





> was recorded in Harris County, which had an increase of 277,740. The combined increase of Harris and Dallas, Bexar, and Tarrant Counties, the three other counties which had increases in excess of 100,000, accounted for more than three-fifths of the population gain for the entire State.

In 1350 there were 719 places in Texas incorporated as cities, towns, or villages and 47 unincorporated places of 1,000 inhab-fants or more. Of the 5,080,431 inhabitants. The incorporated places, 467,765 were living in the 461 places of fewer than 2,500 inhabitants.
