Eastland's scrappy Mavericks who played their best game of the year despite the fact his team was on the short end of the score, intercepted a Lion pass on the Eastland five yard line. down came after Jim Wood had returned the opening kickoff 64 yards to the Eastland 16. In three plays the Lions were to the Mav nine, then tried the fatal pass.

While the first minute and 40 seconds belonged to the Mavs, most of the rest of the game was controlled by the visitors.

It took Albany 11 plays to score their first TD. Marching 51 yards, it took a third down and nine passes to cover the last 14 yards with Jackie Mitchell tossing to Johnny Woodward for the score. The extra point try failed.

Albany found yardage hard to get down the middle of the Mav line, but they ran the ends with ease most of the night. It was this tactic which gained them their next touchdown. Jim Wood got the call and carried 14 yards for the score. The point after was a wide.

Don Mitchell used the same end sweep to score next for the Lions. This time he went 20 yards to climax a 38 yard drive set up by Hill's pass interception. T. G. Willie booted the extra point this time, making the score 19-7.

Albany scored once more before the half rolled around. Bill Morrell, who appeared to be the best back Albany had Friday night, took his 167 pounds 14 yards on a wide play to end a 51 yard march. Willie converted.

So it was 26-7 at halftime. The Lions scored the first time they touched the ball in the third quarter. Morrell got the honors again, going 47 yards on a quick opener over the left side of his line. Hill kicked the points this time, making it 33-7.

State Secretary to Speak to Baptist

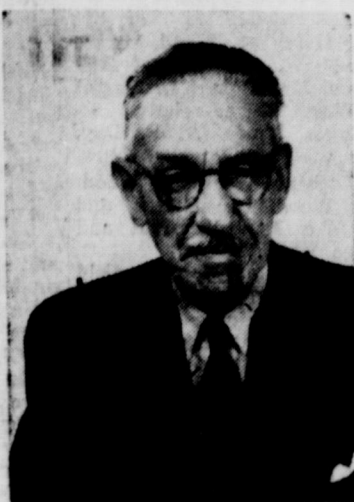
The Cisco Association of Baptist Brotherhood will meet at the First Baptist Church in Eastland on Tuesday, Oct. 25 in a program for men and boys.

SPALDING SEEKS RETIREMENT PLAN

Horton Is President Of Eastland Chamber

Eastland Chamber of Commerce directors Thursday elected new officers for the coming year and had a lively discussion over naming a committee to study a proposed manager's retirement program.

Horace Horton is now president of the chamber, Gordon Goldston chairman.

OTHER DEVELOPMENTS

In other developments at Thursday's chamber of commerce board of directors' meeting:

- (1) Gordon Goldston, ticket chairman, announced that all members of the C-C board of directors have tickets on sale for the chamber's Nov. 2 banquet. E. B. Germany, chairman of the Texas Commission and president of Lone Star Steel, will be the speaker.
- (2) Herb Tanner, manager, reported work on installing lights at the courthouse is now underway.
- (3) Horace Horton, new president, pledged Eastland would get a new industry during his year in office.

is first vice president and Charles Freyschlag is second vice president. H. J. Tanner was re-elected secretary-manager.

Outgoing officers are Clyde Young, president; Milton Fullen, first vice president; and Gordon Goldston, second vice president.

The debate on the retirement program was kicked off when Dick Spalding tendered a written resignation as a member of the C-C board of directors.

After reading the resignation Spalding left the meeting and a spirited discussion began.

Virgil Seaberry Jr., a newly elected director, immediately made a motion that Spalding's resignation be accepted. Dr. James Whittington moved that Seaberry's motion be tabled and a committee be named to contact Spalding and

urge him to reconsider his action. Whittington's motion was seconded by Jack Frost and was passed by directors.

Young named Dr. Whittington and himself as a committee of two to contact Spalding.

New officers were then elected and Horton took over as chairman. He praised the work done in the past year by Young and Seaberry presented the outgoing president with a gift of appreciation.

Horton then urged directors to be careful not to move to fast, saying that sometimes "pushing can get you into trouble."

Tanner then asked to speak and told the Board if they were with him "to let me know." He charged Dr. Whittington with taking a "crack" at him.

Dr. Whittington denied the charge, saying he had nothing to do with Spalding's resignation.

Seaberry then called on directors to give Tanner, who has served as secretary-manager of the Eastland chamber of commerce for more than 25 years, a vote of confidence. Dr. Whittington seconded that motion and all directors joined in a round of applause for Tanner.

Seaberry told directors that Tanner has "... served us long and well" for almost 26 years. He praised his past work and said that the manager is still serving well and will continue to do a good job.

He pointed to the fact that Tanner's pay hasn't been high and said "... no man in this area has done the job Herb has. We owe it to Herb to give him the vote of confidence he has requested."

The next move came on a motion from Dr. Whittington to name a committee to study a retirement program. James Smith seconded the motion. Whittington first named the members who he thought should serve on the committee, then amended his motion to name a banker, a lawyer and a businessman on the group.

Seaberry asked that the president of the chamber name his own committee and Charles Freyschlag seconded that amendment. Directors approved the amendment by a show of hands. Then they passed the motion directing Horton to name a retirement study committee.

Dr. Whittington told the group that when a man has "... served well he should be awarded."

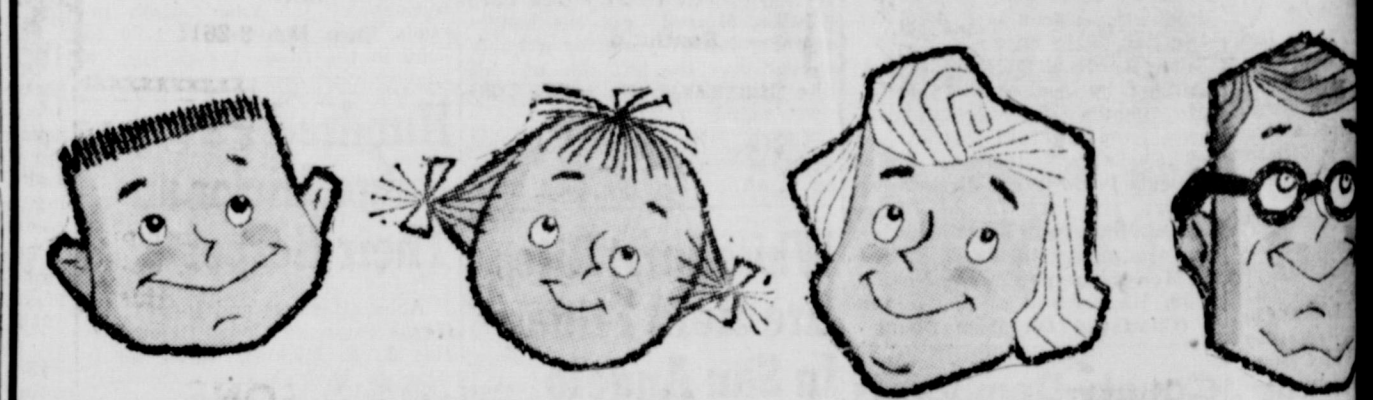

(Continued from Page One) areas we have moved well, for instance, I am pleased with our progress in industrial development and give my personal thanks to H. J. Tanner and our Industrial Development Committee for their achievements in that respect.

"I do feel that a chamber of commerce has dozens of other responsibilities to its community, and it is in this area that I feel we are slipping or have slipped. I have urged Mr. Young (Clyde Young) to direct our board's attention to this problem, so that we might take appropriate steps to its solution. Others of this board have stated to me their like thoughts but are hesitant to demand action for fear of injuring the pride and feelings of those involved with the chamber's operation. I feel that no one could rest easily if he knew that a group's respect and admiration for him were stifling a city's progress.

"Before leaving this group I would strongly urge you to take one of the only two courses of action I can discover:

"1. Hire an assistant to Mr. Tanner, who would handle the load of local Chamber development, freeing Mr. Tanner to work exclusively with industrial development, or

"Arrange for a retirement plan, satisfactory to Mr. Tanner, and then promote chamber membership dues to the point where this group can hire and sustain the caliber of man necessary to replace this devoted, longtime servant.

"Gentlemen, many of you have stated to me your awareness of this problem. I only hope the comments I have made in this resignation will prompt you to drive to-

ward a solution satisfactory to all. A problem does not become solved by ignoring it.

"May I say I have intended no offense to anyone. I do this in what I believe to be the best interest of Eastland."
