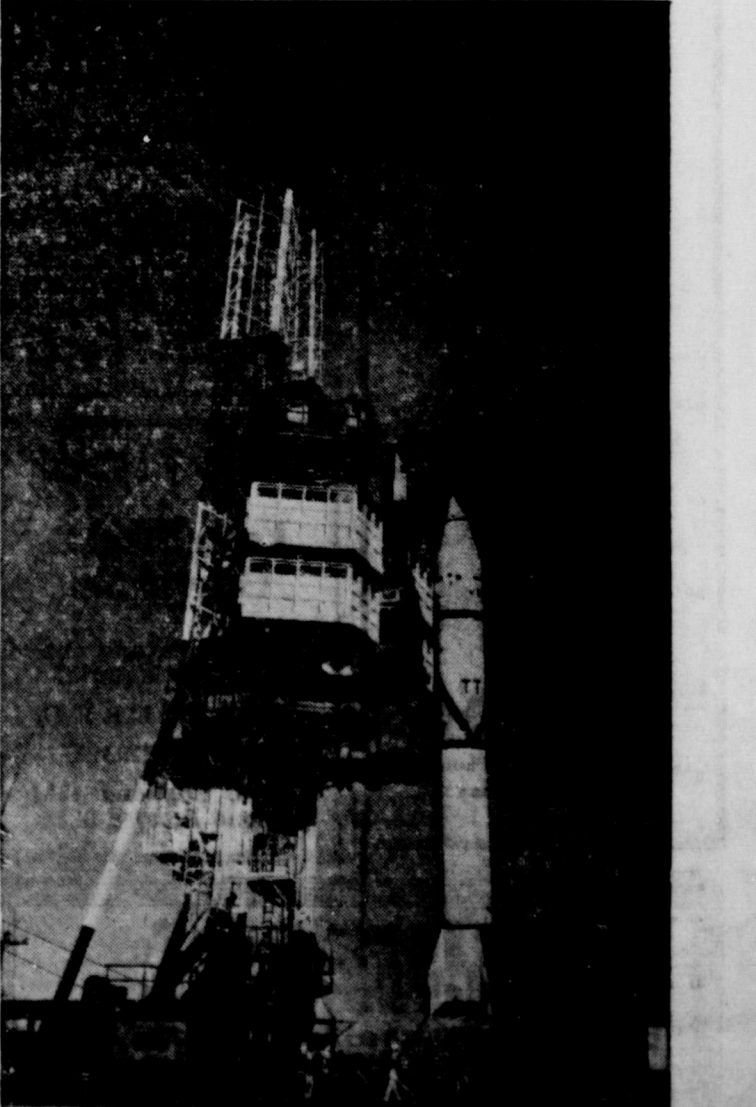
Thomas L. Gregg Participates In Combat Training

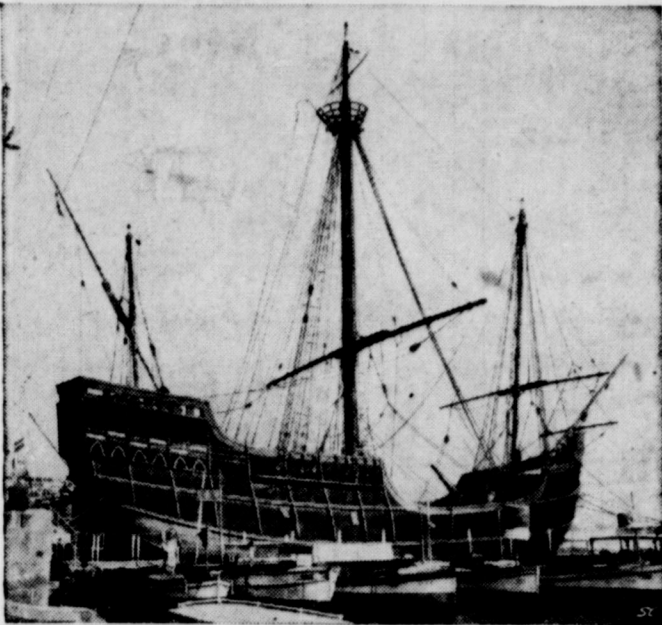

Spain's Replica Of The "Santa Maria"



The harbor at Barcelona, Spain is the busiest in the Mediterranean. But one ship never sails. A full-size replica of Columbus's flagship, the "Santa Maria," rides at dockside so visitors may inspect it and pay homage to The Great Navigator.

On October 12, America celebrates Columbus Day.

In the coming year, hundreds of thousands of Americans will pay Christopher Columbus additional honor while visiting Spain, the country which sponsored his Voyage of Discovery 466 years ago and which today carefully preserves the landmarks of his career as symbols of the historic link between Spain and America.

Many of the places associated with Columbus are located in Andalusia, Spain's sun-drenched winter vacationland. Columbus had his first interview with King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella in the city of Cordoba. At Granada, in the ornate Alhambra palace,

visitors can stand where Isabella stood in 1492 when she pledged her jewels to finance Columbus's first voyage. The majestic tomb of Columbus occupies a place of honor in the cathedral of Seville.

Scholars still study at the University of Salamanca where Columbus consulted the royal astronomers. And Barcelona, with its replica of the "Santa Maria," was the scene of Columbus's triumphant return from the New World. Tourists can visit the cavernous reception hall where he presented the Catholic Majesties with Indians, tobacco and tomatoes—the first ever seen in Europe.

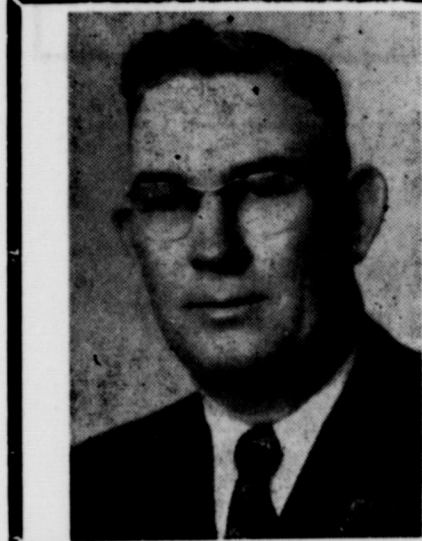
