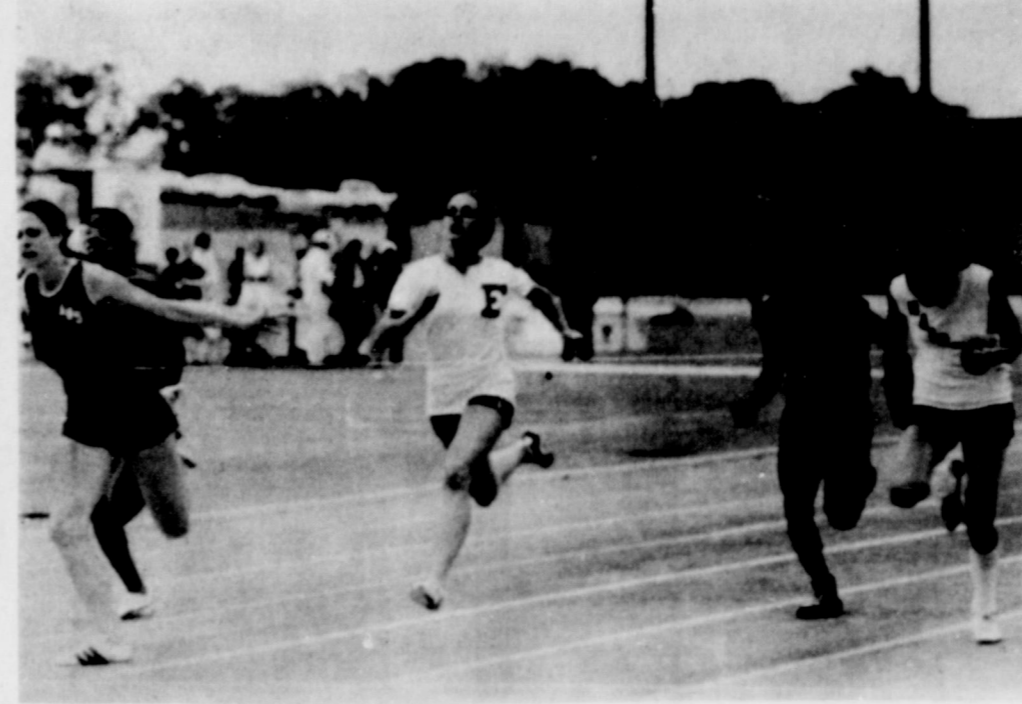
Last Thursday the Lions shut out the Comets, 19-0 and the Medics bested the Bulldogs, 5-1.

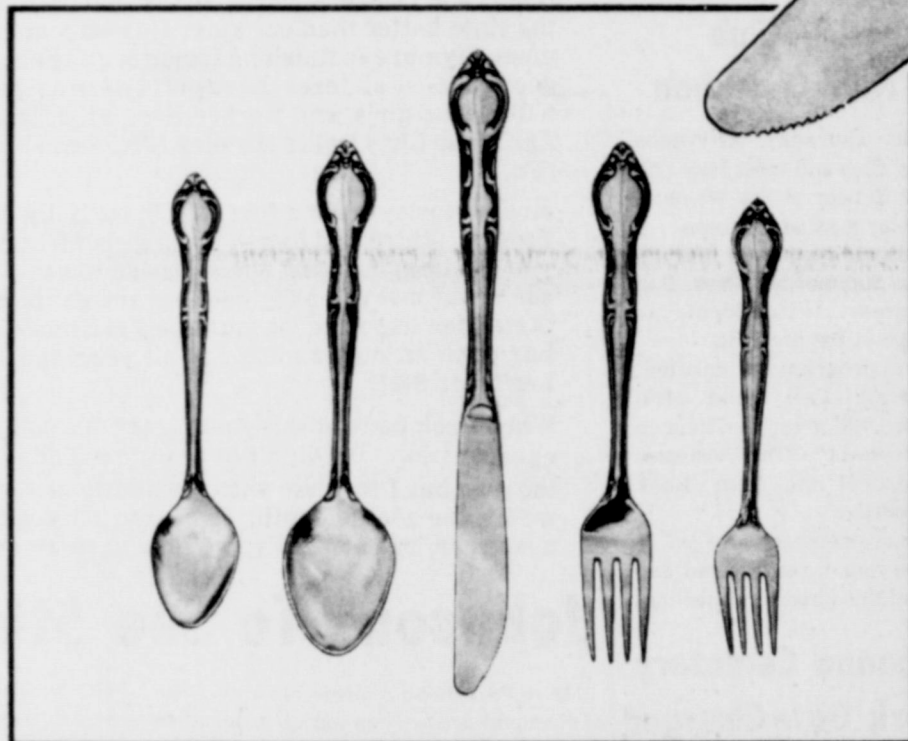

Farm and ranch lands would be assessed on the basis of their value when used for raising livestock or crops, if a resolution introduced into the legislature Wednesday is adopted.

State Representative Joe Hanna co-sponsored the resolution, which proposes a

constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the assessment of surface value of certain farm and ranch lands.

No timber or recreational lands would be included under the amendment. Only lands which are used for the raising of livestock or the production of

agricultural products would be affected, Hanna said.

The resolution would affect the overall picture of economy in the entire State. Representative Hanna said for taxing of lands at their market value is forcing people to sell farm and ranch lands and move to the cities. The continuing result of such assessment will be higher and higher prices on agricultural products, he added.

Hanna said that present trends seem to be forcing the State toward making all lands

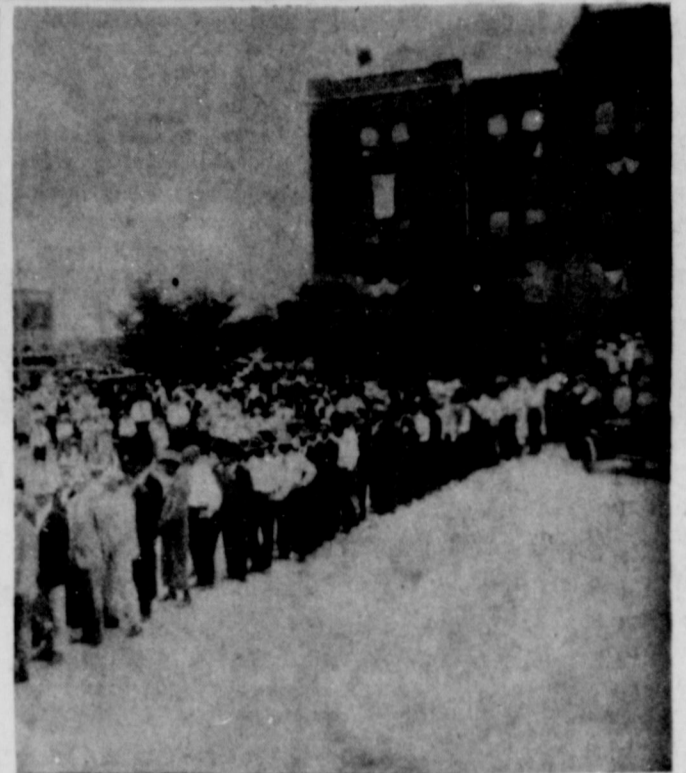

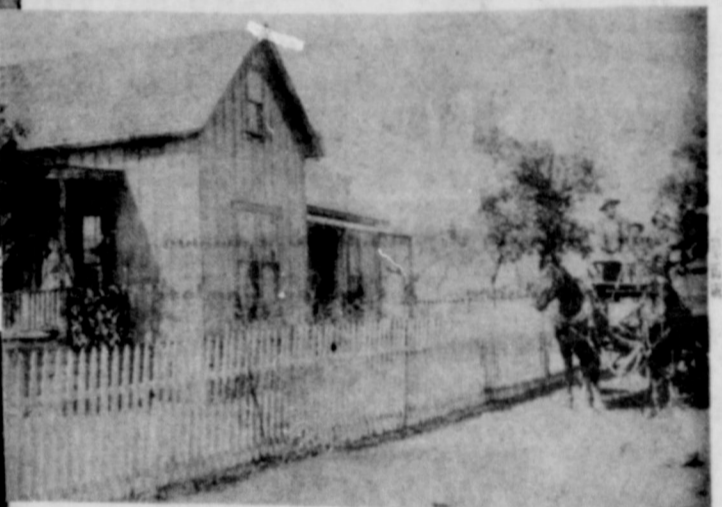

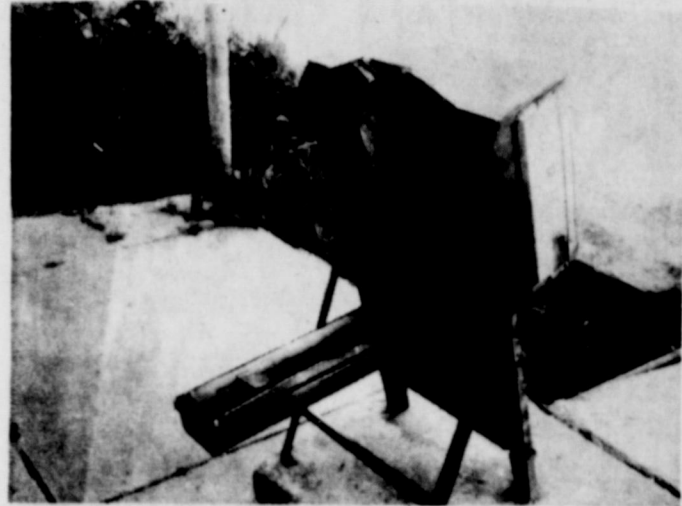

Well over a 1,000 people came to Eastland County's 100th Birthday Party in Eastland Saturday, dressed in the style of 1873 - ate a quality barbecue dinner "on the ground" - and generally had the time of their lives.

Serving the old-time dinner was the Eastland Jaycee Club which guessed maybe there'd be 500. There were many more - but there was also plenty of food for everyone. Prepared were 200 pounds of potatoes; some \$400 worth of brisket; 13 goats; 60 pounds of red beans; and all the trimmings. Chairman Rex Morgan called it a giant success.

Long-frilly dresses were being carefully put away in anticipation of another celebration in 1975 when Eastland marks its 100th year - but whiskers were flying, and being washed down the drains as men shed their face-growth, some of many months' standings.

8 to 5 Christian

Christianity began in the world because of the perseverance of 7 churches in Asia Minor. Thyatira was the smallest and least important of the seven towns; however, in Revelation 2: 18-29 we find the longest letter written to any church.

Thyatira was not a religious center, but it was a center of trade. The roads which ran through its valley brought trade from half of the world to its doors. It was also different from neighboring towns because of an abundance of trade guilds. The social activities of these guilds was bound up with the worship of heathen gods. The trade guilds had common meals together which included a sacrifice and an offering of wine poured out to the god before and after the meal. The feast degenerated into carousels of drunkenness and immorality.

Participation in the trade guilds at Thyatira protected the business interest and ensured material prosperity; to refuse to become a member of a guild and to refuse to participate in the ceremonies would mean commercial suicide and very soon poverty and bankruptcy. The church never had any doubts as to what to do. The Christian must divorce himself entirely from these things.

This is a situation which is by no means dead today. It is very much alive. When membership in an organization demands conduct and action and practice which are not Christian, what is a Christian to do?

Is trade to come first, or is Christ? The continued existence of the church depends upon the continued determination of Christians to be different from the world.

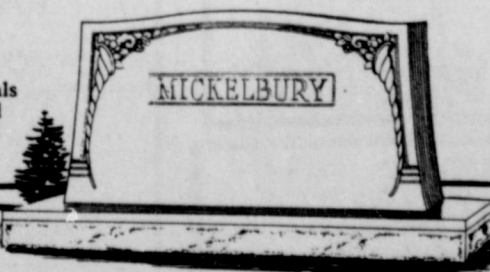

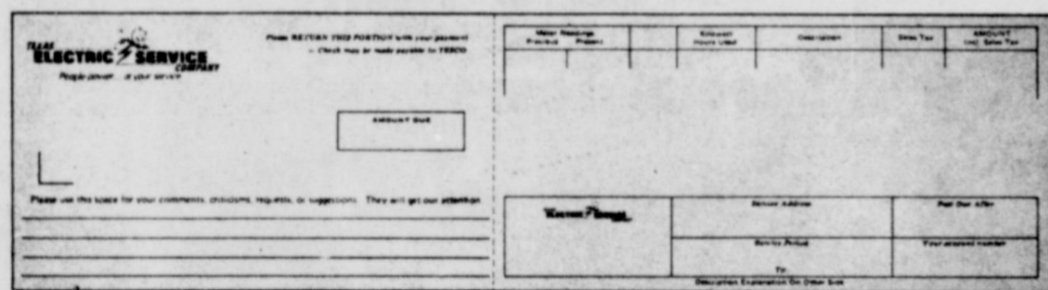

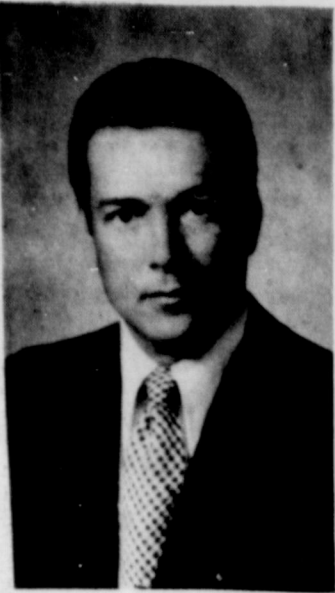

Lone Star Gas To Move Fuel Thru New Line

Lone Star Gas Company has signed a contract with Marathon Oil Company to purchase West Texas gas reserves. Terms of the contract were not disclosed, but geological information indicates that planned drilling could ultimately develop reserves in excess of 100 billion cubic feet.

The gas will come from a number of wells located in the West Grey Ranch Field in Pecos County. Marathon has an interest in 18 sections in the vicinity of present development. All the gas will come from the Ellenburger formation at depth of approximately 19-21,000 feet.

Lone Star will transport the gas to the Dallas-Fort Worth area through its new 36-inch West Texas Supply System.

Last December Lone Star purchased an estimated 175 billion cubic feet of gas reserves from several West Texas producers. Most of this gas also will come from wells in Pecos County.

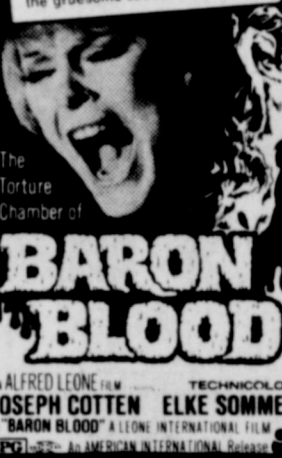

Lone Star Gas Asks Gate Rate

Lone Star Gas Company filed an application with the Texas Railroad Commission Friday, May 11, for an increase in the city gate rate for gas delivered to each town served by the company in Texas.

The primary factors involved in Lone Star's application relate to the cost of maintaining an adequate gas supply for customers and contracting for new supplies to meet growing

consumer demands. The individual items included in the company's rate increase proposal are: (1) the right to recover costs and return of \$7.2 million associated with the firm's West Texas Gas Supply System, an approximate 400 mile large-diameter pipeline system from West Texas to the Dallas-Fort Worth area; (2) the right to recover costs and return of \$0.8 million on approximately \$9.6 million in advance payments and prepayments the company thus far has made to producers as a part of new gas purchase agreements; (3) to bring the company's weighted average cost of gas used in the Commission's calculation of Lone Star's base city gate rate up from the 16.29-cents per thousand cubic feet to the present level of 20.53-cents per thousand; (4) to allow Lone Star to "pass on" 100 percent of its increased cost of purchased gas on a monthly basis, rather than the presently allowed 65 percent every six months.

The cost adjustments would mean an 8.1-cent per thousand cubic feet increase in the city gate rate, and an increase of \$10.5 million in Lone Star's annual revenues when costs are flowed through to customers, based on 1972 volume of approximately 130 billion cubic feet.

The company further noted that all proposed rate increases are cost justified and within nationally established price control guidelines for utilities established last year.

Peanut Growers Meet For Planning

Twelve peanut grower representatives from the nation's three major producing areas met with Department of Agriculture officials in Washington, D.C. on May 10 to continue discussions on possible modifications of the peanut price support program. One of the major barriers in securing industry-USDA agreement on program changes in the Department's desire for a program change that would allow anyone to produce peanuts at the worldmarket price.

In an effort to meet the Department's goal of freeing acreage allotments for such production, the grower group suggested an approach on May 10 that would partially achieve this objective. Under this approach the Agriculture Secretary would be given discretion to allocate to allotment growers whatever amount of additional acreage he deems appropriate for production of peanuts at world market prices. Allotment growers must then plant the increased acreage or release it to the county ASCS office for reapportionment to other farms within the county. Such excess acreage increases and reapportionment would be required to move through Commodity Credit Corporation for accounting and disposition—a step considered necessary in order to be sure that such peanuts are channeled into their proper markets.

Growers feel that a completely open-end allotment provision would result in vastly increased marketings of farmer peanuts for which there are no drying handling and processing facilities and would result in serious deterioration of quality as well as a chaotic marketing situation.

Further, the approach being studied would give peanut growers the following options—

(1) Plant only his reduced allotment and market his total production at 75 percent of parity price (under a previous recommendation the Secretary of Agriculture would have discretion to reduce acreage planted for domestic food uses

10 percent in 1974 and up to 5 percent annually thereafter with total reductions not to exceed 25 percent).

(2) Plant his total farm allotment and receive price support at 75 percent of parity less about \$50 per ton assessment. The assessment would be used to lower CCC costs, or

(3) Plant his entire farm allotment plus the increased farm acreage. In this case the grower would receive support less assessment on his original farm allotment production and would receive world market price on all production in excess of his permanent allotment.

The election of option No. 1 by the grower would not adversely

affect his farm allotment history. Thursday, May 17, 1973

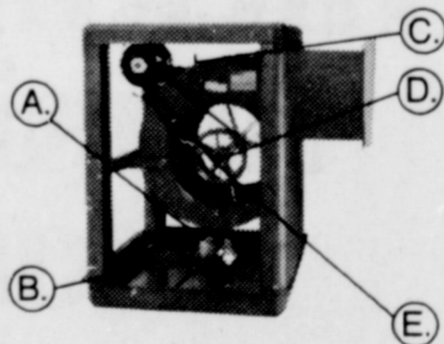

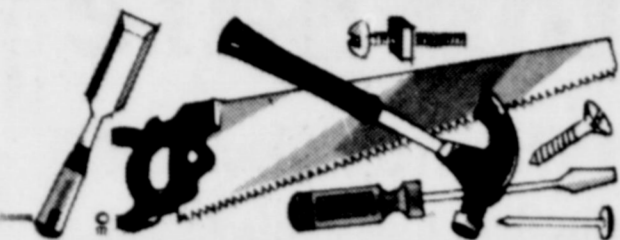
