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

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



Reflecting the increased domestic demand and depressed domestic production during the latest three months, U. S inventories of crude oil at the end of July were down about 41 million barrels and total crude oil and product inventories were down 44 million barrels to about 775 million barrels. from July of 1957, IPAA stated.

"Assumin gthe above demand estimates and seasonal changes in inventories, the total new supply required during the next three months, September - Nopember, is expected to average about 9,300,-000 barrels daily. Based on schedules submitted to the Texas Railroad Commission, total imports are expected to average 1,500,000 barrels daily. Domestic production of natural gas liquids are estimated at 800,000 barrels daily. Market for domestic crude oil, therefore, is expected to average about 7,-000,000 barrels daily during the September - November period approximately the same as estimat-ed production in August," IPAA



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
