Hunters Asked To Donate Hides To TB Patients

Deer hunters are asked again this year to give TB patients in the state hospitals the hides from their season's kill.

Mrs. Mary Alice Coombs, occupational therapy director for the hospital system, says buckskin provided in this way last year is now going into Christmas gifts the patients are making for their families at home.

Austin Taxidermist, L. M. Rathbone, motor freight lines, sports editor, radio announcer and the hunters themselves teamed up with the Texas Tuberculosis Association in a statewide contribution of hundreds of hides, Mrs. Coombs said.

This year the collection is being sponsored by the newly organized Volunteer Advisory Council for State TB Hospitals. Mrs. Helen Smith of Austin, council chairman, asks the sportsmen to duplicate last year's generous gift to the patients.

Mrs. Smith says the hides should be lightly tanned, marked "charity" addressed to the Austin Taxidermist Studio, 2708 South Lamar, Austin and shipped by motor freight. If this procedure is followed, she says, most of the motor freight lines in Texas will transport the hides free of charge.

Mrs. Coombs pointed out that for the first time in Texas history there are registered occupational therapists to supervise the patients' handwork in all the state TB hospitals. TB Associations made this possible by supplementing the state salaries which had proved insufficient to obtain them, she said.

Under their direction, the patients are converting the buckskin into such items as baby shoes, gloves, belts, purses, moccasins for their own use or the Christmas stockings at home.

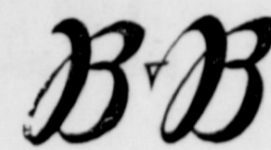

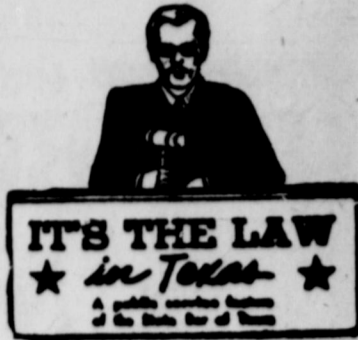

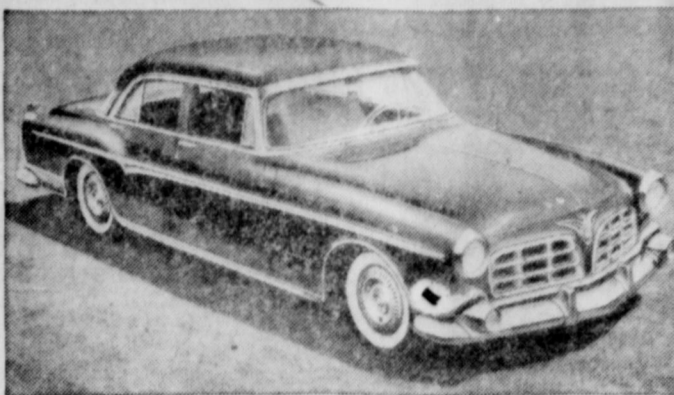
A trade-mark identifies merchandise as being the product of a particular manufacturer or distributor. While a trade-mark is most often a word, it may also be an emblem, symbol, or device. The intended function of a trade-mark is to distinguish the goods of the proprietor from the goods of others in the market place. The expressions "trade-marks" and "brand name" are synonymous.

A trade-mark, which is actually marked upon goods or merchandise, is to be distinguished from a trade name, which is a name under which business is conducted. "American Tobacco Company" is a trade name; "Lucky Strike" is a trade mark. A trade name may also be marked upon merchandise and used as a trade mark, but then it becomes a trade-mark, but a word used only as a trade name may be protected under the trade-mark laws. Trade names are protectable only under the law of unfair competition.

A person or company becomes the owner of common law rights in a trade-mark through adoption and use of the mark on goods. The law affords protection to the owner by prohibiting others in the field from appropriating the mark (or one so similar as to be likely to cause confusion) for use on goods of the same general type.

A distinctive and different trade-mark may be among the greatest and most valuable assets of a company, for it symbolizes the

good will and reputation of the company. To choose a distinctive mark, it may be necessary to conduct a search of marks already in use.

When a word or symbol has been selected, it may then be properly used in connection with the goods before it becomes a valid trade-mark. A valid trade-mark may lose its legal protection because of improper use by its owner or by the public.

The Federal and most State governments including Texas, have by legislation, provided for the registration of trade-marks by their owners. While a trade-mark need not be registered to receive

protection in the courts, such registration does afford substantial benefits to the trade-mark owners.

College Increase Expected To Rise Sharply In 1960

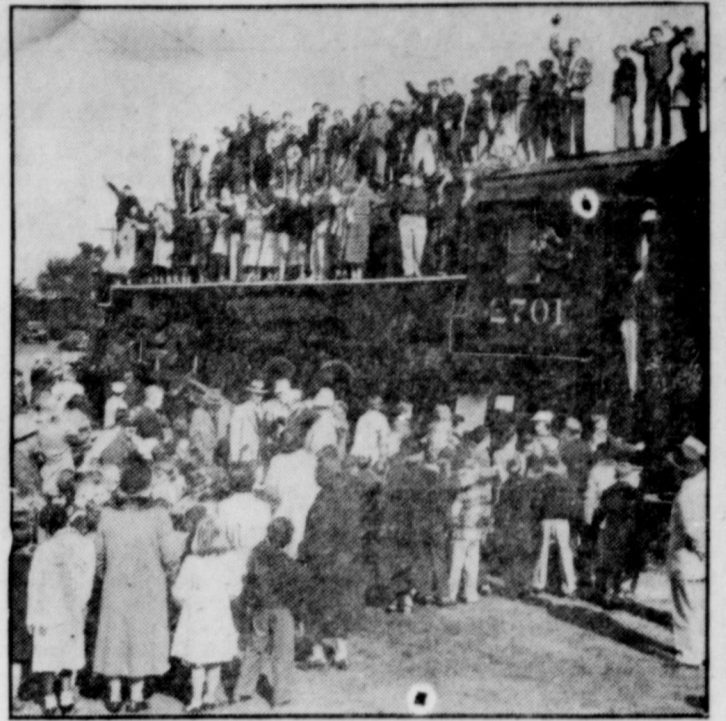
COLLEGE STATION, Texas (Spl.)—College enrollment will remain relatively stable in Texas until 1960, when it will begin to rise rapidly, the Southern Regional Education Board, in its latest printed report, received at Texas A. and M. College, reveals. The report is titled "Future School and College Enrollments in the Southern Region."

"We expect Texas to have about 215,000 to 225,000 college students by 1970, or 90,000 more than the 1952 enrollment. For every four college students on Texas campuses today," the report shows, "there will be seven in 1970."

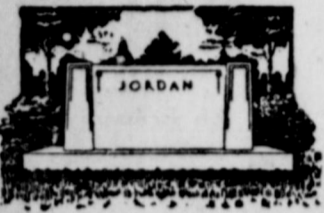
"The cumulative effect of these successive increments in the educational load will be reflected most dramatically in the graduate schools. We believe that there may very well be as many as 250 per cent more graduate students in the South in 1970 than we had in 1970."

Enrollment at all educational levels will rise impressively in Texas during the next 20 years, it is pointed out. At the college level Texas enrollment will increase about 70 per cent.

Factors which will tend to increase college enrollment in the state between now and 1970 include the projected growth of about 100 per cent in the number of high school graduates and of about 70 per cent in the size of the college-age population, the report shows.



LOCOMOTIVE VALHALLA—Most steam locomotives considered obsolete go to the scrap foundry, but this Class K4 Kanawha high-speed freight hog has found a final resting place in La Salle Park, Buffalo, N. Y. Donated by the Chesapeake and Ohio as a monument to the age of steam which helped make Buffalo the nation's second largest rail center, it will be on permanent display for the enjoyment of oldsters and the amazement of a generation which is more familiar with the diesel locomotive. Built in 1943, the quarter-million-dollar locomotive is 105 feet long, weighs 425 tons with loaded tender and has pulled as many as 150 loaded coal gondolas at one time during its years of service.

Nimrods Warned On Shooting Of Spike Bucks

AUSTIN — The Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission relayed a field report warning deer hunters against mistakenly shooting spike bucks, which are illegal.

Bob Ramsey, Wildlife Biologist, found in surveying herds for the antlerless deer season in over-populated areas of Gillespie, Mason and Llano counties that spike bucks comprised 41.2 per cent of all bucks counted.

"Deer hunters should stand cautioned that on the opening day almost every other buck seen will be an illegal spike," wrote Ramsey to his Austin headquarters. "As the season progresses, the percentage of spikes will skyrocket because of the shooting of the adult bucks, and that will call for increased vigilance on the part of the hunter."

A legal buck deer is officially described as one with a pronged or forked horn.

Ramsey said biologists working in the area believe there are several reasons for the high percentage of spike bucks in the woods this fall. He wrote: "Last year's fawn crop was exceptionally large, with a high rate of survival. Also the kill of legal bucks during the 1953 season was unusually high, cutting down the carry over of bucks this year. Another factor contributing to the large number of spikes is the drought which has prevailed over most of the Hill Country for the past year or years, as is the case over much of the deer range. Bucks adorned with eight and ten-inch spikes would normally have from three to eight points when the proper foods are available. Poor food conditions produce poor antler growth, just as an abundance of high quality deer food will produce larger antlers with more points."

Tree Split Signs Seen In Bulge, Jozing At V Fork

Even the untutored eye can spot a tree that's likely to split down the trunk.

If there are bulging seams or oozing sap below a V-shaped fork, better call the tree doctor at once. These are almost sure signs the tree is beginning to split.

Bracing and cabling generally can save such a tree, says P. E. Hudson, tree expert. Otherwise, it may topple under strong winter winds or heavy burdens of ice that come with the almost inevitable sleet storms. Frequently one side splits off leaving an unsightly half tree as a continuing menace. Sometimes a weakened tree will crash when there is little or no wind.

Strain or sharp forks can be reduced by installing cables in

branches high in the tops and by placing parallel rods just above the forks to overcome the splitting tendency. The proper placing of these supports calls for intimate knowledge of tree characteristics and wind stresses, as well as skill in application.

Under no circumstances is this a job for the week-end gardener. Many trees fall victim to inadequate attempts at arboreal first aid by amateurs. Cables wrapped around trunks invariably are harmful. They're likely to girdle, or strangle, the tree.

The professional tree man will know whether a tree can be saved. If it is past mechanical and surgical aid, he will recommend its removal.

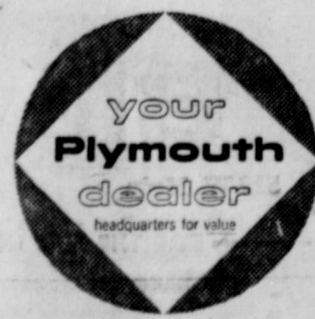
