The Rev. Cecil Ellis, pastor of the First Methodist Church, officiated with burial in the Eastland Cemetery.


Born Dec. 14, 1899, in Eastland, he was a veteran of World War II.

One of the most popular sports played in England and several other Commonwealth countries today is cricket.

Baseball was developed from cricket. In both games, one player pitches or bowls a ball and an opposing player tries to hit the ball with a bat and score tea break. runs. The team that scores the must runs wins.

Cricket is played on a level. oval-shaped field of grass. The action centers around two wickets. There are three short stumps on each wicket with two bails (sticks) connecting the tops of the stumps. A member of the fielding side called the howler stands behind one of the wickets. The bowler bowls (delivers) the ball with a stiffarmed motion at the opposing wicket, trying to knock off one of the bails. The ball usually bounces off the ground before hitting the wicket. The batsmen or striker stands at the far wicket facing the bowler. The striker uses a long flatsided bat to hit the ball. If he drives the ball into the field, he






