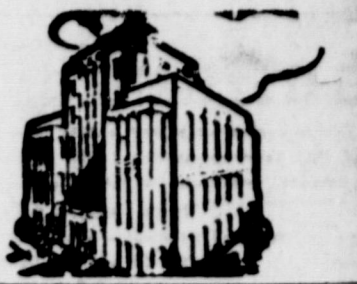

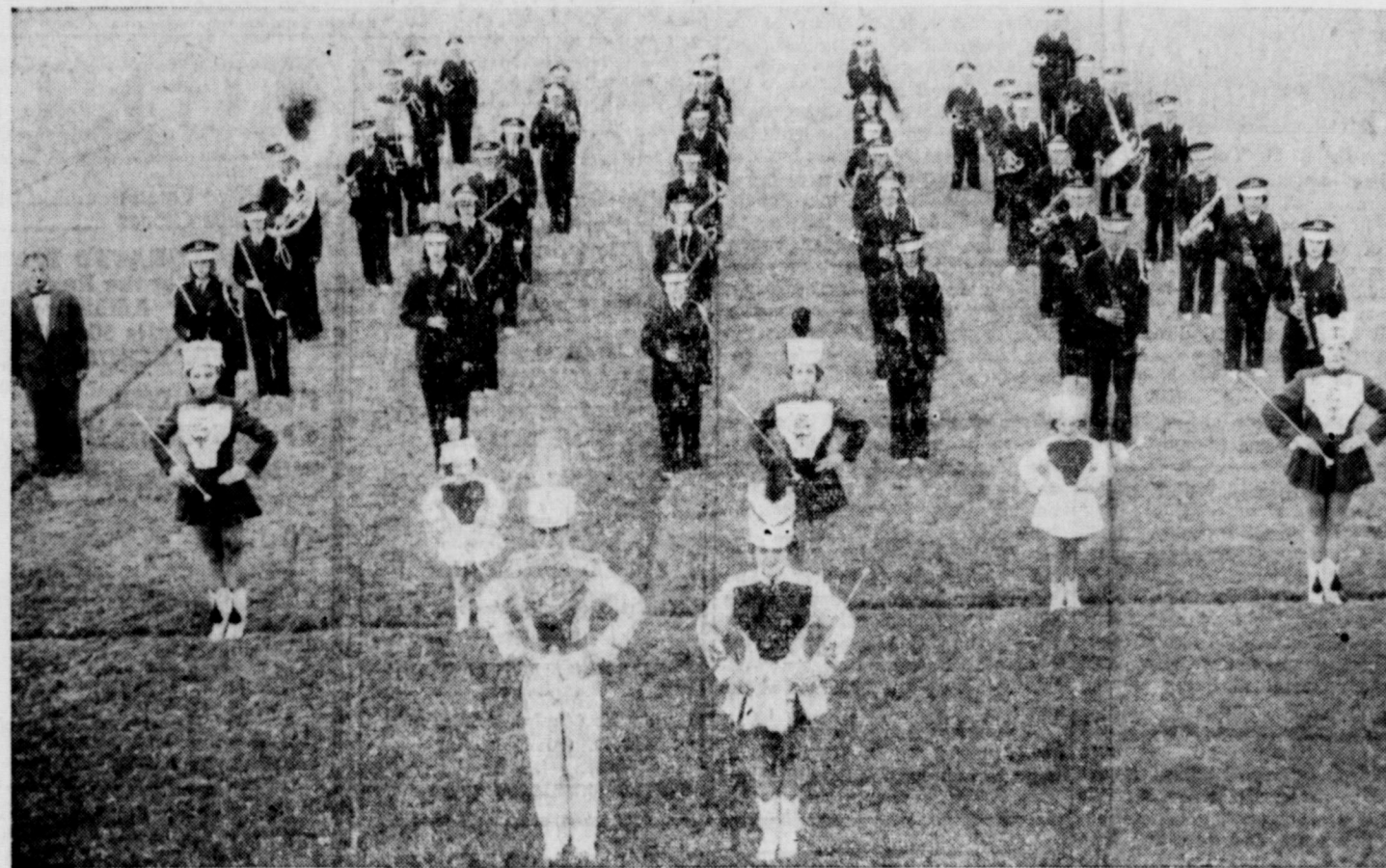

## Mavs Rest and Prepare For Tough 7-AA Tilt

A tough Eastland Maverick eleven will sit back and watch this week as they enjoy an open late before swinging into District 7 AA play next week against Coleman.

The Mavs, with three wins and two losses under their belts, will watch as Haskell tries to upset highly regarded Cisco and Winters plays host to Class AAA Colorado City. All other 7-AA teams also have open dates.

The Cisco-Haskell game is regarded as the affair to watch. Cisco is undefeated and untested after four games, and Haskell is generally regarded as their toughest test to date. From indications, however, the Lobos will probably continue to do just about as they desire. Haskell was held to a 14-14 tie last week against Coleman, and that indicates the Lobos will have the best team. Coleman had a hard time downing Comanche and Cisco beat the same team 36-0. Haskell has lost only one game. This was an 8-6 setback at the hands of Iowa Park, a team which has suffered defeat several times.

Last week against Albany the Mavs did well in the statistic department, despite the one-sided score. Eastland continued in their strange ways. They held the ball 72 offensive plays to just 51 for Albany. For the year the Mavs have made 102 points and have given up 75. Eastland has 67 first downs to 45 for five opponents, and the Mavs have 892 yards rushing while giving up 631.

In the passing game, Eastland has hit just 12 of 49 tosses, but that has been good for 387 yards. The opposition has completed 23 of 68, but that has netted them only 397 yards. Eastland has intercepted six passes and lost five. Larry Hollis and Clint Humphreys still have a 35 yard a try punting average in 19 boots. Five opponents have punted 27 times for a 30 yard average.

The Mavs have lost 220 yards in 19 penalties, but the opposition had 290 yards stepped off against them in 29 infractions. Eastland's worse department is fumbling. The Mavs have lost 17 fumbles and have recovered only 13 of their opponents. Larry Hollis carried the ball against Albany, but there was no doubt that he was the big gun in the Eastland attack. He got 58 yards in those eight tries for a

71 yard average. For the season he has made 286 yards in 72 carries for four yard average. In addition to that, he took a pass from Humphreys and raced 43 yards for a touchdown.

Humphreys passed for two touchdowns against Albany and made 55 yards on the ground. He carried the ball 24 times and passed 12 times. His running got him 75 yards for a 2.3 yard average. He has 158 yards in 58 trips for a 2.8 yard season average.

Mike Manning got 24 yards in nine carries for a 2.7 yard average Friday. He has 158 yards for the year in 36 carries for a 4.4 yard average. James McElreath had just four carries to his credit against Albany, but got 15 yards for a 3.7 yard average. In 27 carries this year he has netted 117 yards for a 4.3 yard average.

Billy Don Turner has a 3.9 season average with 152 yards in 39 trips. He got 15 yards in five carries for a three yard average in the Albany game.

## McCain Named Supervisor Of Zone Five

C. M. McCain was elected as new supervisor for Zone 5 of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District at a Zone meeting Tuesday night in the Texas Electric Service Co. conference room in Eastland.

McCain succeeds F. M. Spurlen, who has served as supervisor for the past five years.

B. B. Hickman of Rising Star, who is chairman of the Board of Supervisors, served as chairman for the election. H. W. Turney, supervisor from Dublin, acted as secretary.

Elim on the district program and small watershed protection program was shown to the group. Title of the film was "With Our Own Hands."

Turney and Hickman both made speeches praising Spurlen for a "fine job as supervisor during the past years." Spurlen attended almost 100 percent of the regular meetings during his term of office, and attended several statewide meetings as well. Turney pointed out that he has an excellent conservation program on his own farm east of Eastland.

Coffee and doughnuts were served to all who attended the meeting. McCain, a well known stock

farmer, has served as officer of the Production Credit Association, the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association and the Eastland County Sheriff's Posse.

## Dodge for 1959 To be Displayed Locally Friday

Driver comfort, convenience and control features—including swing-out swivel seats—highlight the 1959 Dodge, while jet-age refinements of the dart look create a new and distinctive exterior design. The new Dodge goes on display here Friday at McGraw Motor Co.

The swivel-type front seats, an instrument panel concentrated more closely around a new "easy-to-get-by" steering wheel, plus push-button control of virtually all driver operations, head the list of 1959 advancements inside the new cars.

New styling treatment of both front and rear, side and roof, and sharply defined, canted rear fins introduce a dramatically new concept of styling.

A striking exterior design is keynoted by arched headlights "eye-brows" which curve inward and downward to the front grille. New taillights—patterned after jet-tubes—add new rear-end "control surfaces" on the fins provide a fleet, futuristic image.

Ride-ability and roadability of the 1959 Dodge have been improved through advances in the Torson-Aire suspension system, coupled with optional rear-end "Level-Flite" suspension.

Additional new, designed-for-the-driver features of the Dodge include: (1) push-button controls for the heater and air-conditioner, (2) a safety speedometer which changes color as speed increases, (3) an electronic rear view mirror that automatically cuts glare from overtaking car headlights, (4) an outside rear-view mirror that can be controlled from inside, (5) an automatic headlight dimmer, and (6) a higher steering wheel that is slightly flattened at the top, affording better road vision and at the same time, making it easier for the driver to get in and out of the car.

Colors and color combinations available in the new vehicle will feature more light hues, following both style and safety trends. Recent studies have shown that light-

## National Guard Unit Gets Top Army Rating

The Cisco National Guard unit won top honors in the basic armored rifle artillery Battalion for the recent annual Field Training performance, it was announced today by 1st Lt. Jack E. King, battery commander.

The ratings for the entire division were recently received from the Chief, National Guard Bureau, there are a number of Eastland men in the Cisco unit.

Performance of the units are determined by an evaluation board of the Regular Army representing the Commanding General, 4th United States Army, Fort Sam Houston. Evaluation is based on the same inspection material used for Regular Army units.

The excellent rating given the Cisco unit was 83.17 of a possible 100 and was the highest the unit has ever received in 10 years of participation. Only the comparative low strength of the unit kept it from being higher.

Of the 27 organizations in the 49th Armored Division's Artillery only one unit, Battery A of the 649th AA AW Battalion, with a score of 83.43, was higher than the Cisco Battery.

Of the 111 rated units in the entire 49th Armored Division, only 45 scored higher than the Cisco unit, and most of those outfits were headquarters or medical detachments.

**YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY**

Some important changes have been made in the old-age survivor's insurance program as a result of the Social Security Amendments of 1958 which President Eisenhower signed into law on August 28, 1958.

All of the changes, directly or indirectly, affect the American public as a whole. Working persons—employed and self-employed—need to know about them; their families need to know about them.

In the articles to follow I shall describe the changes singly and in detail; today, I shall restrict myself to a summary of the most important changes designed to strengthen this Federal social insurance system which provides partial protection against loss of earned income upon the retirement, death, or total disability of the worker.

Most important, because it affects practically all working people and their families, is the increase in benefit amounts. This applies to those now getting benefit payments and to those who will become beneficiaries in the future. Most monthly benefit checks will be about 7 percent higher, with a minimum increase of at least \$3.00 in the amount payable to a worker who retired at age 65 or later. (Women workers who began to receive benefits at any time between age 62 and age 65 will receive slightly smaller increases). The maximum monthly payment a family may receive is increased from \$200 to \$250 a month. Families now receiving maximum monthly benefits under the law will receive increases from \$7.50 to \$54 depending upon the deceased worker's average monthly wages.

Right here I want to point out that people now on the beneficiary rolls do not have to get in touch with the social security office to obtain these benefit increases. The larger amounts are effective with January and will show up on benefit checks for that month which will be in the mails early in February.

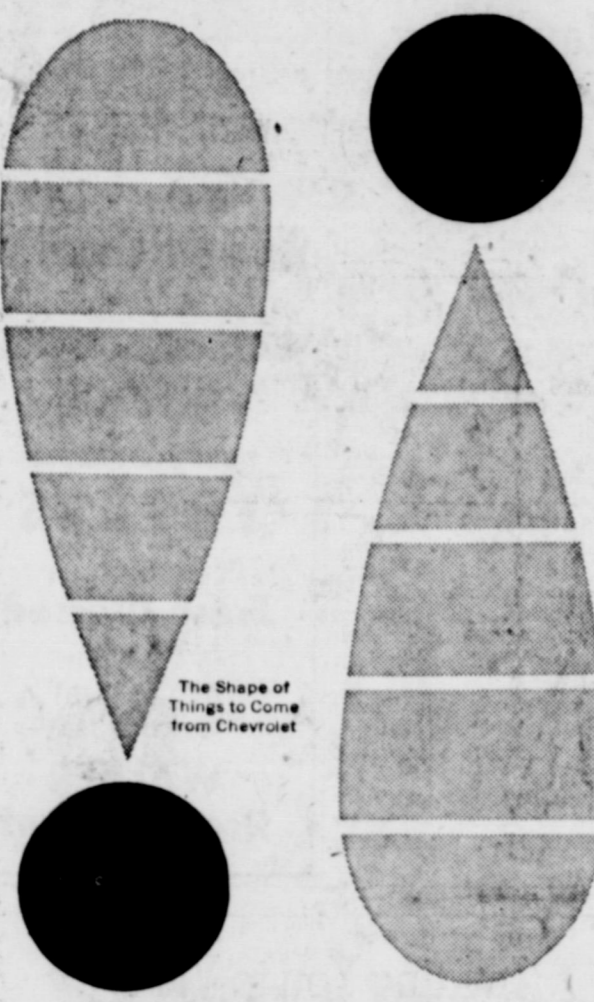

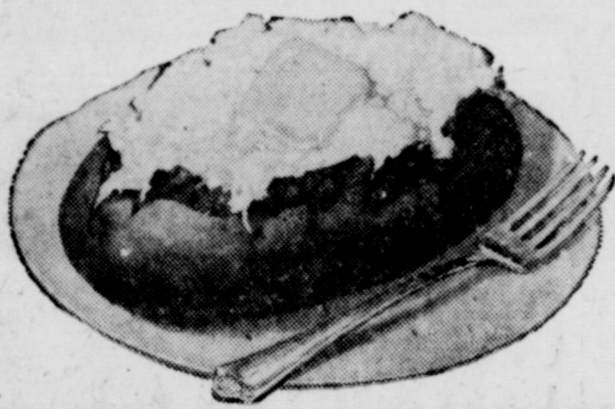
