

Perkins Visits Old Walled Arab Village

(Editor's Note: This is the second in a series of articles written for the Telegram by Joseph M. Perkins of Eastland, who is touring Africa.)

After a most interesting day I am back on board ship and have D. N. Morrison to I. J. Henson, just had a roastbeef supper.

This morning, knowing we would be in port all day, we split up into three sightseeing parties, Don Parrish, my cabinmate, and decided to walk first to the Seaman's Service Center, an English speaking institution on a non-

Most of Medina's inhabitants are Arabs. The men wear trebans and baggy trousers. The v nen nearly all wear veils and ats that faintly resemble rainc ts. Streets were paved with col estones and were decently closn. We saw shops of all kinds and the markets reminded us of the Toluca markets in Mexico, with many kinds of fruits, vegetables, and a ot of edibles that we could not classify. As we passed a shoeshop I heard a rooster crow inside

After spending nearly hours in old Medina we went to the business district of Casablanca. Modern stores, office build-ings, hotels and transportation facilities were there. We parted, as I wanted to take a bus or train to Fadala, a seaside town 15 miles north and I went by electric train and the service was excellent. It appears to be run by the French and the timetables are printed in both French and Laird, MML. The streets are crooked and nar are printed in both French and Stewart Slation to First Fed- row and run in every direction, Arabic. The country is fertile so we steered by the sun! One and market gardening seems to be a probitable occupation. However, primitive methods prevail with Arab men, women and children working the fields. I saw squash, peas, beans, etc. from the train. We sail at midnight tonight.
