McMinn was arrested by Sheriff J. B. Williams and Highway Patrolman Les Strawn while at work n Olden. They made the arrest after finding gray hair and dried blood on the fender of McMinn's yellow 1950 pickup, Sheriff Williams sa'd. Yellow pa'nt was found on the clothes worn by the victim.
