MENTAL AND EMOTIONAL AILMENTS

Noted Professor Declares One Family In Five Faces Problem

Eastland Lions took a test on "How Well Balanced Is Your Mind?" at their regular meeting Tuesday, and after some amusement at some of the questions asked, members were brought back to a more serious frame of mind when Dr. Paul Southern, head of the Abilene Christian College Bible department, warned them that one out of 10 Americans are in need of psychiatric aid. Dr. Southern declared that the number one problem in the United States today is mental and emotional ailments. Pointing out that mental and emotional ailments claim more victims than all other major illnesses combined, the ACC professor said that more than 800,000 persons are in mental institutions today and went on to add that one out of every 10 Americans faces a mental problem. More than half of the patients in American hospitals on any given day are mental patients, Lions were informed. Throwing more statistics, Dr. Southern warned that one out of every five families has been or will be affected by mental illness. He said it is "a crying shame we have allowed conditions in Texas to remain in the shape they are in." His statement came after he declared that mental patients are stacked two deep and three wide in space made for not more than two patients. Dr. Southern also warned of the danger of weakening America because of mental and emotional ailments. He declared no nation can long maintain its strength when one out of 10 citizens needs mental aid. Knocking the theory that mental ailments are hereditary, the Lions Club speaker said that a child is born with just two fears: the fear of loud noises and the fear of falling. Dr. Southern said all other fears must be taught the child. Dr. Southern charged that many mothers are "... all vague on the outside and all vague on the inside." He said the first six years of a child's life are his most important. His pattern for later life is established then. "Settle down and live within the framework of conscience and wit in the framework of your body," the speaker advised. And he warned there is no cure in a bottle, pill or capsule. Lions were told they must constantly adjust to emotional problems of living. "We must live with the grain of life and not against it." Donald Kinnaird Jr. introduced Dr. Southern.

Here is the written test given Eastland Lions Tuesday by Dr. Paul Southern. The check list was prepared by Dr. Will Menniger and Monroe Leaf and appeared in their book, "You and Psychiatry." Are you always worrying? Are you unable to concentrate because of unrecognized reasons? Are you continually unhappy without justified cause? Do you lose your temper easily and often? Are you troubled by regular insomnia? Do you have wide fluctuations in your moods, from depression to elation, back to depression, which incapacitate you? Do you continually dislike to be with people? Are you seriously upset if the routine of your life is disturbed? Do the children consistently "get on your nerves"? Are you constantly bitter? Are you afraid without real cause? Are you always right and the other person wrong? Do you have numerous aches or pains for which no doctor can find a physical cause? (Dr. Southern advised that if you answered three or more of the questions yes you may need help.)

Game Law Violators Charged With 433 Fines

Wardens will begin another crackdown on persons who fail to buy their hunting and fishing licenses, according to the director of law enforcement of the Game and Fish Commission. New licenses were required after Sept. 1.

Last month 433 persons paid fines for failure to have fishing licenses, according to the monthly report of the law enforcement division. There were 546 arrests for the month, with fines and costs amounting to \$9,075.42. Fifty persons paid fines for "telephoning" for fish. This is the illegal use of electrical devices in shocking fish.

Licenses were revoked on a dozen violators, including those who "telephoned" the fish. Others who killed deer out of season also got their licenses revoked.

"There is little excuse for a person to get caught without a hunting or fishing license," the director said. "Everyone knows such a license is required. They think they can get by without one, and then get caught."

If you hunt deer you must have deer tags, even though you are entitled to exemption. This is the warning of the fiscal director of the Game and Fish Commission, whose job it is to provide hunting and fishing licenses.

For persons entitled to an exemption, the license is required only if you hunt deer or turkey. The exempt license is not required for other types of game.

The following are exempt from buying a hunting license: If you hunt entirely within your own county (except for deer and turkey); If you are over 65 or under 17 years of age. If you qualify for hunting without a license under these conditions you do not need a permit.

Tags are necessary, because it is illegal to possess a deer that does not have a tag. These tags must be securely attached to the deer immediately after it is killed. Just having the tag in your pocket is insufficient. As soon as you reach your deer, the tag, properly filled in, should be attached to the antlers, if a buck, or a leg if a doe, where does are legal. It can be securely wrapped with string, or fastened with adhesive tape. And the tag should be put on so it will not become loose with handling the carcass in either the icehouse or the automobile while in transit. The deer tags are non-transferable and must bear the name of the shooter.

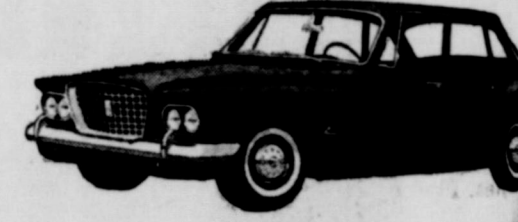

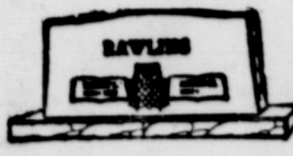

Back to the blanket — it was a quiet little number; blue and yellow. Premonition — intuition — instinct — or something told me that this would be my only time ever to win anything; therefore, I decided to make the most of my moment.

So when I got back up town, I draped it around me, entered the lobby of the Raleigh Hotel, raised my right hand and said, "Ugh!" I was sensational.

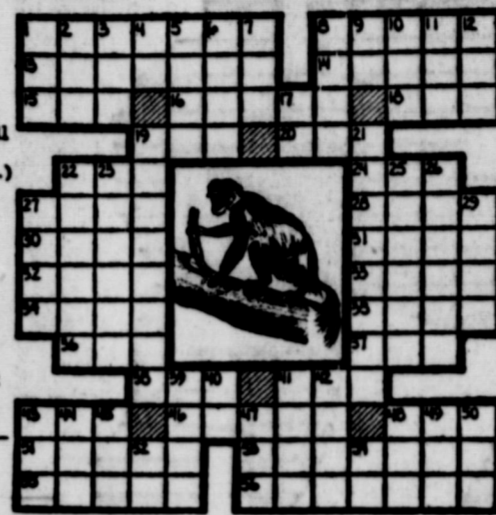

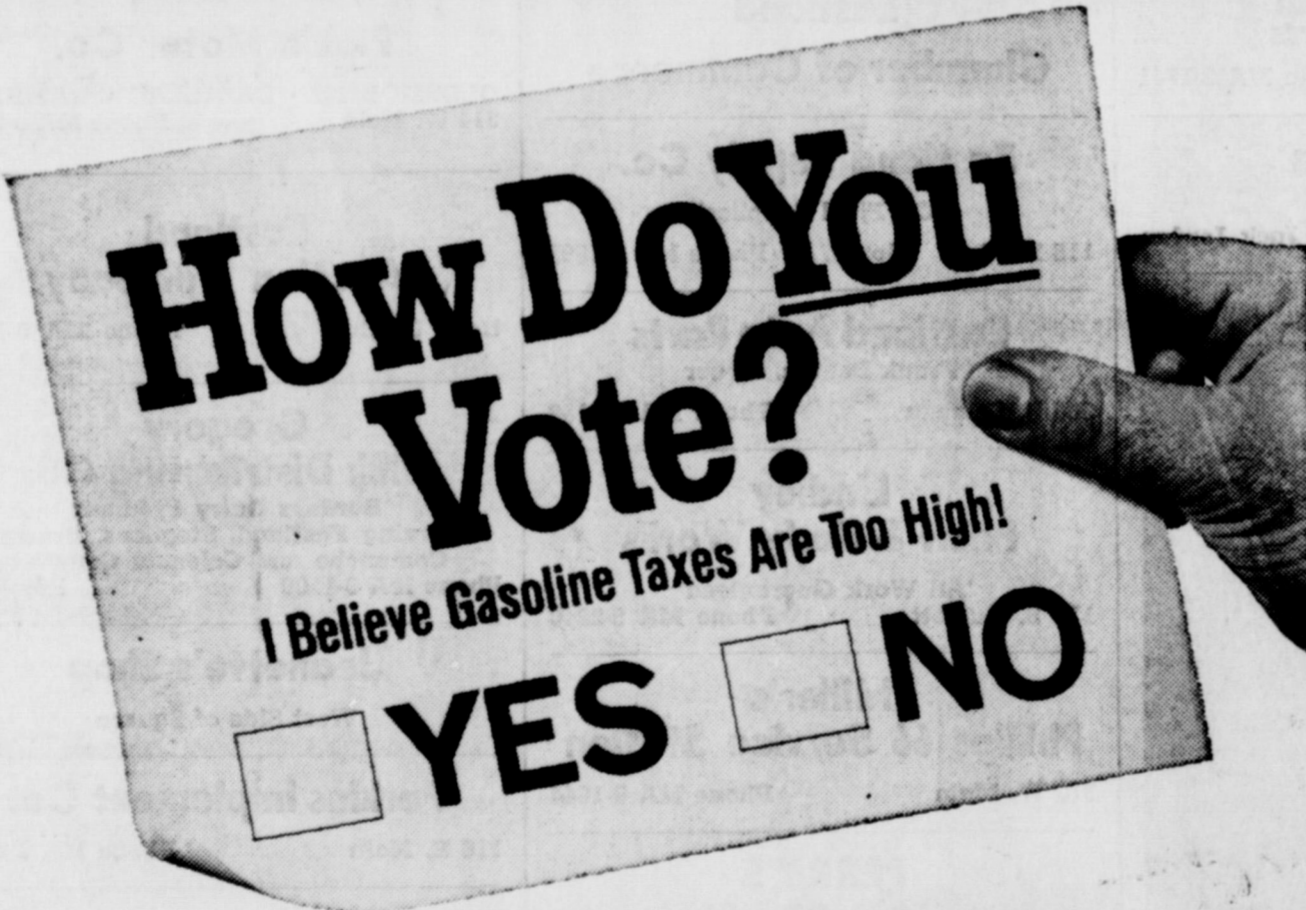

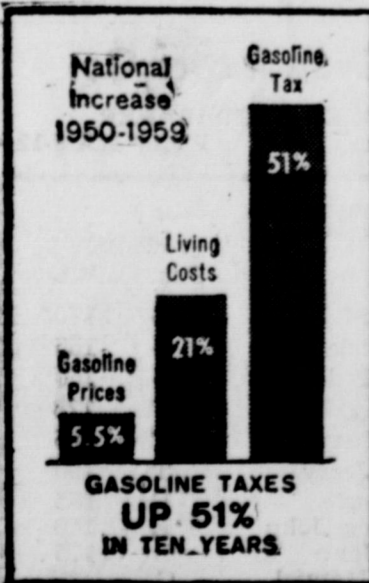
