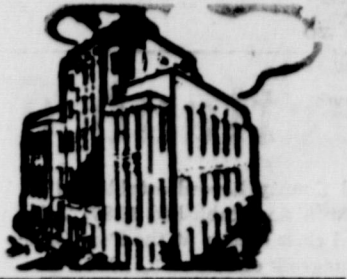

Virus Disease Hits Fields In Texas Areas

College Station, — Yellow dwarf, a virus of oats, wheat and barley, has hit many fields, mostly oats, in central, north central and to a lesser degree in the Rolling Plains areas of Texas. Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist, says that oat plants infected with the disease have been sent to the diagnostic laboratory from Denton on the north to Navasota on the south and that fields in the Stephenville area seem hardest hit.

Under some conditions the disease has been called red leaf. Infected oat plants have a characteristic salmon-pink to red color and the plants are dwarfed. The degree of dwarfing, points out Smith, depends on the stage of growth reached by the plant at the time of infection.

When a plant is infected immediately after coming up, it may be dwarfed so severely that it will fall to head. Reduced spike formation and filling of kernels may result from midseason infection. Plants infected at later stages of growth may not suffer serious damage, says Smith. The disease is more difficult to diagnose in closely grouped fields, he adds.

The disease is spread by aphids. Known carriers include the corn leaf and apple grain aphids and the small grain green bug. Smith says that control measures should be applied for green bugs if they are present in large numbers, but little or no control over the virus can be expected since the plants are already infected.

Smith says no adapted resistant varieties of oats, barley or wheat are now available. Since the spread is caused by aphids, a check of oat fields in the fall for aphid build-ups would be in order, believes the specialist. Should conditions warrant any time during the growth periods of the plants, control measures for the aphids would pay off only if the insects were controlled before the plants became infected, says Smith.

Quail Being Transplanted

AUSTIN — Limited trapping of starving quail in North Texas, so that they can be transplanted into other areas, has been attempted in several places, according to the executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

"We don't think this is a solution of the problem, but we are interested in seeing what can be done for the birds," he said. "We had a very unusual situation during the past season. There was an abundance of quail and an abundance of rats in the area. The food supply was insufficient and as a result many quail have died of starvation."

The secretary said that where quail are moved it has been done with the understanding that the birds would be provided with food in their new range.

"What this will mean we are not in a position to say," he pointed out. "There is some danger that the unhealthy birds may infect other birds. For that reason we hesitate to trap and move many of the starving birds. We are doing so, however, on a very limited experimental basis."

In some counties in North Texas as the birds were so poor by mid-December hunters refused to shoot them. As a result, thousands of birds have died of starvation. At the same time rats also are dying off.

Eastland citizens will have the opportunity to vote in three elections in the next five days, but there will not be an opposed race on any of the ballots.

Saturday, persons living in the Eastland School District will elect three members to the Board of Trustees. M. H. Perry, H. T. Weaver and H. L. King have all filed for re-election.

Dr. Ashton Discusses Bill For Vet Benefits

"The colleges and universities in our State can take care of the veterans and do it adequately," said Dr. Price R. Ashton before the Subcommittee on Veterans Affairs of the Committee on Labor and Public Welfare in a Washington, D. C., last week.

Dr. Ashton, one of four educators making statements in regard to the Veterans' Readjustment Assistance Act of 1959 before the committee, then added: "We would like to see sufficient money provided by this congress to make it a positive solution to the problem of the veteran to attend university or college."

Dr. Ashton believes that educational institutions in the state are highly in favor of the extension of benefits to veterans of the cold war category (those who enter the service between Jan. 31, 1955, and July 1, 1963.)

Families of veterans think the bill, to be presented before Congress, represents one of the greatest pieces of legislation that has been offered in many years," said Ashton before the subcommittee.

Later, in the hearing, Dr. Ashton remarked: "...to get on the proper frontier of human resources, men's minds must be trained. When we cut that off with a formula to channel it all into technology, then we run out of ideas and we have used up all our resources." That is how simple it can be.

Senator Ralph Yarborough presided over the session.

Court Rules Ranger Pilots Under Federal Wage - Hour Law

Airplane pilots and combination pilot-mechanics who fly patrols to detect leaks, breaks, or damage to oil and gas pipelines must be paid in compliance with the Fair Labor Standards Act (Federal Wage-Hour Law).

The court enjoined Aviation, Inc., Aviation, Inc., doing business as Gleason Romans Pipeline Control Company, and Gleason Romans, individually, from further violation of the law.

The primary business of the defendants is air patrol of many oil and gas gathering systems, trunk lines, and pipelines owned or operated by concerns engaged in the interstate transportation of oil and gas in commerce or in the production of oil, gas, and by-products for interstate commerce.

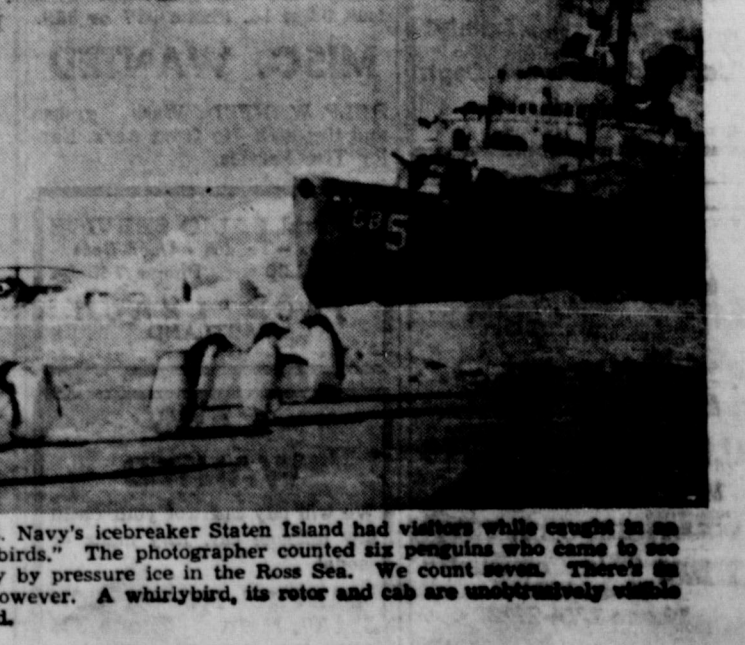
The company's main office is located in Tulsa with branch establishments at Comanche, Okla.; Lafayette, La.; Houston, Ranger, Midland, and El Paso; and Bakersfield, Calif.

The suit was brought by U. S. Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell after investigation by the Labor Department's Wage - Hour division.

At issue was the work of pilots, pilot-mechanics, and office workers employed by the company in its work of patrolling the pipelines of some 16 gas and oil companies over ten states.

Mechanics and combination pilot mechanics were regularly engaged on maintenance and repair work required by the planes, and the pilots devoted appreciable time to preparing for patrol flights, refueling, and in making reports after their pilot operations.

For all non-exempt employees engaged in interstate commerce or in the production of goods for commerce, the law requires a minimum wage of \$1 an hour and at least time and one-half for overtime after 40 hours a week. It also requires the keeping of adequate and accurate records of employees' hours of work and rates of pay.

Miss Jan Webb of Big Spring attended her cousin as maid of honor. Best man was Don Smith of Eastland.


Miss Joyce Myrick and Miss Joreta Newton were bridesmaids. Miss Sandy Smith, sister of the bride, was a junior attendant.
