Result of Texas 1959 Corn Crop

College Station, Texas 30, Har-per 3 and Texas 28 produced average yields of about 70 bushels per acre to lead all hybrids in the 1959 Texas corn performance test cerpts from "Manzoni Requiem" conducted by the Texas Agricltural Experiment Station.

These hybrids showed a wide range of adaptation by ranking at or near the top in each of the individual test.
