Funeral was at 10:30 a.m. Wednesday in the Bunker Funeral Chapel.

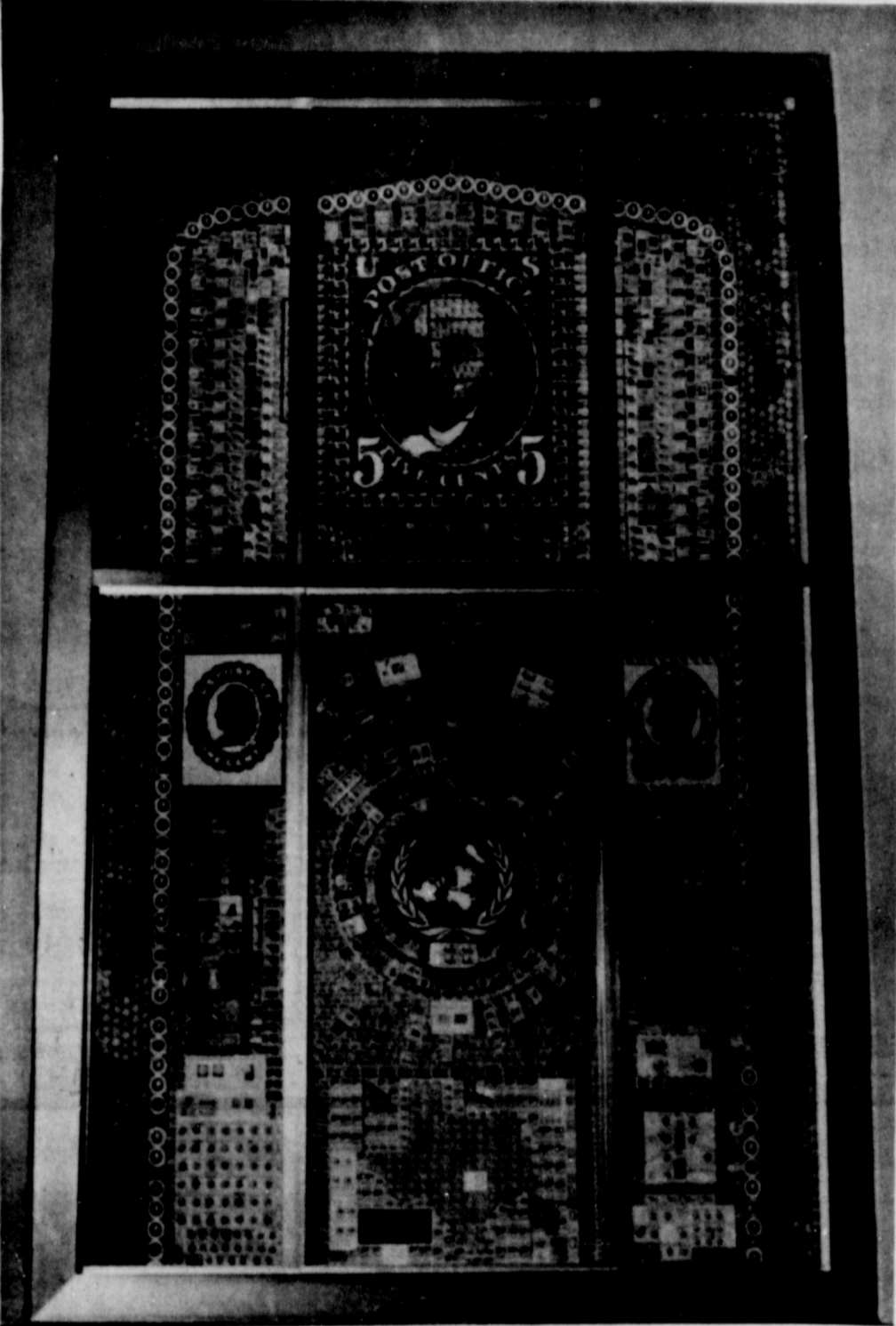
The Rev. Cecil Ellis, pastor of the First Methodist Church, officiated with burial in the Eastland Cemetery.

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Methodist Choir History

June 1971
Written by Mrs. Grady Pipkin, contralto in this choir, since 1920, at request of the church choir and pastor. I have occupied the same chair in the choir, which Miss Dragoo assigned to me, since we moved into the church in 1928. Wilda died, March 12, 1948.

When the program committee asked me to give a history of the choir, I thought I had an easy assignment but when I began thinking back over the years, I realized I had accepted a big job. The choir of this church has played an important part in the worship service and to give a very detailed history would be important. I shall just try to select the highlights in the life of the choir and refresh your memories on some of these things.

Rev. Z.R. Fee was pastor when we came here in 1919; Mrs. Ed A. Hill was church pianist and was assisted by Mrs. Fee. Mr. Robert F. Jones was one of the most active members; Mrs. P.S. Wolfe, who now lives in Corpus Christi was choir leader as I recall. The church was a small frame building on this very ground. Rev. Langston came that fall to replace Rev. Fee and the next year we moved to the Tabernacle. Mrs. Hill played some for us. Mrs. Dragoo had come here to live and she also played the piano.

In the choir were Mrs. Mae Harrison, Mrs. Jones, Mrs. Wolfe, Pony Harrison, Mrs. Will Martin and others I can't remember.

That year two young girls came out from Ft. Worth, the Dragoo sisters, Wilda, violinist, and Wanda, Pianist, to spend the holidays with their parents. We didn't know it then but these two were later to come to be very important factors in the cultural life of Eastland. About 1922, we moved to the basement of the church. The choir sat on the raised platform and gave as much as any volunteer choir should, to the church. During three or four years, we worshipped in the basement. The Missionary Society purchased and presented to the church the wonderful concert grand piano which now stands in the main auditorium of this church. Mrs. Frank Singleton, wife of our pastor, played for the choir and church services.

During the second year of the Singleton pastorate, Miss Wilda Dragoo came here to live and was immediately elected choir director. This was about 1924. When it was decided to finish the church building proper, our services were held in the building now known as the "Mickle Building". That year, Christmas 1927, this choir gave its first Christmas Cantata. The east side of the building (part of it at least) had a raised platform for the choir and minister. Mrs. Seaberry decorated the large store windows with Christmas

scenes, done in Bon Ami to keep out the street view and make us think we were in a beautiful building. Mrs. Robey was working, a faithful member and if I am not mistaken, the first president of the choir. Mrs. Singleton played the piano. We had a very elaborate candlelight procession and all in all it was a most successful presentation. From this beginning and directed and encouraged by Wilda Dragoo, we have missed very few occasions giving a cantata or a musical evening.

In 1928 the church was finished. I believe the highlight of the life of this choir was the Sunday morning of April 1928 that we sang for the first time in the lovely auditorium, which we have all come to love. We sang for our main anthem, "The Builders" - that anthem will always be a reminder of that thrilling occasion. Rev. Singleton was still here; his wife, our pianist, and Mr. and Mrs. Loventhal were soprano and bass; B.M. Collie, still Mr. Jones, "Texaco" we had come to call him by then, and many others. Wilda Dragoo was still director in 1928. That year we gave the cantata "The Prince of Peace." Singletons had moved and Mrs. Charles Norton was accompanist. It must always be kept in mind that this has always been a volunteer choir, very few if any trained voices and to me it has always been a mystery how Miss Dragoo could produce as finished programs as she has. Only hard work on the part of the choir and director could have done it.

In 1929 Mrs. Gibson was our accompanist. She was the wife of the football coach and was as faithful to her job as Wilda was to hers. That year, the ground was white with snow. Our Cantata was "The First Christmas."

In 1930, our cantata was "Yuletide Memories and it must have been a favorite of ours because we have given it twice since.

If our audience remembers it, they are too polite to say so. They act as if they enjoy it.

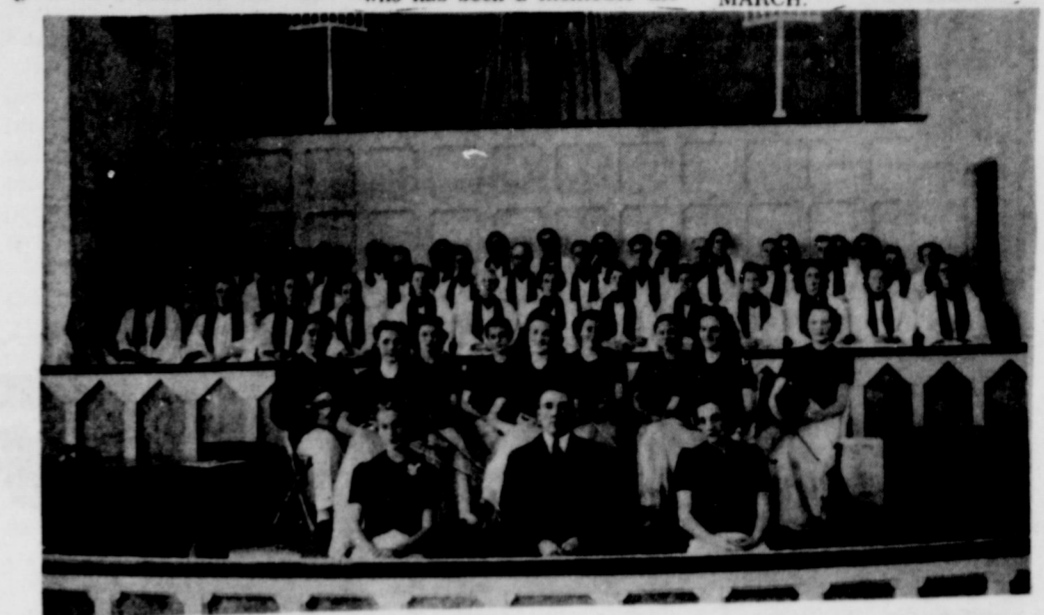
For one cantata during this period Mrs. Bennie Butler was our pianist.

1932 was our banner year because our reputation as a singing group had spread to the neighboring towns. Br. Shearer was pastor; Mrs. Gibson, pianist. At Easter time we gave "The Dawn of Easter" and we literally went to town because we were invited to go to Sweetwater and also Breckenridge. Mr. Know, Pop, as he is known to everyone was an addition to our bass and a loyal member of the choir. We still had Mrs. Robey, Mrs. Harrison, Mrs. Ed. Wilman, Mr. Jones and Mr. P.B. Bittle. That year we repeated a previous Christmas Cantata.

Clara June Kimble became our pianist in 1933 and we gave "The Good Shepherd" in April, an all purpose Cantata. That year we were invited to present it in Abilene. We started on a Sunday afternoon; got as far as Baird and were caught in a terrible hail storm. We rushed into any place that could protect our cars from damage. When the storm was over we proceeded on our way as if nothing had happened. Our Christmas Cantata was "The World's True Light".

In 1933 Rev. E.R. Stanford was pastor and somehow we got invited back to Breckenridge to give our Cantata, "The Infant King". snow covered everything but we went just the same.

Bro. Walker came in the fall of 1939 and at Easter, March 28,

1940, we gave "Easter Sunrise Song" which we gave Sunday morning and two hundred people were turned away for lack of seats. At Christmas "The Music of Christmas" was sung and somewhere along the way, we had put on robes which were by this time, well worn and the suggestion of Mr. Walker, the present style was adopted.

Maurice Harkins was a soloist with us in 1938 as was Mrs. Jack Armstrong, a lovely soprano, in looks and voice. Leslie Cook was singing and we had Mr. Bert Clifton, a good bass. We have always had Mr. W.E. Trimbel from Carbon, who has helped us each year with our special music. Also Marene Johnson-Johnson came here about this time and her lovely soprano voice was a wonderful addition.

In 1938 was also the year we took another forward step. We bought the wonderful pipe organ. The plan was worked out by Br. Walker. Organ committee was as follows: Mr. and Mrs. John Turner, Miss Dragoo, Mrs. Perkins, and Br. Walker. I believe Mrs. Robey made the first contribution to the organ fund. When she moved to Austin, the year before she left her check with Bro. Walker as the first subscriber when time came to buy an organ.

That year inspired by the organ, the choir gave the "Crucifixion" which we later presented in Abilene Church. Clara June Kimble was our accompanist.

In 1939 our Cantata was "Yuletide Memories". This

closes with the "Hallelujah Chorus" which may explain why we love to sing it.

1940 saw the addition of a second choir, the Harmony Girls, who sang from the balcony and the Cantata was "On Wings of Angel Song". Lance Webb was our pastor. Miss Dragoo directed the Harmony Girls, for they were her devoted students. Miss Clara June Kimble was pianist also for this group.

About this time Clara June moved away and we were sure we'd never find another organist as good but we were surely wrong for one of our own boys, Homer Meek, one of Wilda's students, became organist and thrilled us all with his wonderful music. He played for us about two years, the this past summer he left to work in Dallas and our organist became Miss Martha June Morehart, who is as faithful, loyal, and efficient as we could desire.

The last two Christmas' the Harmony Girls have given the Christmas music and Wilda has allowed some of us, like faithful firehorses, to relax and sit out front and enjoy the youth and beauty and young fresh voices of the Harmony Girls.

In addition to serving for regular church services, we have been called upon at various times to give sacred programs for club conventions, church conferences and at least once we wait perfectly still and quiet for three whole hours during one of the Good Friday observances during Br. Walker's pastorate.

Another one of Miss Dragoo's

organizations has been an important factor in the choir work. I refer to the Dragoo Octette, whose wonderful playing has contributed much to the success of our programs in recent years. Octet players included Alma Williamson, Murle Dean Murrell, Evelyn Long, Nancy Seaberry, Glenna Johnson, Doneice Parker, Margaret Hart Blanchard, Leo Wolf, Elaine Crossley, Rose Ann Woods, and Gloria Graham.

No history of this Choir would be complete without this statement. We have always had huge crowds - church completely filled to hear these special programs. 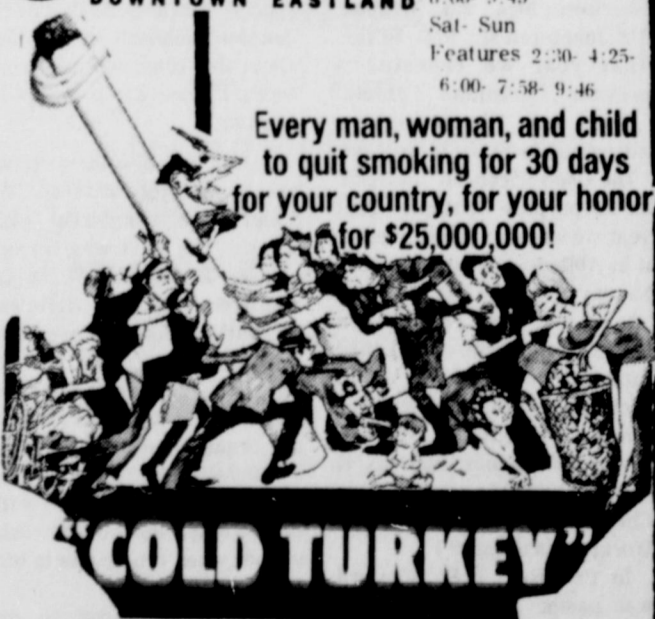

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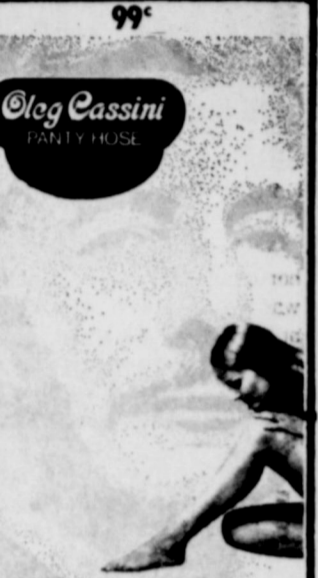
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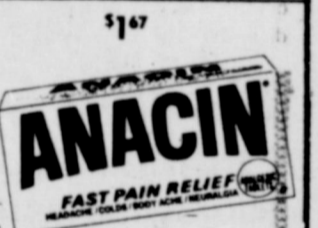

Gorman Physician's Wife Tells Lions, Guest About Cuba

Cuba is a victim of its own blindness, Mrs. Maria Pino of Gorman told members and guests of the Eastland Lions Club at noon Tuesday as she drew parallels with her adopted country now and individual lives.

The pretty Cuban mother admonished her audience to "pray for your government," urging that citizens stand behind the leaders, and pray that they make right decisions. She alluded to the present national problems, and the need to "leave it to the leaders" and pray to God that they be directed.

"It's worked in my personal life and I believe it can work for the nation," she said. After finding Christ some three years ago, she said, she learned to follow the direction of the Bible in letting the father be the head of the house, and praying for his right decisions.

Before then, "I did my own thing, as did the other members of my family, and it was disaster; a disaster, much like

the fate of Cuba. . .

Primarily a Catholic country, the people were "religious" in their own way she said, but they weren't really concerned about God's will. They were experimenting with voo-doo, ESP, fortune tellers, spiritualism, and the other things that finally led to total disaster for the country.

We were taught, she said, to stay clear of the "rotten government; just to leave it to the rotten politicians," and we did, and you see what happened.

Crookedness in government was the accepted thing, she said, and because of the un-concern of the people, Castro moved in after Batista and his corrupt government "flew away" on New Year's Eve, 1958. Castro and his guerrilla bands were in the hills in the opposite end of the country and they just moved to Havana, taking over.

Opening her talk by telling about the many natural blessings the country enjoyed

(perfect climate and fertile soil), she told how the people, who were "probably too happy-go-lucky" just let things ride, paving the way for the disaster that came.

Her husband is a physician and they made application in 1962 to leave the country. She was permitted to leave in 1966 with the children. It was eleven months later before her husband was permitted to come. They brought his parents and her parents, and thought that once they were all re-settled in the new country that all would be well. But it wasn't, she said.

They found that they were still their old selves, doing the things they'd done before, and found that their home once again was crumbling. Their second disaster came with a break-up of their home.

Coming full circle, she explained how they were helped when she came face to face with God, and finally turned it over to Him, and asked for His will. It wasn't immediate, but it came," she said, "and God restored our home."

Since that time she and her husband have dedicated themselves to telling their story to as many as who will hear. They attend the Catholic Church in Brownwood regularly, except on those days when Dr. Pino cannot get out of town because of his practice. On those days, they attend the Methodist Church in Gorman.

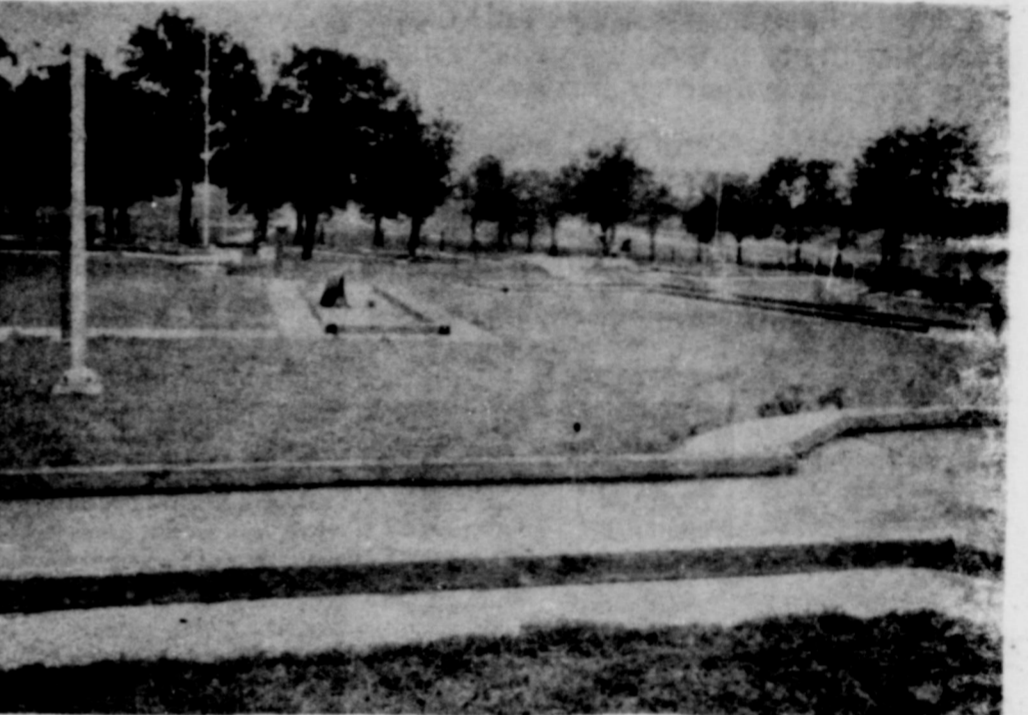
