Born Venita A. Daniels July 12, 1903 at Cisco, she married Buford A. Tunnell there May 17, 1923. Her husband is Texas & Pacific Railway agent in Ranger.

The couple lived in Abilene from 1942 until 1945, when he was T & P agent in Abilene.

Mrs. Tunnell was first vice president of the Child Welfare Club, president of the 1920 Club, past president of the WSCS of the First Methodist Church, of which she was a member, and a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Survivors include her husband one daughter, Mrs. David L. Adams of Abilene; one brother, L V. Daniels of Abilene; three sis ters, Mrs. James M. Shelton of Abilene and Mrs. Cate Crawford and Mrs. Mabel Keefer, both of Cisco; and three granddaughters.






