Eastland Game Ranked As Snap For Loboes

Band Boosters Elect Wright As President

Thirty-five mothers and fathers of Eastland High School Maverick band members met with Kerman Bond, band director, in the band hall this week to elect officers to serve throughout the 1958-59 school term.

James Wright was selected president of the club; W. L. Garner, vice president; Mrs. Ralph Baggett, secretary; Andy Taylor, treasurer; and Mrs. Andy Taylor, reporter and publicity chairman. Committee chairmen will be appointed by the president and announced at the next meeting to be held on Nov. 24.

During the meeting Bond made a "most encouraging" report on the numbers of students now taking band instruction. At present the regular marching band made up of students from eighth through 12th grades numbers 46. Out of this group there are seven seniors and two juniors which means the loss of only nine band members in the next two years through graduation.

In the seventh grade band class there are 26 and 33 sixth graders are registered. According to Bond, enthusiasm among these youngsters is high and an abundance of talent is evident. In the not too distant future, with the proper encouragement and support, the Maverick Band can easily boast a membership of 70 to 80 experienced members, he said.

Plans were completed a number of workers designated for the operation of the Band Boosters Concession stand at the last home game of the season Friday, when the Eastland Mavericks meet the Cisco Loboes. The booth will be open at 7 p.m. and will offer popcorn, coffee, hot dogs, home-made sandwiches and iced cup cakes for sale. All proceeds benefit the band program in our Eastland schools.

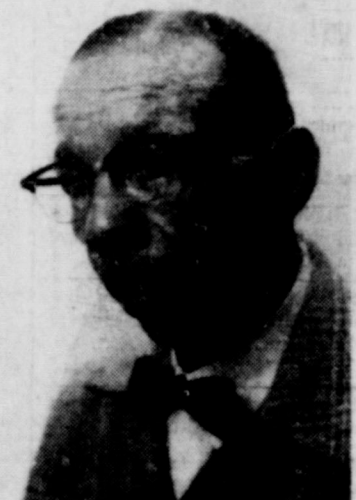
Locals Not Expected To Test Cisco Team

Friday is Halloween, and the Cisco Loboes, whose colors—orange and black—suit the occasion to a tee, will journey to Eastland in an attempt to spook the Eastland Mavericks in an important District 7-AA contest.

The Loboes will be favored by four touchdowns in the inter-county contest, and will be out for their seventh win of the season. Eastland hasn't beaten a team from Loboland since 1953 but for the last two years Maverick teams have outplayed Cisco, only to lose by scant margins. Last year Cisco piled up a 21-7 lead in the first half, then rode out a 21-18 victory. The year before the Loboes won, 27-26, with Eastland fumbling the ball across the Lobo goal-line in the final seconds of play.

Under the helm of Coach Zack Henderson, Cisco has become not only the odds-on favorite to cop District 7-AA honors, but the Loboes are ranked among the top Class AA teams in the state. Cisco has piled up 236 points and has limited seven opponents to just 35.

Eastland chances against the mighty Loboes look slim, especially after looking over the Cisco record. The Loboes opened with a 51-6 slaughter of Dublin, then skunked Comanche, 36-0. Anson held the Loboes to a 14-0 victory, but three Cisco touchdowns were called back in that one. Then DeLeon was humiliated, 45-0. The Loboes next beat Haskell, 22-8.

In Randall Hess, Cisco leads all West Texas scorers with 117 points, and has had more than half a dozen touchdowns called back this year. He is joined in the backfield by Duane Hale, District 7-AA's fourth leading scorer (40 points), hard charging Duane Hale and ball handling Delbert Schaefer, whose performance as quarterback has done a lot to make other Lobo backs look great. All four Cisco backs are faster than anything Eastland has to offer.

The Eastland-Cisco game has been booked as a "cinch" by area sportswriters. Without exception, Cisco is favored by a top-heavy margin.

If the Lobos can't beat you with one team, they have another to throw against you, but Coach Henderson has his charges in excellent condition. The Mavs too are in good physical shape. In fact,

the 1958 Eastland team is being called the scariest ever to play for the red and black. At the start of the season Eastland wasn't expected to win over one game and the Abilene Reporter-News said only one thing was sure about District 7-AA: "Eastland will finish last." The Mavs have won one and lost one district encounter, and their loss was a five point setback. A loss to Cisco would kill any hopes Eastland might have of gaining the crown this year, however.

Hard workouts have been the cell of the week at Eastland High. The Eastland coaching staff, after scouting Cisco several times, are definitely not optimistic. The Mavs team, however, seems ready for warfare.

The Eastland-Cisco series dates back to the 1920's and the rivalry has always been strong. Eastland didn't beat Cisco until 1934, but then turned the trick for four straight years.

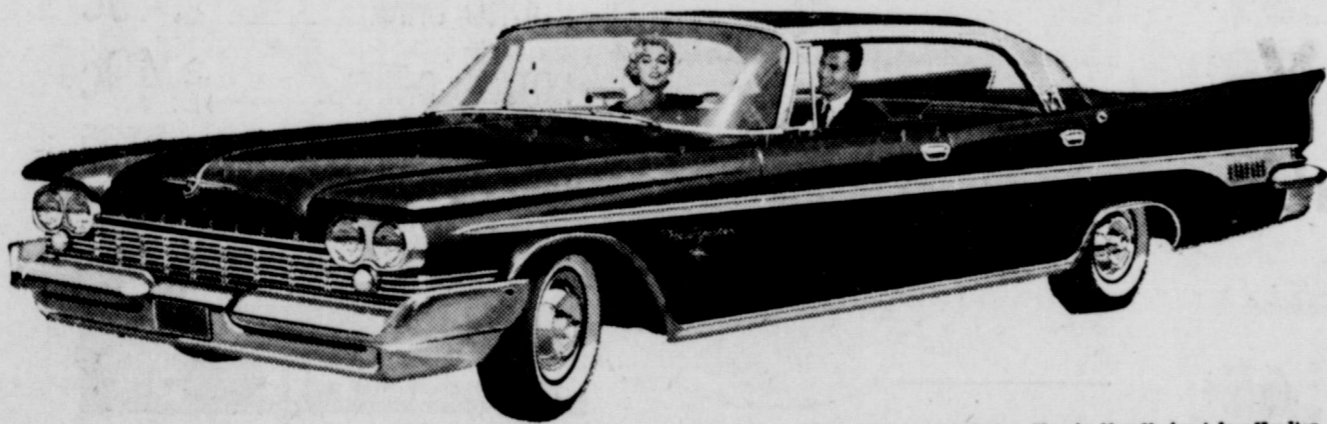

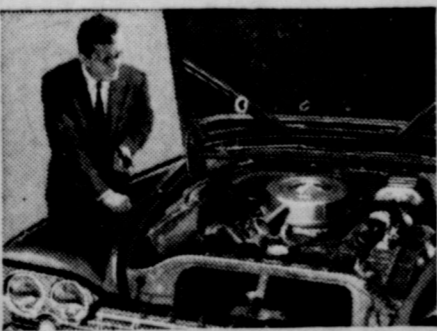

Pensions, Hospital Benefits and State Advertising Among Proposed Constitutional Amendments

Among topics covered by the proposed constitutional amendments to be voted upon by Texans on November 4 are pensions, hospital benefits for the needy, hospital districts, and advertising of the resources of the state.

Proposed Amendment Number Six authorizes the Legislature to provide for a system of retirement and disability pensions for retiring Texas Rangers. Benefits would be limited to those Rangers who have not been eligible at any time for membership in the regular state employee retirement system.

Those drawing the pensions or disability payments would also be required to have served at least two years as Rangers. Widows also be provided for by the Legislature, provided they were legally married prior to 1957 to a Texas Ranger qualifying for such a pension.

Under the proposal there would be a limitation of Eighty Dollars per month on payments to a Ranger or his widow. The pensions could be paid only from the Confederate veterans pension fund, which is already in existence and is kept up by a State ad valorem property tax levy of two cents per hundred dollar valuation. The State Building Fund is currently being maintained from the same source.

Proposed Amendment Number Seven would strike from the Texas Constitution the original 1876 provision which prohibits the Legislature from appropriating public money for any purpose of bringing immigrants to the State. Substituted would be an authorization for the Legislature to appropriate money and establish procedure for developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, recreational and other resources of Texas.

Funds might also be appropriated "for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through advertising in periodicals having national circulation, and the dissemination of factual information about the advantages and economic resources offered by the State of Texas."

Pictures of living state officials could not be used in any of such advertising. The Legislature would be authorized to require that any sum appropriated under the new provision be matched by an equal sum from private sources before being paid out.

Proposed Amendment Number Eight would empower the Legislature to provide for direct payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled.

State funds paid out for such medical care could not exceed those paid out of Federal funds for the same purpose; and the Legislature would be authorized to accept financial aid from the Federal Government for those purposes.

Proposed Amendment Number Nine authorizes the creation of Hospital Districts in the City of Amarillo and in Wichita and Jefferson Counties. The first two districts would extend to the respective city and county boundaries, but two separate districts could be set up in Jefferson County. One of these would cover the Fort Arthur Independent School District and other would cover the remainder of the county. All of the districts would be supported by taxes upon property within their boundaries.

Ten-Point Program for Livestock Listed

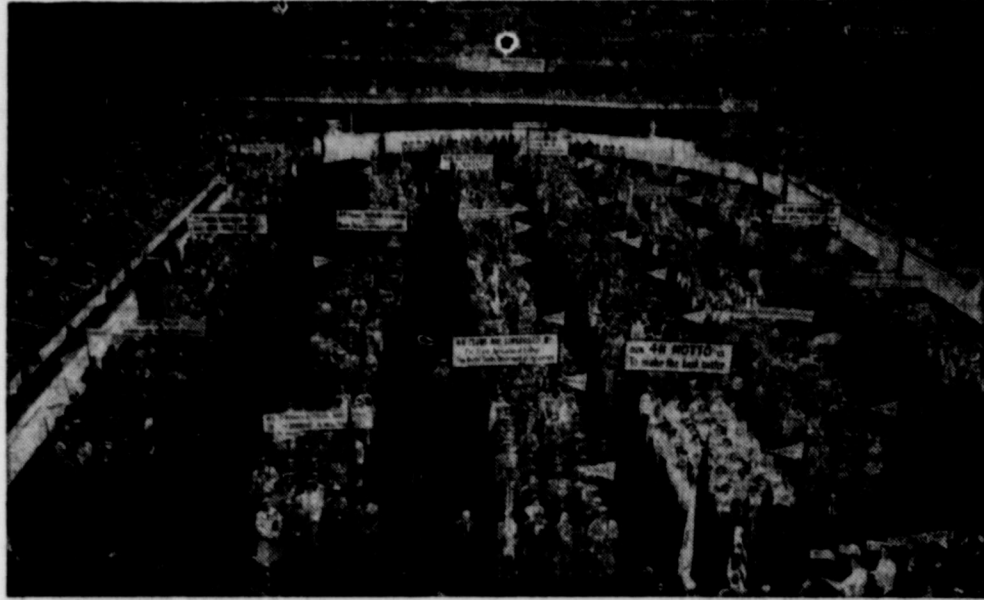
A 10-point program for "winterizing" livestock was recommended to farmers today by the American Foundation for Animal Health.

Highlights of the plan, designed to provide better winter health and production are:

1. Check sanitation and ventilation facilities of hog and poultry houses to guard against pneumonia and other respiratory diseases.
2. Exercise caution in allowing cattle into drouth-stricken fields of corn, Sudan grass or cane, since poisonings may result.
3. Have ewes treated for internal parasites before the fall breeding season.
4. Examine cattle on pasture for lice, ring worm, warts and lumpy jaw, and have affected animals treated before winter confinement.
5. Set up a workable mastitis program for dairy herds before winter confinement season.
6. Isolate newly-arrived feeder cattle and feeder lambs for a reasonable period before allowing them to run with the home herds and flocks.
7. Have all fall pigs properly vaccinated against hog cholera and against erysipelas, in areas where the disease has been a problem. The veterinarian will know when this should or should not be done.
8. Rid farm buildings of rats and mice.
9. Continue or complete cooperative area control efforts against brucellosis.
10. Avoid feeding hay, silage or feed grains which have a high mold content.

4-H'ers to Parade Again During Chicago Congress



The 4-H parade pictured above is one of the exciting demonstrations that will be repeated in the amphitheater of the International Livestock Exposition during the 37th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago. Thanksgiving weekend will usher in 1,300 champion 4-H Club members, several hundred state and national 4-H officials and many friends of 4-H who help to make the annual Congress possible. They arrive by train and plane from every state in the nation, and will be joined by delegates from Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, Canada and other foreign countries as well.

The Congress opens officially on Sunday morning Nov. 30, at the Conrad Hilton hotel and closes with a banquet for about 2,000 on Thursday night Dec. 4, when more than 200 national 4-H champions will be saluted.

This unique delegation of 1958 national, sectional, and state 4-H winners represent the best of 2,200,000 Club members.

By diligent and successful application of 4-H principals and techniques to project work these ambitious boys and girls have climaxed their 4-H career by attaining state honors. They have participated in one or more of some 50 different 4-H award programs conducted by the Cooperative Extension Service and ar-

anged by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work. Among the wide range of projects and activities carried on in nearly 31,000 clubs are field crops, clothing, poultry, achievement, entomology, health, safety, leadership, foods, soil and water conservation, swine, and tractor. To be eligible for a state or national award, the 4-H'er must be over 14 years, and must have completed three years of club work.

Awards include \$400 college scholarships and all-expense trips to the National Club Congress. They are provided each year by half a hundred business firms, educational foundations

Air is the most important commodity for the existence of man. He can go for weeks without food, a very few days without water, hours without protection from the elements, but only a few minutes without his most precious commodity—air.

The importance of clean air is indicated by the fact that Governor Daniel has set aside this week, Oct. 19-25, as "Cleaner Air Week."

This is an excellent period for all of us to evaluate the air cleanliness of our communities and if it is not all that it should be to in turn evaluate the efforts the community is making to control the air cleanliness for us.

Are you as an individual citizen satisfied with your community's air standard?

A number of communities throughout Texas are happily enjoying the benefits of good clean air without effort to control it. Unfortunately, many other communities are not so blessed and are therefore concerned with the cleanliness of the air over their communities.

It isn't only the big industrial cities that have difficulties. Any Texas town that has any kind of industry, including cotton gins, may have a problem without realizing it. Should there be such a problem, it certainly would be well to take inventory of the efforts your community is making in your behalf regarding cleaner air.

Already there is much study and

effort being done in Texas to evaluate and remedy some of the air pollution problems.

The State Department of Health has completed its part in a national air pollution appraisal. The report of the complete findings is being readied.

Cooperating in the national air sampling network are eight stations in Texas at Dallas, Houston, Port Lavaca, Austin, Waco, San Antonio, Fort Worth and El Paso. Dallas and Houston operate on a permanent basis while the rest serve only one year in three, however, some operate every other year.

These air samples are analyzed for dust and other solid materials, and beta ray radiation activity. In addition the State and local departments of health cooperate with the Atomic Energy Commission in sampling atom bomb fallout, with the aid of the U. S. Public Health Service.

Some cities have their own separate programs for studying air pollution and several additional cities and counties have active air pollution committees trying to conduct their own separate surveys.

Every cleaner air program needs the individual support of all its citizens.
