

## Request Made For Fire Dept. In Rural Area

Each of the cities of Eastland County had representatives at the meeting Tuesday of the Commissioner's Court of Eastland County for the purpose of asking that Eastland County participate in a county wide plan for fighting rural fires.

Commissioners were asked for money to pay for equipment and for such a purpose. It was

pointed out that not only was the city without fire protection when its equipment was out of the city limits, but that insurance on the equipment and liability insurance on the firemen was void.

The Commissioners were favorable and promised the help of the county, when such a provision was made that made it possible to participate within the statutes set up for the spending of County funds.

Wayne Jackson, City manager A. E. Taylor, Otto Marshall, and Guy Robinson spoke for the Eastland group.

Leslie Hagaman of Ranger spoke for the City of Ranger, their fire department and for himself, as a rural rancher and home owner. He praised the Ranger fire department for help given in time of need, but also thought that a rural plan should be worked out even if it meant extra taxes to do so.

Herbert Whitlock, Gorman fire chief, and Harvey Parker, city commissioner, spoke for Gorman. Parker stated that the line of the City of Gorman and their rural area had been wiped out long ago and that their equipment responded to all rural calls, but he also believed that a county plan should be worked out.

Others from Gorman were Ed Harrison and A. E. Smith. Henry Carter, county commissioner, who lives at Rising Star, spoke for the Rising Star fire department.

Sutton Crofts, rural fire chief in charge of equipment purchased by ranchers and oil men in the Cisco area, which is housed by the City of Cisco spoke in favor of the plan. L. E. Sublett, Cisco fire chief and R. N. Cluck, Cisco city commissioner, also spoke.

Cluck laughingly told the court that they should be happy to grant funds within any amount since that it was the first time in history of Cisco, Eastland and Ranger being in accord on the subject.

The meeting is open to the public.

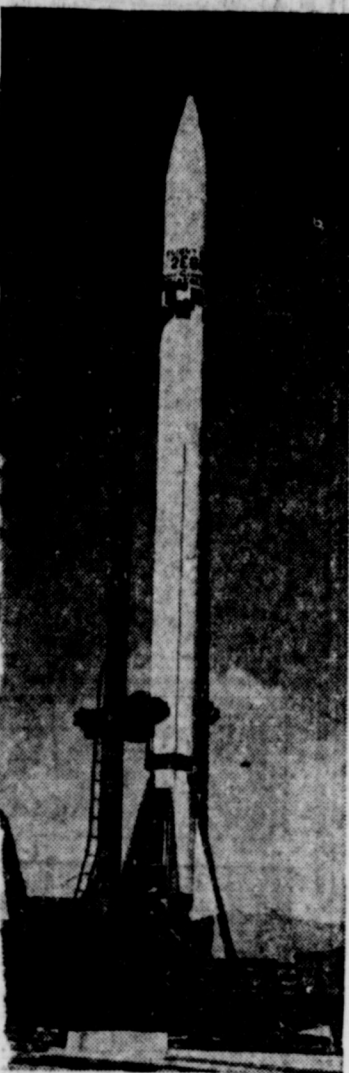
The way that the set-up operates now, the city tax payers are bearing the cost of fire protection for the rural areas. Neither the city folks or the rural people want it that way.

## Highway Fines Light In County During August

"Highway Patrolmen of the Abilene district investigated 83 rural traffic accidents for the month of August 1954," Capt. G. L. Morahan, in charge of the district office reported today.

Three deaths were recorded in the 13-county area and 46 persons injured last month. Property damage in the 83 accidents was estimated at \$44,090.50.

The 20 patrolmen of the district contacted 1,642 traffic violators, with 1,145 being warned and 497 charged with various traffic violations. There were 19 charges of driving while intoxicated; 27 for passing violations in moving traffic; 186 for excessive speeding; 79 for not having an inspection sticker on vehicles and 21 for running stop signs.

Fines were paid in the counties as follows:

Eastland, \$77.00; Callahan, \$1,076.50; Fisher, \$198.70; Haskell, \$174.50; Jones, \$738.35; Mitchell, \$237.00; Nolan, \$782.40; Scurry, \$95.00; Shackelford, \$435.10; Stephens, \$233.30; Stonewall, \$57.50; Taylor \$1,271.00 and none in Throckmorton.

In traffic supervision patrolmen in the Abilene district traveled 53,211 miles in August.

## County Budget Given Approval

Eastland County Commissioners Tuesday adopted a budget for the coming year that set a 75 cent tax levy and estimated disbursements would be \$331,790.71. The budget, as recommended by Earl O'Brien, county auditor, was unanimously approved.

The tax levy of 75 cents is the same as the present levy. The budget estimates cash receipts will be \$309,340.69. O'Brien said he based that figure on 80 percent collection of the tax rolls. The estimate is conservative since last year's collections totaled 91.1 percent.

## 730 Enrolled In School Here; Slight Increase
