Construction of a new service center for Texas Electric Service Co. is scheduled to get underway this month, according to Frank Sayre, division manager for the company.

The center will be located on a seven-acre tract, purchased from the Eastland Industrial Foundation, in the Industrial Park near the airport. Abbott Construction Co. of Odessa is contractor for the new center.

Two tan metal buildings will be erected, one for an office warehouse and the other for a garage for the vehicles used in distribution, engineering, maintenance and operations for an area extending out some 45 miles around Eastland. Mr. J.W. Hogan is Division Engineering Manager.


The grounds around the buildings will be landscaped so they will be an attractive part of the surrounding area, Sayre said.

Completion of the project is set for the latter part of August, and service center employees

are planning to move to their new headquarters about the first of September. They have

been operating from the downtown office site for a number of years.

Centennial Library Building Paid Off During Celebration Week

Appropriately the new library building, which has been named after Eastland County's Centennial Year, was paid for during Centennial

Week, Mrs. Dan Childress said Friday.

Mrs. Childress is president of the Thursday Afternoon Study Club which is sponsoring the Centennial Memorial Library. "The \$15,000 note which paid for the building itself will be officially 'burned' at the club's last meeting of the season, a luncheon, Thursday," she said, "although payment was actually made during Centennial Week."

Generous contributions plus an additional \$337.56 from the rummage close-out sale brought the Fund total receipts to \$18,300.11, well past the halfway mark toward the estimated \$30,000 which will be needed.

Total receipts for the rummage sale were \$1,163.00 including that which was previously reported.

The building committee will meet in the evening, May 17th, and everyone who is interested is invited to the planning session. Tentative plans have been drawn and will be shown at that time.



Services were held at 10:30 a.m. Saturday in Arrington Funeral Chapel with Rev. Cecil Ellis of the First United Methodist Church, officiating. Interment was in Eastland Cemetery under the direction of Arrington Funeral Home.

Mr. Clyatt was born Oct. 27, 1918, in Ranger. He was a graduate of Tarleton State College School of Veterinary. He was a veteran of World War II and a member of the First United Methodist Church of Eastland.

Survivors include two brothers: Glenn Clyatt of Port Huene, Calif., and Marvin L. Green of Eastland. He is also survived by his mother, Mrs. Mary Ellen Clyatt of Eastland.

Speech Testing Reset For May 15


Testing of next year's First Grade pupils by a speech therapist has been rescheduled for Tuesday, May 15. Please call 629-2377 for an appointment.



Gordon Spot

I looked for some old reports of agricultural activities in the County Agents office. The oldest I found was the 1946 annual report by J.M. Cooper. I thought it might be interesting to read some of the statements in this report. It all happened in Eastland County in 1946.

The County Livestock Raisers Association accomplished its goal of building a permanent stock show barn in October. The directors voted nine to six to award the annual show to Cisco for the next five

years. The six minority votes went to Ranger who still plans to build a show barn according to J.M. Cooper.

With his registered Hereford bull and heifer, Tom Grissom, A 4-H Club member, won both grand champion awards at the annual county stock show held in Ranger in the Spring of 1946.

Bobby Cleveland of Cisco had the grand champion steer, and 850 pound calf that was auctioned off for a price of 35 cents per pound.

Some two dozen ranchers

over the county used a new spray, DDT, for fly control with very good results. The horse fly, however, was found to be immune to DDT and gave the cattle plenty of trouble Cooper said.

"It's the best corn I ever saw and I know its the best I ever grew," said Sam Seastrunk of the Carbon Community. Seastrunk's 9 acres of No. 12 hybrid corn produced 50 bushels per acre. "There is only one other patch of hybrid corn in the county that might equal it and that is on the P.M. Bay farm in the Scranton community," said Cooper.

Producing 60 bushels of No. 8 hybrid corn on an acre and a half was the record of J.B. Hagan of the Pleasant Hill community.

Through the courtesy of local feed dealers, forty-four bags of No. 12 and 18 hybrid seed corn was distributed to forty-four 4-H club boys over the county. "It made 50 bushels per acre and was the best corn in the Community," Dee Williamson of the Colony Community said of his son Gerald's corn crop.

The most outstanding demonstration of a winter cover crop was on O.A. Criswell's farm four miles North of Rising Star. The rye was five feet high and the vetch from one-half to three-fourths as high.

Melva Love of the Alameda Community harvested one acre to get 420 pounds of vetch seed with just a scattering of rye. He plowed the rest of his field under in order to plant peanuts as did his brother John, another demonstration in the same community.

"My flock of 100 laying hens are now back in production and doing fine after the bluestone vinegar treatment," W.T. Gregory of the Carbon Community told Cooper.

Clearing \$790.00 from his poultry demonstration of 225 hens is the story of S.E. Miers of the Gorman community.

Mrs. John Thurman of the Staff community raised a total of 490 turkeys out of the 496 she started with last Spring. In 1946, 185 farmers grew 8,803 turkeys in Eastland County.

Wyman Blair another poultry

demonstrator believes that it pays to cull his laying hens each month. He had from 600 to 1,000 birds on his small farm between Eastland and Cisco. Blair candles, grades and stamps his select eggs and sells them for a premium in Eastland and Cisco.

Eastland County farmers on December 1 were about three-fourths through with harvesting a two and one half million dollar peanut crop off of 60,000 acres. The yield in 1945 averaged 15 bushels per acre, but Cooper thinks that the yield in '46 will be several bushels higher on the average.

Over 200 attended the second annual peanut field day and show held in Cisco September 14. Charles McDaniel, Carbon 4-H boy, took first place on his single bunch of peanuts out of 96 entries. He was awarded ten sacks of 4-12-4 fertilizer.

Miss Marjorie Hines of Pleasant Hill was crowned Peanut Queen that night.

"Although the present price of peanuts is very good, many of the peanut farmers are wondering what the future holds for them in the way of peanut prices," Cooper reports.

One of the most successful peanut growers in W.B. Starr of the Scranton Community.

Biggest objective in improving pecan practices was to train men and boys to bud pecans thereby improving the quality of the nuts produced in the county.

Demonstrations were given in the patch budding method to over 500 men and boys, principally 4-H boys. Some of the men and boys developed an amazing talent very quickly in budding pecans.

"I sprayed my pecans with an arsenical spray and got a good crop," reports Doss Alexander of the Pioneer community.

Sparked by active farm demonstration and with help of the SCS, FHA, the AAA and other public spirited citizens, landowners, and to some extent tenants, have seen, a vision that better conservation means better business, better homes, and more contented people.

There were 472 4-H Club boys enrolled in the county in eleven different clubs located

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

Farmers Union News

The Texas Farmers Union Board of Directors accused the Nixon Administration of singling out agriculture as the "scapegoat" in the inflation spiral. The farm organization county presidents meeting in Waco on Saturday adopted a strong resolution calling on Congress to limit the Administration's discretionary power in negotiating international trade agreements affecting agriculture.

It urged strong farm programs and dismissed the recently released Flannigan Report as another "piece of propaganda drummed up by anti-farm program forces."

Turning to the problem of fuel shortages, the Farmers Union Board pointed out that the future supply of farm commodities is being threatened by the shortage, real or fabricated, of farm fuels, tractor tires, and other agricultural inputs. The Board called on Congress to use its authority and influence on the Administration to roll back prices on farm-used petroleum to a level not to exceed prices on the date that ceilings were imposed on beef prices, and to investigate shortages of agricultural supplies. The Board pointed out that independent wholesalers and jobbers of petroleum products are being squeezed out of business by the major oil companies, and that the distribution system to agricultural producers is being seriously crippled. The Board resolved that it would join the efforts of organizations representing independent distributors of petroleum products in their effort to get fair and equal treatment for the independent businessmen who service the rural areas.

The Board applauded the efforts of Texas Farmers Union and National Farmers Union in winning the fight to reestablish the Emergency Disaster Loan Program. In light of the continued wet weather across Texas, the farm organization leaders resolved that the qualification period for disaster relief should be updated and that the period of time for qualification for disaster relief should be extended from June 30, 1972, through the 1972-73 crop and livestock production year.



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DPS Looking For Recruits

Department of Public Safety Major E.K. Browning, Jr., Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety's 49 County West Texas Region, announced today that an intensive effort is being made to recruit men and women for a school to begin at the Department's Academy in Austin, June 26, 1973.

Major Browning stated this is the first time since the Department was created in 1925 that applications are being accepted from women for the position of Patrolman. Major Browning said the Department has been successful in recruiting persons from minority groups to the position of Patrolman. Efforts

to recruit from these groups are continuing for this school. All persons making application for the position of Patrolman must be between 20 and 35 years of age, between 68 inches and 76 inches of height, must weigh not less than 20 pounds nor more than 3 1/2 pounds per inch of height and visual acuity no worse than 20-40 correctable to 20-20. A person must be of good moral character, excellent physical condition and must have a minimum of 30 semester hours of college credit.

Persons selected as recruits will be assigned to Austin for an 18-week training school beginning June 26, at the Homer Garrison, Jr. Law Enforcement Academy. Successful graduates will be assigned to either the Highway Patrol Service, License and Weight Service, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service or the Driver License Service, according to the needs of the DPS and consideration of personal preference. The salary during training will be \$600 per month. Room and board while at the Academy will be approximately \$55 per month.

When a person is commissioned as a Patrolman, his salary will increase to \$743 per month. Patrolmen also receive longevity pay after five years of service, a monthly uniform cleaning allowance and travel expenses when away

Group life and hospitalization are paid for the employee, and dependent coverage is available at reasonable rates. Patrolmen participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, as well as Social Security, vacation, holidays and sick leave are provided.

Browning said interested men and women should contact any DPS office or Patrolman for an application. After completing the application, it should be presented to the DPS office either in Midland, Abilene, San Angelo or El Paso for the examinations.

Browning urged persons interested in attending the June 26 school to contact the Department immediately.

'Little' Winds Can Cause Big Damage!



Take a look at the speed of the strongest sustained winds, in miles per hour, occurring in various areas of the continental United States an average of once every fifty years. These are ordinary winds; figures for gusts and tornados are not included.

So-called "normal" winds can cause major damage to mobile homes if they are not tied down correctly. The devastation wreaked by hurricanes and tornados is generally well known. Statistics show that approximately 13,000 mobile homes will suffer more than \$1,000 each in damage from hurricane winds alone in an average year.

But the dangers from windstorms are not limited to these larger storms. According to George Cressman, director of the National Weather Service, "It is not only hurricanes and tornados which demolish mobile homes, but even more frequently the relatively unimpressive winds from severe thunderstorms, which often gust to more than 70 miles per hour and occur in all parts of the United States."

The National Weather Service is one of seven national weather and safety organizations working with the Mobile Living Communications Center (MLCC) to encourage mobile home owners to tie down their homes correctly. The groups have des-

igned May, 1973, as Tie Down Month.

Tie downs are a system of steel straps or cables which connect the mobile home to anchors imbedded in the ground. A combination of over-the-top and frame ties is usually suggested. Type of equipment and number of ties needed vary according to size of the mobile home, soil type at the location and prevailing wind conditions in the area. Average equipment cost ranges from \$90 to \$150. Contractor installation costs vary with location. Mobile home owners can install tie downs if they have the proper equipment and information at their disposal.

Proper tie down is one of the most effective means of reducing mobile home wind damage. For greatest safety, mobile home owners and their families are urged to go to a designated storm shelter during high windstorms.






