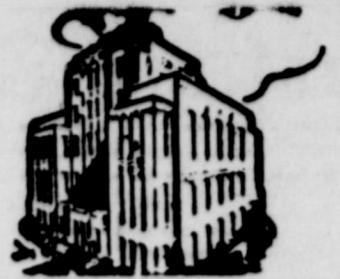

Eastland After Second Place In District

Ballinger Rated As Favorite Over Mavs

Having gained new respect by bottling Cisco all the way before losing to the undefeated Lobos last Friday, the Eastland Mavericks pack up their duds and head for Ballinger tomorrow in a contest which could easily determine the runner-ups in District 7-A.

The Mavs will find themselves on a strange field, they will have their same old familiar roll, that of the underdog. Ballinger, with a 2-1 record in district play will be the odds-on favorite due to their convincing 18-14 pasting of well regarded Langer last week.

In Ballinger, Eastland will face the second and third top scorers in the district. Ken Wigington has scored 62 points for the year and Jerry Candler has 59 to his credit. Mav coaches call Candler the "best all around back" in the district.

Ballinger and Eastland have identical records of four wins and four losses for the year. The Bearcats opened against highly thought of Brady at last, 28-6. Then the Cats played Stamford, the number two ranked Class AA team in the state, and came out on the short end of a 38-6 count. Ballinger broke into the win department with an upset 22-0 victory over Class AAA Colorado City, then smothered Sonora, 41-8. Lake View of San Angelo downed the Cats 34-6, then Cisco handed Ballinger a 32-14 setback in their district opener. Ballinger's last two outings have been their most impressive. The Cats downed Coleman, 15-6, and mowed down Ranger with ease last week.

The Mavs had hard luck this week in workouts. Bill McCleskey suffered a broken arm, putting him out for the season, and both Marvin Agnew and Billy Don Turner suffered ankle injuries. Turner is still expected to start, but Agnew is on the doubtful list.

Both boys were limping badly Wednesday afternoon.

Fullback Mike Manning, out for the last three weeks, is due to see some action this week, although he still isn't back in the best physical shape. Jerry Chaney is still out of the line-up, but Benny Dukes may get back into action Friday.

Knicky Arthur and Stanley Reed, who were used only on defense in the Cisco game because of illness, are expected to both be ready for full duty against the Cats.

Jerry Hallmark, a senior end, is another lad who will see only limited action because of an injury.

County Voters Approved Only One of Nine Amendments; Vote Democratic

Eastland County voters turned thumbs down on all but one proposed Constitutional amendment in Tuesday's General election, and stuck to Democratic candidates in all contested races.

Only amendment to gain favor of county voters was number three on the ballot. That amendment, which gained a three to one statewide okay, edged in here by just 50 votes. It defines an appointment of justice of the peace or county judge by the commissioner's court, as effective to the next General election, and not for the remainder of the unexpired term.

Gov. Price Daniel received a large vote of confidence here, polling 2252 votes to just 189 for Republican Edwin S. Mayer. Daniel won the statewide race easily, too, polling more than 500,000 votes to less than 100,000 for Mayer.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough also gained a big margin here, but Roy Whittenburg, the Republican candidate, got 416 votes. All other Democratic candidates ran far ahead of their opponents.

Amendment One drew the most opposition in Eastland County. The amendment which would have set up an annual session of the State Legislature, plus a big pay increase for legislators, got just 360 votes. A total of 1761 votes were cast against the amendment. Statewide the proposal met defeat by better than two to one.

The amendment which would have set up county pensions was also defeated here and statewide. The vote in Eastland County was 1627 against and 473 for.

Edward Stewart Participating In Army Maneuver

FORT LEWIS, WASH.—Army PFC Edward R. Stewart, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Stewart, P.O. Box 1, Gorman, is participating with the 1st Auxiliary in "Exercise Rocky Shoals" on the California coast. The exercise will end Nov. 11.

More than 25,000 troops are involved in the joint Army-Navy maneuver, which is the largest amphibious-assault exercise conducted in the United States since World War II. The exercise is designed to improve combat effectiveness and to test new equipment and procedures.

Stewart, whose wife, Betty, lives in Tacoma, Wash., is regularly stationed at Fort Lewis, Wash., as an artillery survey recorder in the artillery's Battery D. He entered the Army in April 1957 and completed basic combat training at Fort Lewis.

A 1957 member of Gorman's football team, Stewart is now a member of Company Aircraft in Fort Worth as a civilian.

Legion Auxiliary to Sell Poppies Friday

The American Legion Auxiliary, Dulin - Daniel Unit No. 70, will hold its annual poppy sale Friday, prior to Veterans' Day.

Poppies are made by disabled veterans who are in hospitals throughout Texas. Many of these veterans are not eligible for pensions, and have no income. The Auxiliary pays the veteran to make the poppies for them, and that is his only income in many cases. When the poppy is sold, the money can only be used to assist disabled veterans and their families in and around Eastland.

As one veteran says, "The Legion Poppy is to me a symbol of good will—The sale which helps broken men to climb life's rugged hill. The Poppy means remember the men who fought and died and those who offer them to you, do so with greatest pride. Americans must not forget the ones who passed away and so the Legion sets aside National Poppy Day. If everyone would wear this flower for a little while, so much good could be accomplished. Many hearts would smile, and so this veteran writes this verse, because I truly care, thank God we live in freedom—A Poppy I shall wear."

New Imperial On Display at Blevins Motors

1959 Allotments On Peanuts Give State Increase

Sec. of Agriculture Benson has set the 1959 peanut planting allotment at the minimum level permitted by the farm law. Planting allotments for 1959 will be 1,610,000 acres, the same as 1958. Texas' allotment for 1958 is 356,004 acres, which is slightly higher than in 1958. Oklahoma's allotment is 137,964 and New Mexico's 4,922. The Eastland County allotment for 1959 has not yet been set. This year, however, the allotment was 33,000 acres.

Soon we will all be asked to wear a little red poppy, which is symbolic and sacred to Americans everywhere. The tiny little red flowers that were made by our disabled veterans, home from the wars and now confined in hospitals, has become our national memorial flower.

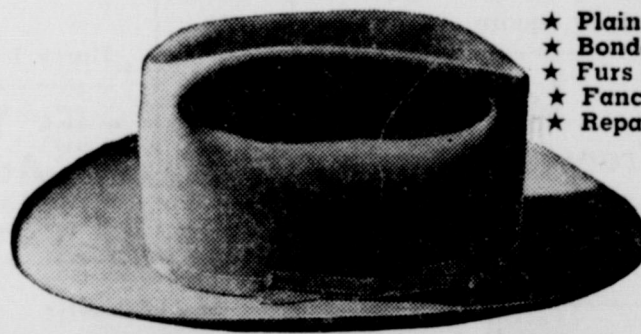

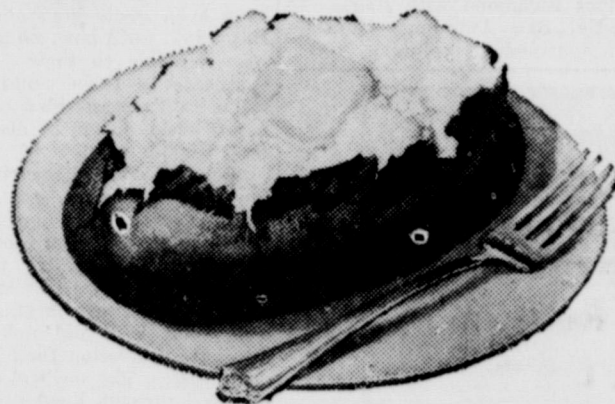

Israel B. Biglow writes to the Brownsville Civilian, giving an account of the great battle recently fought on the other side of the river—On the 28th ult. Gen. Niremen with about 8,000 men, attacked Vidaurri's army containing the same number. (The Letter) "As the attack was advanced, Vidaurri's gunners were distinctly seen hold-

ing in their hands lighted port-fires awaiting the orders of their commanders, but the army of Mexico steadily advanced. When within two yards of Vidaurri's lines, the order to 'fire' was given, and sixty pieces of cannon and eight thousand small arms belched forth their murderous hail upon the assailants. In an instant, and before the troops had time to waver, the order to 'charge' rang down the line from the sharp voices of General

Miramon; the order was obeyed, and before the artillery men could reload their pieces, a large portion of them were lanced at their guns, and the batteries were taken. The Weatherford News says that the grass hoppers are swarming through the northern counties, and the farmers have deferred sowing their wheat, until they leave. (From the Waco Democrat) We see that a gentleman has been appointed by the Secretary of the Interior, a special agent, to inquire and report upon the conduct of Indian Agents in Texas, and upon all difficulties arising between citizens of the State and reserve Indians. The San Diego Mail arrived at San Antonio on the 20th inst. making a trip in twenty days. THE CAMELS HAVE COME (From the Galveston News) The ship Thomas Wattson and the bark Lucerne, from the Canary Islands, have arrived at our port, consigned to Isaac G. Wil-

liams & Co., having on board eighty-nine camels, in good order and condition. But two of the animals were lost on the passage. Most of them will carry fifteen hundred pounds weight, or, in other words, three bales of cotton or seven barrels of flour, or three gentlemen with their usual traveling baggage. About one-fourth of the animals are females. They are private property, having been imported on account for Mr. Watson, of Washington City, under the care of Mr. J. A. Machsado. The Sherman Patriot says the stage came through to that place in 19 days, from Sacramento. This is the second through stage with passengers. The Houston-Telegraph is happy over the prospect of plenty of ice next year. A wealthy company has been formed, and their arrangements are on a scale sufficient to insure an adequate supply of the highly important article. YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

In the first two articles of this series I outlined the most important changes in the old-age, survivors, and disability insurance program brought about by the 1958 amendments to the security law. Today, I shall discuss in more detail changes in the law as they affect the dependents of retired, disabled, or deceased insured working people. I feel that the most important changes in this field are those relating to the families of workers who have become too disabled for further substantial gainful work, and to dependent parents of workers who have died. The first of these important amendments concerns families of insured workers who are no longer able to do substantial gainful work. While monthly benefits payments to qualify disabled workers have been made beginning with July 1957, until now, no payments were possible to their families. Payments to them could not be made until the disabled breadwinner reached age 65 or died before that time. We of the social security office have had occasion to observe many cases of hardships resulting from this provision in the old law. The disability benefit payments to the disabled worker offset in part his loss of earnings from work, but they did not provide adequate protection for his dependent family. The medical expenses incurred through disability are a major financial problem for most of these families. Furthermore, the children are more dependent than are the children of retired workers. It is usually necessary that the mother remain at home and not attempt to supplement the family income. In many cases care required by the disabled person makes it impossible for his wife to work outside the home. Insurance protection in the form of monthly benefits is now provided the disabled person's children under 18 and any older child under a disability beginning before he became 18. Benefits are also payable to the disabled person's wife if she has in her care a child eligible for benefits. An estimated 180,000 dependents of totally disabled workers now on the beneficiary rolls can qualify for payments under this provision in the amended law.

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
