

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

Here's a luscious and dressy dessert teens will enjoy. It's a combination of vanilla pudding layered alternately with fresh juicy orange sections, vanilla wafer crumbs and flaked coconut. Topped with a fluffy meringue, it makes a delectable ending for a buffet supper of savory baked beans and grilled frankfurters.

Coconut Orange Meringue Pudding

1 package vanilla pudding and pie filling mix 2 cups milk 2 egg yolks 1½ cups flaked coconut

wafer crumbs 1½ cup orange sections 2 egg whites 4 tablespoons sugar

Combine pudding mix and 1/4 cup of the milk in saucepan. Add egg yolks and blend well. Add remaining 1% cups milk. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture come to a full boil. Cool to room temperature; then fold in 1 cup of the co

Place ½ cup of the crumbs in a 2-quart casserole. Arrange half of the orange sections on the crumbs and cover with half of the pudding. Repeat layers with remaining crumbs, orange sections,

Beat egg whites until foamy throughout. Add sugar, 2 table spoons at a time, and continue beating until mixture will stand in stiff peaks. Fold in remaining ½ cup of the coconut. Pile lightly on pudding. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 15 minutes, or until meringue is browned. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

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
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
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
